adventurous	Involving new ideas or methods. <i>They wanted more adventurous meals.</i>
audacious	Showing an impudent lack of respect. <i>An audacious interpretation of two Jacobean dramas.</i>
bold	Fearless and daring. <i>A figure carved in bold relief.</i>
brave	Brightly colored and showy. <i>He put up a brave fight before losing.</i>
confident	Persuaded of; very sure. <i>This time they re confident of a happy ending.</i>
daring	Causing outrage or surprise by being boldly unconventional. <i>The most daring of contemporary fiction writers.</i>
dashing	Lively and spirited. <i>A dashing black fedora.</i>
dauntless	Showing fearlessness and determination. <i>Dauntless bravery.</i>
dynamic	Of or relating to dynamics. <i>A dynamic young advertising executive.</i>
fearless	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i>Fearless reporters and photographers.</i>
hardy	Capable of enduring difficult conditions; robust. <i>Camels are tough and hardy creatures.</i>
heroic	Having or displaying qualities appropriate for heroes. <i>One passes under pyramids and obelisks all on a heroic scale.</i>
indomitable	Impossible to subdue. <i>A woman of indomitable spirit.</i>
mettlesome	Willing to face danger. <i>Their horses were beasts of burden not mettlesome chargers.</i>
spirited	Made lively or spirited. <i>A warm hearted generous spirited man.</i>
unabashed	Not embarrassed, disconcerted, or ashamed. <i>A tinselled charm and unabashed sentimentality.</i>
unafraid	Free from fear or doubt; easy in mind. <i>She was calm and unafraid.</i>

unalarmed Not anxious or concerned.
*An **unalarmed** fire exit door.*

undaunted Resolutely courageous.
*They were **undaunted** by the huge amount of work needed.*

undismayed Unshaken in purpose.
*Wholly **undismayed** by the commercial failure of the three movies he had made.*

unfearing Invulnerable to fear or intimidation.

unflinching Not showing fear or hesitation in the face of danger or difficulty.
*He has shown **unflinching** determination throughout the campaign.*

unshrinking Not shrinking from danger.

- bold** A bold typeface or letter.

- boldly** In a manner that is so confident as to be impudent or presumptuous.
*We urge the educational community to act **boldly**.*
- boldness** Confidence to an impudent or presumptuous degree.
*They had the **boldness** to mock a man who had served his country.*
- brave** People who are brave.
*These six men **braved** the rough seas.*

bravely	In a courageous manner. <i>She bravely had a go at paragliding.</i>
bravery	A quality of spirit that enables you to face danger or pain without showing fear. <i>Perhaps I ll get a medal for bravery.</i>
courage	A quality of spirit that enables you to face danger or pain without showing fear. <i>He fought his illness with great courage.</i>
courageous	Possessing or displaying courage; able to face and deal with danger or fear without flinching. <i>Her courageous human rights work.</i>
<u>daredevil</u>	A reckless impetuous irresponsible person. <i>A daredevil test pilot having the right stuff.</i>
daringly	In an original manner.
dauntless	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i>Dauntless bravery.</i>
<u>embolden</u>	Cause (a piece of text) to appear in a bold typeface. <i>Centre embolden and underline the heading.</i>
<u>gall</u>	The contents of the gall bladder bile proverbial for its bitterness. <i>The trade in animal parts such as bear galls.</i>
<u>gallant</u>	(of a man) flirt with (a woman). <i>Put up a gallant resistance to the attackers.</i>
gutsy	(of food or drink) strongly flavoured. <i>Her gutsy 80 year old grandmother.</i>
hardy	United States slapstick comedian who played the pompous and overbearing member of the Laurel and Hardy duo who made many films (1892-1957). <i>A hardy breed of cattle.</i>
<u>heroic</u>	A verse form suited to the treatment of heroic or elevated themes dactylic hexameter or iambic pentameter. <i>They took heroic measures to save his life.</i>
<u>manly</u>	Possessing qualities befitting a man. <i>Manly sports.</i>
plucky	Showing courage. <i>The plucky youngster has astounded medical staff.</i>
robust	Strong enough to withstand or overcome intellectual challenges or adversity. <i>A robust body.</i>

- shameless** (of a person or their conduct) characterized by or showing a lack of shame; barefaced or brazen.
*His **shameless** hypocrisy.*
- stalwart** Loyal, reliable, and hard-working.
*The **stalwarts** of the Labour Party.*
- stouthearted** Used especially of persons.
*A **stouthearted** fellow who had an active career in the army.*
- unflinching** Not showing fear or hesitation in the face of danger or difficulty.
*He has shown **unflinching** determination throughout the campaign.*
- valiant** Having or showing valor.
*A **valiant** warrior.*
- valor** The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle).
*He received a medal for **valor**.*
- valorous** Showing great courage in the face of danger, especially in battle.
***Valorous** deeds on the field of honour.*
- venturous** Disposed to venture or take risks.
*Five **venturous** young men.*
