hermit

A hummingbird found in the shady lower layers of tropical forests, foraging along a regular route.

Someone who dislikes people in general.

misanthrope *Scrooge wasn't the mean spirited **misanthrope** most of us believe him to be.*

outsider

Someone who is excluded from or is not a member of a group.

*To the **outsider** glitzy fashion shows may seem an outrageous extravagance.*

recluse

A person who lives a solitary life and tends to avoid other people.

*She has turned into a virtual **recluse**.*

solitary

One who lives in solitude.

*He had something of the **solitary** about him.*

invaginate Fold inwards.

Associations of "Introvert" (30 Words)

bashful	Disposed to avoid notice <i>blate</i> is a Scottish term for bashful. <i>Don t be bashful about telling folk how you feel.</i>
cagey	Characterized by great caution and wariness. <i>A cagey avoidance of a definite answer.</i>
coy	Modestly or warily rejecting approaches or overtures. <i>She treated him to a coy smile of invitation.</i>
demure	(of clothing) giving a modest appearance. <i>A demure young lady.</i>
diffident	Modest or shy because of a lack of self-confidence. <i>Stood in the doorway diffident and abashed.</i>
eschew	Deliberately avoid using; abstain from. <i>He appealed to the crowd to eschew violence.</i>
fainthearted	Lacking conviction or boldness or courage.

inarticulate	Not expressed in words. <i>Inarticulate beasts.</i>
<u>introspection</u>	The examination or observation of one's own mental and emotional processes. <i>Quiet introspection can be extremely valuable.</i>
<u>introspective</u>	Characterized by or given to introspection. <i>He grew withdrawn and introspective.</i>
introversion	The tendency to be concerned with one's own thoughts and feelings rather than with external things. <i>We expected our sample to show elevated neuroticism and introversion.</i>
introverted	Of, denoting, or typical of an introvert.
irresolute	Showing or feeling hesitancy; uncertain. <i>The committee was timid and mediocre and irresolute.</i>
lowliness	A position of inferior status; low in station or rank or fortune or estimation.
modesty	Formality and propriety of manner. <i>With typical modesty he insisted on sharing the credit with others.</i>
<u>passive</u>	The passive voice. <i>Much benevolence of the passive order may be traced to a disinclination to inflict pain upon oneself.</i>
passivity	Acceptance of what happens, without active response or resistance. <i>The perceived passivity of the populace is deceptive.</i>
personality	The complex of all the attributes-behavioral, temperamental, emotional and mental-that characterize a unique individual. <i>She is a Hollywood personality.</i>
<u>reclusive</u>	Withdrawn from society; seeking solitude. <i>Sitting under the reclusive calm of a shade tree.</i>
<u>reserved</u>	Marked by self-restraint and reticence-Victoria Sackville-West. <i>He is a reserved almost taciturn man.</i>
restrained	(of colour, decoration, etc.) not excessively showy or ornate; understated. <i>His restrained gentlemanly voice.</i>
<u>reticent</u>	Temperamentally disinclined to talk. <i>She was extremely reticent about her personal affairs.</i>
retiring	Not arrogant or presuming. <i>A gentle retiring person who avoided conflict.</i>

shy	(of a plant) not bearing flowers or fruit well or prolifically. <i>The shares are 29p shy of their flotation price.</i>
<u>taciturn</u>	Habitually reserved and uncommunicative. <i>After such gatherings she would be taciturn and morose.</i>
<u>timid</u>	Showing a lack of courage or confidence; easily frightened. <i>Whitewater rafting is not for the timid.</i>
timorous	Showing or suffering from nervousness or a lack of confidence. <i>A timorous voice.</i>
unassertive	Inclined to timidity or lack of self-confidence. <i>His bland and unassertive personal style.</i>
uncommunicative	Unwilling to talk or impart information. <i>The uncommunicative Emily disappeared.</i>
<u>withdrawn</u>	Withdrawn from society seeking solitude. <i>When her husband died she became very withdrawn.</i>
