<b>adventurous</b>	Involving new ideas or methods. <i>They wanted more <b>adventurous</b> meals.</i>
<b>audacious</b>	Showing an impudent lack of respect. <i>An <b>audacious</b> interpretation of two Jacobean dramas.</i>
<b>bold</b>	Fearless and daring. <i>A figure carved in <b>bold</b> relief.</i>
<b>brave</b>	Brightly colored and showy. <i>He put up a <b>brave</b> fight before losing.</i>
<b>confident</b>	Persuaded of; very sure. <i>This time they re <b>confident</b> of a happy ending.</i>
<b>daring</b>	Causing outrage or surprise by being boldly unconventional. <i>The most <b>daring</b> of contemporary fiction writers.</i>
<b>dashing</b>	Lively and spirited. <i>A <b>dashing</b> black fedora.</i>
<b>dauntless</b>	Showing fearlessness and determination. <i><b>Dauntless</b> bravery.</i>
<b>dynamic</b>	Of or relating to dynamics. <i>A <b>dynamic</b> young advertising executive.</i>
<b>fearless</b>	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i><b>Fearless</b> reporters and photographers.</i>
<b>hardy</b>	Capable of enduring difficult conditions; robust. <i>Camels are tough and <b>hardy</b> creatures.</i>
<b>heroic</b>	Having or displaying qualities appropriate for heroes. <i>One passes under pyramids and obelisks all on a <b>heroic</b> scale.</i>
<b>indomitable</b>	Impossible to subdue. <i>A woman of <b>indomitable</b> spirit.</i>
<b>mettlesome</b>	Willing to face danger. <i>Their horses were beasts of burden not <b>mettlesome</b> chargers.</i>
<b>spirited</b>	Made lively or spirited. <i>A warm hearted generous <b>spirited</b> man.</i>
<b>unabashed</b>	Not embarrassed, disconcerted, or ashamed. <i>A tinselled charm and <b>unabashed</b> sentimentality.</i>
<b>unafraid</b>	Free from fear or doubt; easy in mind. <i>She was calm and <b>unafraid</b>.</i>



**unalarmed** Not anxious or concerned.  
*An **unalarmed** fire exit door.*

**undaunted** Resolutely courageous.  
*They were **undaunted** by the huge amount of work needed.*

**undismayed** Unshaken in purpose.  
*Wholly **undismayed** by the commercial failure of the three movies he had made.*

**unfearing** Invulnerable to fear or intimidation.

**unflinching** Not showing fear or hesitation in the face of danger or difficulty.  
*He has shown **unflinching** determination throughout the campaign.*

**unshrinking** Not shrinking from danger.

<b>adventurous</b>	Full of excitement. <i><b>Adventurous</b> pioneers.</i>
<b>audacity</b>	Fearless daring. <i>He whistled at the sheer <b>audacity</b> of the plan.</i>
<b>bold</b>	A bold typeface or letter. <i>Cross references are printed in <b>bold</b> type.</i>
<b>boldly</b>	In a manner that is so confident as to be impudent or presumptuous. <i>We urge the educational community to act <b>boldly</b>.</i>
<b>boldness</b>	Confidence to an impudent or presumptuous degree. <i>They had the <b>boldness</b> to mock a man who had served his country.</i>
<b>brave</b>	People who are brave. <i>These six men <b>braved</b> the rough seas.</i>

<b>bravely</b>	In a courageous manner. <i>She <b>bravely</b> had a go at paragliding.</i>
<b>bravery</b>	A quality of spirit that enables you to face danger or pain without showing fear. <i>Perhaps I ll get a medal for <b>bravery</b>.</i>
<b>courage</b>	A quality of spirit that enables you to face danger or pain without showing fear. <i>He fought his illness with great <b>courage</b>.</i>
<b>courageous</b>	Possessing or displaying courage; able to face and deal with danger or fear without flinching. <i>Her <b>courageous</b> human rights work.</i>
<u><b>daredevil</b></u>	A reckless impetuous irresponsible person. <i>A <b>daredevil</b> test pilot having the right stuff.</i>
<b>daringly</b>	In an original manner.
<b>dauntless</b>	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i><b>Dauntless</b> bravery.</i>
<u><b>embolden</b></u>	Cause (a piece of text) to appear in a bold typeface. <i>Centre <b>embolden</b> and underline the heading.</i>
<u><b>gall</b></u>	The contents of the gall bladder bile proverbial for its bitterness. <i>The trade in animal parts such as bear <b>galls</b>.</i>
<u><b>gallant</b></u>	(of a man) flirt with (a woman). <i>Put up a <b>gallant</b> resistance to the attackers.</i>
<b>gutsy</b>	(of food or drink) strongly flavoured. <i>Her <b>gutsy</b> 80 year old grandmother.</i>
<b>hardy</b>	United States slapstick comedian who played the pompous and overbearing member of the Laurel and Hardy duo who made many films (1892-1957). <i>A <b>hardy</b> breed of cattle.</i>
<u><b>heroic</b></u>	A verse form suited to the treatment of heroic or elevated themes dactylic hexameter or iambic pentameter. <i>They took <b>heroic</b> measures to save his life.</i>
<u><b>manly</b></u>	Possessing qualities befitting a man. <i><b>Manly</b> sports.</i>
<b>plucky</b>	Showing courage. <i>The <b>plucky</b> youngster has astounded medical staff.</i>
<b>robust</b>	Strong enough to withstand or overcome intellectual challenges or adversity. <i>A <b>robust</b> body.</i>

<b>shameless</b>	(of a person or their conduct) characterized by or showing a lack of shame; barefaced or brazen. <i>His <b>shameless</b> hypocrisy.</i>
<b><u>stalwart</u></b>	Loyal, reliable, and hard-working. <i>The <b>stalwarts</b> of the Labour Party.</i>
<b>stouthearted</b>	Used especially of persons. <i>A <b>stouthearted</b> fellow who had an active career in the army.</i>
<b>unflinching</b>	Not showing fear or hesitation in the face of danger or difficulty. <i>He has shown <b>unflinching</b> determination throughout the campaign.</i>
<b><u>valiant</u></b>	Having or showing valor. <i>A <b>valiant</b> warrior.</i>
<b><u>valor</u></b>	The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle). <i>He received a medal for <b>valor</b>.</i>
<b>valorous</b>	Showing great courage in the face of danger, especially in battle. <i><b>Valorous</b> deeds on the field of honour.</i>
<b>venturous</b>	Disposed to venture or take risks. <i>Five <b>venturous</b> young men.</i>
