| allure | The power to entice or attract through personal charm. <i>Will sponsors really be allured by such opportunities.</i> |
| attract | Be attractive to. <i>I am not attracted to him at all.</i> |
| attraction | A force under the influence of which objects tend to move towards each other. <i>This reform has many attractions for those on the left.</i> |
| <u>captivate</u> | Attract and hold the interest and attention of; charm. <i>He was captivated by her beauty.</i> |
| <u>charm</u> | Induce into action by using one's charm. <i>She will charm your warts away.</i> |
| <u>collude</u> | Act in unison or agreement and in secret towards a deceitful or illegal purpose. <i>The president accused his opponents of colluding with foreigners.</i> |
| coquet | A man who flirts. <i>For a while he coquetted with engineering.</i> |
| draft | Select a player for a sports team through the draft. <i>He took a sleeping draft.</i> |
| drag | A hunt using a drag lure. <i>He dragged the big suitcase behind him.</i> |
| draw | Engage in drawing. <i>The game ended in a draw.</i> |
| <u>enchant</u> | Cast a spell over someone or something; put a hex on someone or something. <i>Marcia had enchanted the rope so that it simply regenerated when any length was cut off.</i> |
| <u>entice</u> | Attract or tempt by offering pleasure or advantage. <i>A show which should entice a new audience into the theatre.</i> |

| enticing | Attractive or tempting; alluring. <i>Difficult to say no to an enticing advertisement.</i> |
| <u>entrance</u> | Something that provides access (to get in or get out). <i>At their abrupt entrance he rose to his feet.</i> |
| glamorize | Interpret romantically. <i>The lyrics glamorize drugs.</i> |
| ingratiating | Intended to gain approval or favour; sycophantic. <i>A smooth ingratiating manner.</i> |
| interest | The selfish pursuit of one's own welfare self interest. <i>I thought the book might interest Eliot.</i> |
| <u>inviting</u> | Offering the promise of an attractive or enjoyable experience. <i>An inviting offer.</i> |
| <u>lure</u> | Something used to lure fish or other animals into danger so they can be trapped or killed. <i>He lured me into temptation.</i> |
| <u>magnet</u> | A piece of iron or other material which has its component atoms so ordered that the material exhibits properties of magnetism such as attracting other iron containing objects or aligning itself in an external magnetic field. <i>The beautiful stretch of white sand is a magnet for sun worshippers.</i> |
| <u>mapping</u> | A mathematical relation such that each element of a given set (the domain of the function) is associated with an element of another set (the range of the function). |
| <u>plot</u> | A plan made in secret by a group of people to do something illegal or harmful. <i>He outlined his idea for a movie plot.</i> |
| pull | Bring take or pull out of a container or from under a cover. <i>He unscrewed the cap from the flask and took another pull.</i> |
| pursuit | A search for an alternative that meets cognitive criteria. <i>The culprit started to run and the cop took off in pursuit.</i> |
| <u>seduction</u> | An act of winning the love or sexual favor of someone. <i>The seductions of the mainland.</i> |
| spellbind | Put into a trance. <i>The singer held the audience spellbound.</i> |
| <u>tempt</u> | Dispose or incline or entice to. <i>We were tempted by the delicious looking food.</i> |
| <u>underline</u> | A line drawn underneath (especially under written matter). <i>The improvement in retail sales was underlined by these figures.</i> |
