Definitions of "Intoxicating" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “intoxicating” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Exhilarating or exciting.*
- *Extremely exciting as if by alcohol or a narcotic.*
- *Causing intoxication.*
- *(of alcoholic drink or a drug) liable to cause someone to lose control of their faculties or behaviour.*



Synonyms of "Intoxicating" as an adjective (13 Words)

alcoholic	Addicted to alcohol- Carl Van Doren. <i>Alcoholic liver disease.</i>
<u>electrifying</u>	Arousing a sudden sense of great excitement; thrilling. <i>She delivered an electrifying speech.</i>
exciting	Creating or arousing excitement. <i>One of the most exciting matches I ve ever seen.</i>
<u>exhilarating</u>	Making lively and joyful. <i>An exhilarating two hour rafting experience.</i>
galvanizing	Affected by emotion as if by electricity; thrilling.
heady	Having a strong or exhilarating effect. <i>A heady exotic perfume.</i>
<u>inspiring</u>	Having the effect of inspiring someone. <i>He was an inspiring teacher.</i>
intoxicant	Causing.
<u>invigorating</u>	Imparting strength and vitality. <i>The invigorating mountain air.</i>
rousing	Capable of arousing enthusiasm or excitement. <i>A rousing sermon.</i>
stimulating	Making lively and cheerful. <i>A rich and stimulating working environment.</i>
<u>stirring</u>	Moving briskly; active. <i>A stirring and thriving politician.</i>
<u>thrilling</u>	Causing a surge of emotion or excitement. <i>A thrilling adventure.</i>

Associations of "Intoxicating" (30 Words)

- addictive** Relating to or susceptible to being or becoming addicted to something.
Addictive drugs.
- alcohol** Drink containing alcohol.
Alcohol or drink ruined him.
- alcoholic** Containing or relating to alcohol.
His alcoholic daughter was the cause of his anxiety.
- bacchanalian** Used of riotously drunken merrymaking.
A night of bacchanalian revelry.
- [beer](#)** A general name for alcoholic beverages made by fermenting a cereal (or mixture of cereals) flavored with hops.
A beer bottle.
- bibulous** Excessively fond of drinking alcohol.
A bibulous fellow.

binge	A period of excessive indulgence in an activity, especially eating, drinking, or taking drugs. <i>A drinking binge.</i>
carousal	Revelry in drinking; a merry drinking party.
carouse	Engage in boisterous, drunken merrymaking. <i>They danced and caroused until the drink ran out.</i>
drinker	A person who drinks alcoholic beverages (especially to excess). <i>A heavy drinker.</i>
drunken	Caused by or showing the effects of drink. <i>Gangs of drunken youths roamed the streets.</i>
inebriate	Fill with sublime emotion. <i>Those who feel inclined are free to inebriate themselves.</i>
<u>inebriated</u>	Stupefied or excited by a chemical substance (especially alcohol). <i>Helplessly inebriated.</i>
inebriety	Drunkenness, especially habitual; intoxication. <i>The ravages of inebriety.</i>
intoxicant	Causing intoxication. <i>Intoxicants and drugs are used by some to escape physical or psychological pain.</i>
<u>intoxicated</u>	As if under the influence of alcohol. <i>Felt intoxicated by her success.</i>
intoxication	The physiological state produced by a poison or other toxic substance. <i>The intoxication of wealth and power.</i>
plastered	Covered with or made of plaster. <i>I went out and got totally plastered.</i>
<u>revel</u>	Lively and noisy enjoyment, especially with drinking and dancing. <i>They spent the evening revelling with their guests.</i>
reveler	A celebrant who shares in a noisy party. <i>The clubs attract revelers as young as thirteen.</i>
scotch	Of or relating to or characteristic of Scotland or its people or culture or its English dialect or Gaelic language. <i>Feudal power in France was scotched though far from killed.</i>
<u>sober</u>	Become sober after excessive alcohol consumption. <i>As sober as a judge.</i>
sobriety	A manner that is serious and solemn. <i>The price of beer compelled me to maintain a certain level of sobriety.</i>

spree Take part in a spree.
*They don't want work they're too busy **spreeing**.*

tipple Drink moderately but regularly.
*She drank several glasses of sherry her favourite **tipple**.*

tipsy Slightly drunk.
*A **tipsy** boat.*
