<b>annul</b>	Declare invalid (an official agreement, decision, or result). <i>The contract was <b>annulled</b>.</i>
<b>avoid</b>	Stay clear from; keep away from; keep out of the way of someone or something. <i>Book early to <b>avoid</b> disappointment.</i>
<b><u>belie</u></b>	Represent falsely. <i>His lively alert manner <b>belied</b> his years.</i>

<b><u>disprove</u></b>	Prove that (something) is false. <i>He has given the Department of Transport two months to <b>disprove</b> the allegation.</i>
<b>drive a coach and horses through</b>	Work as a driver.
<b><u>explode</u></b>	Cause to burst as a result of air pressure; of stop consonants like /p/, /t/, and /k. <i>His anger <b>exploded</b>.</i>
<b><u>expose</u></b>	Expose while ridiculing especially of pretentious or false claims and ideas. <i>At low tide the sands are <b>exposed</b>.</i>
<b>gainsay</b>	Deny or contradict (a fact or statement). <i>None could <b>gainsay</b> her.</i>
<b>give the lie to</b>	Offer in good faith.
<b>knock the bottom out of</b>	Find fault with; express criticism of; point out real or perceived flaws.
<b>negate</b>	Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of. <i>This action will <b>negate</b> the effect of my efforts.</i>
<b><u>nullify</u></b>	Make legally null and void; invalidate. <i>Insulin can block the release of the hormone and thereby <b>nullify</b> the effects of training.</i>
<b><u>override</u></b>	Extend over; overlap. <i>The courts will ultimately <b>override</b> any objections.</i>
<b>overrule</b>	Rule against. <i>Chief Judge Moran <b>overruled</b> the government's objections.</i>
<b><u>overturn</u></b>	Cause to overturn from an upright or normal position. <i>The crowd proceeded to <b>overturn</b> cars and set them on fire.</i>
<b>prove to be false</b>	Establish the validity of something, as by an example, explanation or experiment.
<b>quash</b>	Reject as invalid, especially by legal procedure. <i>His conviction was <b>quashed</b> on appeal.</i>
<b>rebut</b>	Prove to be false or incorrect. <i>But he their sharp assault right boldly did <b>rebut</b>.</i>
<b><u>refute</u></b>	Prove to be false or incorrect. <i>A spokesman totally <b>refuted</b> the allegation of bias.</i>

- reverse**              Reverse the position order relation or condition of.  
*The damage done to the ozone layer may be **reversed**.*
- show to be false**      Indicate a place, direction, person, or thing; either spatially or figuratively.
- undo**                    Cause the downfall or ruin of.  
*I wish I could **undo** my actions.*
- veto**                     Exercise a veto against a decision or proposal.  
*The President **vetoed** the bill.*
- vitiate**                 Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality.  
*The insurance is **vitiated** because of foolish acts on the part of the tenant.*
- void**                    Excrete (waste matter).  
*The gases are usually **voided** into the mechanism.*

<b>abrogate</b>	Repeal or do away with (a law, right, or formal agreement). <i>A proposal to <b>abrogate</b> temporarily the right to strike.</i>
<b>abrogation</b>	The repeal or abolition of a law, right, or agreement.
<b><u>annihilate</u></b>	Kill in large numbers. <i>A fraction of the mass of atomic nuclei is <b>annihilated</b>.</i>
<b>annul</b>	Declare invalid. <i>The elections were <b>annulled</b> by the general amid renewed protests.</i>

<b>countermand</b>	Revoke or cancel (an order). <i>An order to arrest the strike leaders had been <b>countermanded</b>.</i>
<b><u>delete</u></b>	Remove (data) from a computer's memory. <i>Their EMI release has already been <b>deleted</b>.</i>
<b><u>deny</u></b>	Deny oneself something restrain especially from indulging in some pleasure. <i>The servants are ordered to <b>deny</b> him.</i>
<b><u>exterminate</u></b>	Destroy completely. <i>They use poison to <b>exterminate</b> moles.</i>
<b>negate</b>	Be in contradiction with. <i>This action will <b>negate</b> the effect of my efforts.</i>
<b><u>neutralize</u></b>	Get rid of (someone who may be a threat) by killing. <i>She <b>neutralized</b> the solution.</i>
<b><u>null</u></b>	Combine a signal with another in order to create a null cancel out. <i>His curiously <b>null</b> life.</i>

<b><u>override</u></b>	Counteract the normal operation of (an automatic gear shift in a vehicle). <i>Commission <b>overrides</b> give established carriers an unfair advantage.</i>

<b>prove</b>	Prove formally demonstrate by a mathematical formal proof. <i><b>Prove</b> a will.</i>
<b>reject</b>	Reject with contempt. <i>I <b>reject</b> the idea of starting a war.</i>
<b>repeal</b>	The act of abrogating; an official or legal cancellation. <i>The House voted in favour of <b>repeal</b>.</i>
<b>repudiation</b>	Refusal to fulfil or discharge an agreement, obligation, or debt. <i>The breach is not so serious as to amount to a <b>repudiation</b> of the whole contract.</i>
<b>rescind</b>	Cancel officially. <i>The government eventually <b>rescinded</b> the directive.</i>
<b>rescission</b>	The revocation, cancellation, or repeal of a law, order, or agreement. <i>The plaintiff agreed to the <b>rescission</b> of the agreement.</i>
<b>reversible</b>	Capable of being reversed. <i>A <b>reversible</b> jacket.</i>
<b>revocable</b>	Capable of being revoked or annulled. <i>A <b>revocable</b> settlement.</i>
<u><a href="#">revoke</a></u>	Officially cancel (a decree, decision, or promise). <i>He <b>revoked</b> the ban on smoking.</i>
<u><a href="#">substantiate</a></u>	Establish or strengthen as with new evidence or facts. <i>They had found nothing to <b>substantiate</b> the allegations.</i>
<b>terminate</b>	Terminate the employment of discharge from an office or position. <i>He was <b>terminated</b> by persons unknown.</i>
<u><a href="#">vacate</a></u>	Leave (a job, post, or position) voluntarily. <i>He <b>vacated</b> his office as Director.</i>
<b>verify</b>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i><b>Verify</b> a claim.</i>
