<b><u>forge</u></b>	A blacksmith's workshop; a smithy. <i>He <b>forged</b> a great suit of black armour.</i>
<b><u>formulate</u></b>	Put into words or an expression. <i>The argument is sufficiently clear that it can be <b>formulated</b> mathematically.</i>
<b>found</b>	Of art comprising or making use of found objects. <i><b>Found</b> art.</i>
<b>frontiersman</b>	A man who lives on the frontier.
<b>generate</b>	Bring into existence. <i>The computer <b>generated</b> this image.</i>

<b>generation</b>	The normal time between successive generations. <i>One of his <b>generation</b> s finest songwriters.</i>
<b>industry</b>	The organized action of making of goods and services for sale. <i>The kitchen became a hive of <b>industry</b>.</i>
