## Synonyms of "Invading" as an adjective (2 Words)

**incursive** Involving invasion or aggressive attack.

**invasive** Gradually intrusive without right or permission.  
*The sound of the piano was **invasive**.*



## Associations of "Invading" (30 Words)

<b>attack</b>	The act of attacking. <i>Attacks on women increased last year.</i>
<b>breach</b>	An opening (especially a gap in a dike or fortification). <i>A <b>breach</b> of confidence.</i>
<b>busybody</b>	A person who meddles in the affairs of others. <i>Others considered him an interfering <b>busybody</b>.</i>
<b>encroach</b>	Impinge or infringe upon. <i>Rather than <b>encroach</b> on his privacy she might have kept to her room.</i>
<b>encroachment</b>	Entry to another's property without right or permission. <i>Urban <b>encroachment</b> of habitat.</i>
<b>impinge</b>	Impinge or infringe upon. <i>The gases <b>impinge</b> on the surface of the liquid.</i>

<b>incursion</b>	An invasion or attack, especially a sudden or brief one. <i><b>Incursions</b> into enemy territory.</i>
<b><u>infringe</u></b>	Actively break the terms of (a law, agreement, etc). <i>Making an unauthorized copy would <b>infringe</b> copyright.</i>
<b>interfere</b>	Of light or other electromagnetic waveforms interact to produce interference. <i>A holiday job would <b>interfere</b> with his studies.</i>
<b>interfering</b>	Intrusive in a meddling or offensive manner. <i>An <b>interfering</b> old woman.</i>
<b><u>interloper</u></b>	A person who becomes involved in a place or situation where they are not wanted or are considered not to belong. <i>To her I was always an outsider an <b>interloper</b>.</i>
<b><u>intervene</u></b>	Get involved, so as to alter or hinder an action, or through force or threat of force. <i>He acted outside his authority when he <b>intervened</b> in the dispute.</i>
<b><u>intrude</u></b>	Enter unlawfully on someone's property. <i>The granite may have <b>intruded</b> these rock layers.</i>
<b><u>intruder</u></b>	A person who intrudes, especially into a building with criminal intent. <i>The <b>intruder</b> had pulled out drawers and dumped their contents on the floor.</i>
<b><u>intrusion</u></b>	The forcing of molten rock into fissures or between strata of an earlier rock formation. <i>Villagers say the noise is an <b>intrusion</b> on their lives.</i>
<b><u>intrusive</u></b>	Tending to intrude (especially upon privacy). <i>That was an <b>intrusive</b> question.</i>
<b>invasion</b>	An instance of invading a country or region with an armed force. <i>In 1546 England had to be defended from <b>invasion</b>.</i>
<b>meddling</b>	Intrusive in a meddling or offensive manner. <i>Bureaucratic <b>meddling</b>.</i>
<b>misdemeanor</b>	A crime less serious than a felony.
<b><u>oppressor</u></b>	A person or group that oppresses people. <i>They overthrew their colonial <b>oppressors</b>.</i>
<b><u>raid</u></b>	Conduct a raid on. <i>A police <b>raid</b> on his home.</i>
<b><u>robber</u></b>	A person who commits robbery.
<b><u>transgress</u></b>	Spread over land, especially along a subsiding shoreline. <i>The sea <b>transgresses</b> along the West coast of the island.</i>

<b>trespass</b>	Enter unlawfully on someone's property. <i>Don't <b>trespass</b> on my land.</i>
<b>trespasser</b>	Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission. <i>A <b>trespasser</b> on his land.</i>
<b>usurpation</b>	Entry to another's property without right or permission. <i>A succession of generals who ruled by <b>usurpation</b>.</i>
<b>violate</b>	Violate the sacred character of a place or language. <i>They <b>violated</b> the terms of a ceasefire.</i>
<b><u>violation</u></b>	The action of violating someone or something. <i>The aircraft were in <b>violation</b> of UN resolutions.</i>
<b>violator</b>	Someone who violates the law. <i>Monica is able to name the <b>violators</b> of her body.</i>
<b><u>visitor</u></b>	A member of a sports team on tour or playing away from home. <i>The <b>visitors</b> came back into the game with two penalty goals.</i>
