Definitions of "Invading" as an adjective

Synonyms of "Invading" as an adjective (2 Words)

incursive Involving invasion or aggressive attack.

invasive Gradually intrusive without right or permission.
*The sound of the piano was **invasive**.*



Associations of "Invading" (30 Words)

attack	The act of attacking. <i>Attacks on women increased last year.</i>
breach	An opening (especially a gap in a dike or fortification). <i>A breach of confidence.</i>
busybody	A person who meddles in the affairs of others. <i>Others considered him an interfering busybody.</i>
encroach	Impinge or infringe upon. <i>Rather than encroach on his privacy she might have kept to her room.</i>
encroachment	Entry to another's property without right or permission. <i>Urban encroachment of habitat.</i>
impinge	Impinge or infringe upon. <i>The gases impinge on the surface of the liquid.</i>

incursion	An invasion or attack, especially a sudden or brief one. <i>Incursions into enemy territory.</i>
<u>infringe</u>	Actively break the terms of (a law, agreement, etc). <i>Making an unauthorized copy would infringe copyright.</i>
interfere	Of light or other electromagnetic waveforms interact to produce interference. <i>A holiday job would interfere with his studies.</i>
interfering	Intrusive in a meddling or offensive manner. <i>An interfering old woman.</i>
<u>interloper</u>	A person who becomes involved in a place or situation where they are not wanted or are considered not to belong. <i>To her I was always an outsider an interloper.</i>
<u>intervene</u>	Get involved, so as to alter or hinder an action, or through force or threat of force. <i>He acted outside his authority when he intervened in the dispute.</i>
<u>intrude</u>	Enter unlawfully on someone's property. <i>The granite may have intruded these rock layers.</i>
<u>intruder</u>	A person who intrudes, especially into a building with criminal intent. <i>The intruder had pulled out drawers and dumped their contents on the floor.</i>
<u>intrusion</u>	The forcing of molten rock into fissures or between strata of an earlier rock formation. <i>Villagers say the noise is an intrusion on their lives.</i>
<u>intrusive</u>	Tending to intrude (especially upon privacy). <i>That was an intrusive question.</i>
invasion	An instance of invading a country or region with an armed force. <i>In 1546 England had to be defended from invasion.</i>
meddling	Intrusive in a meddling or offensive manner. <i>Bureaucratic meddling.</i>
misdemeanor	A crime less serious than a felony.
<u>oppressor</u>	A person or group that oppresses people. <i>They overthrew their colonial oppressors.</i>
<u>raid</u>	Conduct a raid on. <i>A police raid on his home.</i>
<u>robber</u>	A person who commits robbery.
<u>transgress</u>	Spread over land, especially along a subsiding shoreline. <i>The sea transgresses along the West coast of the island.</i>

trespass	Enter unlawfully on someone's property. <i>Don't trespass on my land.</i>
trespasser	Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission. <i>A trespasser on his land.</i>
usurpation	Entry to another's property without right or permission. <i>A succession of generals who ruled by usurpation.</i>
violate	Violate the sacred character of a place or language. <i>They violated the terms of a ceasefire.</i>
violation	The action of violating someone or something. <i>The aircraft were in violation of UN resolutions.</i>
violator	Someone who violates the law. <i>Monica is able to name the violators of her body.</i>
visitor	A member of a sports team on tour or playing away from home. <i>The visitors came back into the game with two penalty goals.</i>
