| <b>impinge</b>             | Impinge or infringe upon.<br><i>Several factors <b>impinge</b> on market efficiency.</i>   |
| <b>incursion</b>           | An attack that penetrates into enemy territory.<br><i><b>Incursions</b> into enemy territory.</i>  |
| <a href="#">infringe</a>   | Actively break the terms of (a law, agreement, etc).<br><i>Such widespread surveillance could <b>infringe</b> personal liberties.</i>                            |
| <b>interfere</b>           | Of light or other electromagnetic waveforms interact to produce interference.<br><i>Light pulses <b>interfere</b> constructively in a fibre to emit a pulse.</i> |
| <b>interfering</b>         | (of a person) tending to interfere in other people’s affairs.<br><i><b>Interfering</b> busybodies.</i>   |
| <a href="#">interloper</a> | Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission.<br><i>To her I was always an outsider an <b>interloper</b>.</i>                   |
| <a href="#">intervene</a>  | Occur between other event or between certain points of time.<br><i>He acted outside his authority when he <b>intervened</b> in the dispute.</i>                  |

| <b><u>intrude</u></b>    | Enter unlawfully on someone's property.<br><i>To <b>intrude</b> political criteria into military decisions risks reducing efficiency.</i>  |
| <b><u>intruder</u></b>   | A person who intrudes, especially into a building with criminal intent.<br><i>The <b>intruder</b> had pulled out drawers and dumped their contents on the floor.</i>                 |
| <b><u>intrusion</u></b>  | The action of intruding.<br><i>He was furious about this <b>intrusion</b> into his private life.</i>   |
| <b><u>intrusive</u></b>  | (of a sound) pronounced between words or syllables to facilitate pronunciation, such as an r in saw a film.<br><i>Tourist attractions that are environmentally <b>intrusive</b>.</i> |
| <b>invasion</b>          | The act of invading; the act of an army that invades for conquest or plunder.<br><i>The tumor s <b>invasion</b> of surrounding structures.</i>                                       |
| <b>meddling</b>          | Intrusive in a meddling or offensive manner.<br><i>My mother s <b>meddlings</b> annoyed me.</i>  |
| <b>misdemeanor</b>       | A crime less serious than a felony.  |
| <b><u>oppressor</u></b>  | A person of authority who subjects others to undue pressures.<br><i>They overthrew their colonial <b>oppressors</b>.</i>   |
| <b><u>raid</u></b>       | Conduct a raid on.<br><i>Officers <b>raided</b> thirty homes yesterday.</i>  |
| <b><u>robber</u></b>     | A person who commits robbery.  |
| <b><u>transgress</u></b> | Act in disregard of laws, rules, contracts, or promises.<br><i>She had <b>transgressed</b> an unwritten social law.</i>  |
| <b>trespass</b>          | Enter someone's land or property without permission.<br><i>Don t <b>trespass</b> on my land.</i>   |
| <b>trespasser</b>        | A person entering someone's land or property without permission.<br><i>A <b>trespasser</b> on his land.</i>  |
| <b>usurpation</b>        | Entry to another's property without right or permission.<br><i>A succession of generals who ruled by <b>usurpation</b>.</i>  |
| <b>violate</b>           | Violate the sacred character of a place or language.<br><i>They <b>violated</b> the terms of a ceasefire.</i>  |
| <b><u>violation</u></b>  | A disrespectful act.<br><i>Flagrant <b>violations</b> of normal democratic procedure.</i>  |
| <b>violator</b>          | A person who breaks or fails to comply with a rule or formal agreement.<br><i>Monica is able to name the <b>violators</b> of her body.</i>   |
