<b><u>electrifying</u></b>	Arousing a sudden sense of great excitement; thrilling. <i>She delivered an <b>electrifying</b> speech.</i>
<b>exciting</b>	Creating or arousing excitement. <i>One of the most <b>exciting</b> matches I ve ever seen.</i>
<b><u>exhilarating</u></b>	Making lively and joyful. <i>An <b>exhilarating</b> two hour rafting experience.</i>
<b>galvanizing</b>	Affected by emotion as if by electricity; thrilling.
<b>heady</b>	Having a strong or exhilarating effect. <i>A <b>heady</b> exotic perfume.</i>
<b><u>inspiring</u></b>	Having the effect of inspiring someone. <i>He was an <b>inspiring</b> teacher.</i>
<b>intoxicant</b>	Causing.
<b><u>invigorating</u></b>	Imparting strength and vitality. <i>The <b>invigorating</b> mountain air.</i>
<b>rousing</b>	Capable of arousing enthusiasm or excitement. <i>A <b>rousing</b> sermon.</i>
<b>stimulating</b>	Making lively and cheerful. <i>A rich and <b>stimulating</b> working environment.</i>
<b><u>stirring</u></b>	Moving briskly; active. <i>A <b>stirring</b> and thriving politician.</i>
<b><u>thrilling</u></b>	Causing a surge of emotion or excitement. <i>A <b>thrilling</b> adventure.</i>

- addictive** Relating to or susceptible to being or becoming addicted to something.  
*Addictive drugs.*
- alcohol** Drink containing alcohol.  
*Alcohol or drink ruined him.*
- alcoholic** Containing or relating to alcohol.  
*His alcoholic daughter was the cause of his anxiety.*
- bacchanalian** Used of riotously drunken merrymaking.  
*A night of bacchanalian revelry.*
- [beer](#)** A general name for alcoholic beverages made by fermenting a cereal (or mixture of cereals) flavored with hops.  
*A beer bottle.*
- bibulous** Excessively fond of drinking alcohol.  
*A bibulous fellow.*

<b>binge</b>	A period of excessive indulgence in an activity, especially eating, drinking, or taking drugs. <i>A drinking <b>binge</b>.</i>
<b>carousal</b>	Revelry in drinking; a merry drinking party.
<b>carouse</b>	Engage in boisterous, drunken merrymaking. <i>They danced and <b>caroused</b> until the drink ran out.</i>
<b>drinker</b>	A person who drinks alcoholic beverages (especially to excess). <i>A heavy <b>drinker</b>.</i>
<b>drunken</b>	Caused by or showing the effects of drink. <i>Gangs of <b>drunken</b> youths roamed the streets.</i>
<b>inebriate</b>	Fill with sublime emotion. <i>Those who feel inclined are free to <b>inebriate</b> themselves.</i>
<b><u>inebriated</u></b>	Stupefied or excited by a chemical substance (especially alcohol). <i>Helplessly <b>inebriated</b>.</i>
<b>inebriety</b>	Drunkenness, especially habitual; intoxication. <i>The ravages of <b>inebriety</b>.</i>
<b>intoxicant</b>	Causing intoxication. <i><b>Intoxicants</b> and drugs are used by some to escape physical or psychological pain.</i>
<b><u>intoxicated</u></b>	As if under the influence of alcohol. <i>Felt <b>intoxicated</b> by her success.</i>
<b>intoxication</b>	The physiological state produced by a poison or other toxic substance. <i>The <b>intoxication</b> of wealth and power.</i>
<b>plastered</b>	Covered with or made of plaster. <i>I went out and got totally <b>plastered</b>.</i>
<b><u>revel</u></b>	Lively and noisy enjoyment, especially with drinking and dancing. <i>They spent the evening <b>revelling</b> with their guests.</i>
<b>reveler</b>	A celebrant who shares in a noisy party. <i>The clubs attract <b>revelers</b> as young as thirteen.</i>
<b>scotch</b>	Of or relating to or characteristic of Scotland or its people or culture or its English dialect or Gaelic language. <i>Feudal power in France was <b>scotched</b> though far from killed.</i>
<b><u>sober</u></b>	Become sober after excessive alcohol consumption. <i>As <b>sober</b> as a judge.</i>
<b>sobriety</b>	A manner that is serious and solemn. <i>The price of beer compelled me to maintain a certain level of <b>sobriety</b>.</i>

**spree** Take part in a spree.  
*They don't want work they're too busy **spreeing**.*

**tipple** Drink moderately but regularly.  
*She drank several glasses of sherry her favourite **tipple**.*

**tipsy** Slightly drunk.  
*A **tipsy** boat.*
