Synonyms of "Invigorate" as a verb (29 Words)

<u>animate</u>	Bring to life. <i>She has animated the government with a sense of political direction.</i>
<u>brace</u>	Support or hold steady and make steadfast with or as if with a brace. <i>Brace your elbows while working on the potter s wheel.</i>
electrify	Arouse a sudden sense of great excitement in; thrill. <i>Electrify an appliance.</i>
<u>energize</u>	Supply energy, typically kinetic or electrical energy, to (something). <i>Floor sensors are energized by standing passengers.</i>
energizing	Raise to a higher energy level.
<u>enliven</u>	Make (someone) more cheerful or animated. <i>The visit had clearly enlivened my mother.</i>
enlivening	Make lively.

exalt	Think or speak very highly of (someone or something). <i>Exalted the humble shoemaker to the rank of King's adviser.</i>
excite	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>Flying still excites me.</i>
exhilarate	Fill with sublime emotion. <i>She was exhilarated by the day's events.</i>
galvanize	Shock or excite (someone) into taking action. <i>Galvanized into action.</i>
inspire	Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts. <i>The lung cancer patient cannot inspire air very well.</i>
liven	Make or become more lively or interesting. <i>Let's liven up this room a bit.</i>
liven up	Raise.
motivate	Provide (someone) with a reason for doing something. <i>It is the teacher's job to motivate the child at school.</i>
perk up	Raise.
quicken	(of a fetus) begin to show signs of life. <i>I felt my pulse quicken.</i>
refresh	Refresh one's memory. <i>The cool water refreshed us.</i>
reinvigorate	Give new energy or strength to. <i>We are fully committed to reinvigorating the economy of the area.</i>
rejuvenate	Make younger or more youthful. <i>The land rejuvenated.</i>
rejuvenating	Make younger or more youthful.
revitalize	Restore strength. <i>A package of spending cuts to revitalize the economy.</i>
revitalizing	Restore strength.
revive	Restore interest in or the popularity of. <i>He revived this style of opera.</i>
reviving	Be brought back to life, consciousness, or strength.
rouse	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>She roused and looked around.</i>
stimulate	Stir feelings in. <i>The courses stimulate a passion for learning.</i>

vivify

Make more striking or animated.

