Inverted as an Adjective

Definitions of "Inverted" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “inverted” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a plant ovule) completely inverted; turned back 180 degrees on its stalk.*
- *Being in such a position that top and bottom are reversed.*



Synonyms of "Inverted" as an adjective (2 Words)

anatropous (of a plant ovule) completely inverted; turned back 180 degrees on its stalk.

upside-down Being in such a position that top and bottom are reversed.



Usage Examples of "Inverted" as an adjective

- A quotation mark is sometimes called an inverted comma.



Associations of "Inverted" (30 Words)

- backward** Having made less than normal progress.
*The decision was a **backward** step.*
- backwards** In a manner or order or direction the reverse of normal.
*Penny glanced **backwards**.*
- change** Change from one vehicle or transportation line to another.
*A **change** of socks.*
- converse** Turned about in order or relation.
*It will be difficult in these **converses** not to talk of secular matter.*
- countermand** Revoke or cancel an order issued by (another person).
*An order to arrest the strike leaders had been **countermanded**.*
- dramatic** Exciting or impressive.
*A **dramatic** entrance in a swirling cape.*

fend	Look after and provide for oneself, without any help from others. <i>The mountain climbers had to fend against the ice and snow.</i>
flip	Glib or flippant. <i>Flip me the beachball.</i>
funnel	Move or be guided through or as if through a funnel. <i>They were close to the middle of the cloud funnel.</i>
inverse	Opposite in nature or effect or relation to another quantity. <i>The age of such a universe is simply the inverse of the Hubble constant.</i>
inversion	A transformation in which each point of a given figure is replaced by another point on the same straight line from a fixed point especially in such a way that the product of the distances of the two points from the centre of inversion is constant. <i>The inversion of the normal domestic arrangement.</i>
obverse	Of or denoting the obverse of a coin or medal. <i>The obverse fates of the principals.</i>
opposite	Characterized by opposite extremes completely opposed. <i>The opposite ends of the price range.</i>
overturn	Cause to overturn from an upright or normal position. <i>He fought for eight years to overturn a conviction for armed robbery.</i>
rearrange	Change the position of. <i>Rearrange the furniture in my room.</i>
retrograde	Show retrograde motion. <i>Our history must retrograde for the space of a few pages.</i>
reversal	An unfortunate happening that hinders or impedes; something that is thwarting or frustrating. <i>A reversal by the House of Lords of the Court of Appeal's decision.</i>
reverse	A play in which a player reverses the direction of attack by passing the ball to a teammate moving in the opposite direction. <i>The trend appears to be going in the reverse direction.</i>
revolutionize	Fill with revolutionary ideas. <i>E mail revolutionized communication in academe.</i>
setback	An unfortunate happening that hinders or impedes; something that is thwarting or frustrating. <i>A serious setback for the peace process.</i>
shape	Give shape or form to. <i>Check that your structure will give shape to your essay.</i>
style	In an invertebrate a small slender pointed appendage a stylet. <i>The concerto is composed in a neoclassical style.</i>

<u>subvert</u>	Destroy completely. <i>We must not let our civil liberties be subverted by the current crisis.</i>
takeover	An act of assuming control of something, especially the buying out of one company by another. <i>They sought a controlling interest rather than a takeover.</i>
<u>text</u>	A text message. <i>Too much concentration on set texts can turn pupils against reading.</i>
transposition	(mathematics) the transfer of a quantity from one side of an equation to the other along with a change of sign. <i>He wrote a textbook on the electrical effects of transposition.</i>
turn	The act of turning away or in the opposite direction. <i>Turn a somersault.</i>
turnabout	A decision to reverse an earlier decision. <i>The move was a significant turnabout for the company.</i>
<u>turnaround</u>	The process of completing or the time needed to complete a task, especially one involving receiving something, processing it, and sending it out again. <i>A seven day turnaround.</i>
<u>vacate</u>	Leave (a job, post, or position) voluntarily. <i>He vacated his office as Director.</i>