*His remarks always **vivify** an otherwise dull story.*

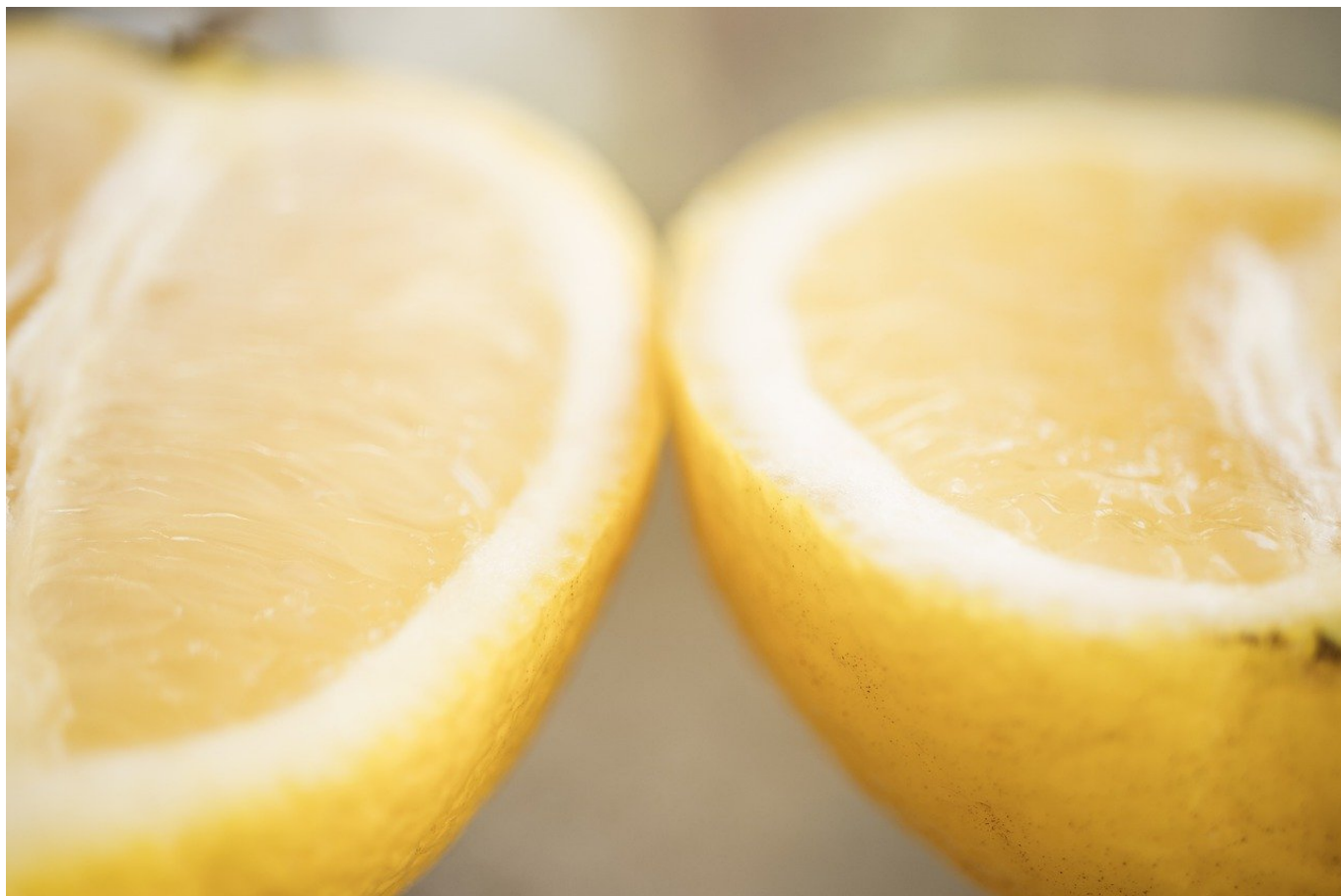
wake up

Arouse or excite feelings and passions.



Usage Examples of "Invigorate" as a verb

- *The shower had invigorated her.*
- *The cold water invigorated him.*



Associations of "Invigorate" (30 Words)

amuse	Make (somebody) laugh. <i>The clown amused the children.</i>
<u>animate</u>	Give (a film or character) the appearance of movement using animation techniques. <i>Gods in a wide variety of forms both animate and inanimate.</i>
catalyst	(chemistry) a substance that initiates or accelerates a chemical reaction without itself being affected. <i>The invasion acted as a catalyst to unite the country.</i>
<u>catalyze</u>	Change by catalysis or cause to catalyze.
<u>cheer</u>	Cause somebody to feel happier or more cheerful. <i>She cheered from the sidelines.</i>
elate	Fill with high spirits; fill with optimism. <i>While the wealth of wildlife elated me it unnerved me as well.</i>

<u>embolden</u>	Cause (a piece of text) to appear in a bold typeface. <i>Centre embolden and underline the heading.</i>
encourage	Contribute to the progress or growth of. <i>His financial success encouraged him to look for a wife.</i>
<u>enliven</u>	Make lively. <i>The visit had clearly enlivened my mother.</i>
<u>exhort</u>	Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts. <i>Come on you guys exhorted Linda.</i>
exuberance	Joyful enthusiasm. <i>A sense of youthful exuberance.</i>
gladden	Make glad or happy. <i>The high childish laugh was a sound that gladdened her heart.</i>
hearten	Make more cheerful or confident. <i>She was heartened to observe that the effect was faintly comic.</i>
impel	Drive forward; propel. <i>Vital energies impel him in unforeseen directions.</i>
<u>incite</u>	Encourage or stir up (violent or unlawful behaviour). <i>He incited loyal subjects to rebellion.</i>
inflame	Become inflamed get sore. <i>Comments that inflame what is already a sensitive situation.</i>
infuse	(of tea, herbs, etc.) release flavour or healing properties while being soaked. <i>Her work is infused with an anger born of pain and oppression.</i>
inspire	Serve as the inciting cause of. <i>The film was successful enough to inspire a sequel.</i>
<u>instigate</u>	Bring about or initiate (an action or event). <i>They instigated a reign of terror.</i>
<u>instill</u>	Teach and impress by frequent repetitions or admonitions. <i>Her presence instilled faith into the children.</i>
<u>invoke</u>	Call on (a deity or spirit) in prayer, as a witness, or for inspiration. <i>The antiquated defence of insanity is rarely invoked in England.</i>
joy	Feel happiness or joy. <i>A joy to behold.</i>
<u>motivate</u>	Give an incentive for action. <i>It is the teacher's job to motivate the child at school.</i>
motivation	Desire or willingness to do something; enthusiasm. <i>Escape can be a strong motivation for travel.</i>

pep	Liveliness and energy. <i>He was an enthusiastic player full of pep.</i>
rousing	The act of arousing. <i>A rousing speech.</i>
spur	Strike with a spur. <i>Her sons passion for computer games spurred her on to set up a software business.</i>
stimulate	Cause to occur rapidly. <i>The courses stimulate a passion for learning.</i>
urge	Recommend (something) strongly. <i>He urged her to come and stay with us.</i>
vitality	The property of being able to survive and grow. <i>The vitality of seeds.</i>
