<b><u>animate</u></b>	Bring to life. <i>She has <b>animated</b> the government with a sense of political direction.</i>
<b><u>brace</u></b>	Support or hold steady and make steadfast with or as if with a brace. <i><b>Brace</b> your elbows while working on the potter s wheel.</i>
<b>electrify</b>	Arouse a sudden sense of great excitement in; thrill. <i><b>Electrify</b> an appliance.</i>
<b><u>energize</u></b>	Supply energy, typically kinetic or electrical energy, to (something). <i>Floor sensors are <b>energized</b> by standing passengers.</i>
<b>energizing</b>	Raise to a higher energy level.
<b><u>enliven</u></b>	Make (someone) more cheerful or animated. <i>The visit had clearly <b>enlivened</b> my mother.</i>
<b>enlivening</b>	Make lively.

<b>exalt</b>	Think or speak very highly of (someone or something). <i><b>Exalted</b> the humble shoemaker to the rank of King's adviser.</i>
<b>excite</b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>Flying still <b>excites</b> me.</i>
<b>exhilarate</b>	Fill with sublime emotion. <i>She was <b>exhilarated</b> by the day's events.</i>
<b>galvanize</b>	Shock or excite (someone) into taking action. <i><b>Galvanized</b> into action.</i>
<b>inspire</b>	Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts. <i>The lung cancer patient cannot <b>inspire</b> air very well.</i>
<b>liven</b>	Make or become more lively or interesting. <i>Let's <b>liven</b> up this room a bit.</i>
<b>liven up</b>	Raise.
<b>motivate</b>	Provide (someone) with a reason for doing something. <i>It is the teacher's job to <b>motivate</b> the child at school.</i>
<b>perk up</b>	Raise.
<b>quicken</b>	(of a fetus) begin to show signs of life. <i>I felt my pulse <b>quicken</b>.</i>
<b>refresh</b>	Refresh one's memory. <i>The cool water <b>refreshed</b> us.</i>
<b>reinvigorate</b>	Give new energy or strength to. <i>We are fully committed to <b>reinvigorating</b> the economy of the area.</i>
<b>rejuvenate</b>	Make younger or more youthful. <i>The land <b>rejuvenated</b>.</i>
<b>rejuvenating</b>	Make younger or more youthful.
<b>revitalize</b>	Restore strength. <i>A package of spending cuts to <b>revitalize</b> the economy.</i>
<b>revitalizing</b>	Restore strength.
<b>revive</b>	Restore interest in or the popularity of. <i>He <b>revived</b> this style of opera.</i>
<b>reviving</b>	Be brought back to life, consciousness, or strength.
<b>rouse</b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>She <b>roused</b> and looked around.</i>
<b>stimulate</b>	Stir feelings in. <i>The courses <b>stimulate</b> a passion for learning.</i>

**vivify**

Make more striking or animated.

*His remarks always **vivify** an otherwise dull story.*

**wake up**

Arouse or excite feelings and passions.

<b>amuse</b>	Make (somebody) laugh. <i>The clown <b>amused</b> the children.</i>
<b><u>animate</u></b>	Give (a film or character) the appearance of movement using animation techniques. <i>Gods in a wide variety of forms both <b>animate</b> and <b>inanimate</b>.</i>
<b>catalyst</b>	(chemistry) a substance that initiates or accelerates a chemical reaction without itself being affected. <i>The invasion acted as a <b>catalyst</b> to unite the country.</i>
<b><u>catalyze</u></b>	Change by catalysis or cause to catalyze.
<b><u>cheer</u></b>	Cause somebody to feel happier or more cheerful. <i>She <b>cheered</b> from the sidelines.</i>
<b>elate</b>	Fill with high spirits; fill with optimism. <i>While the wealth of wildlife <b>elated</b> me it unnerved me as well.</i>



<b><u>embolden</u></b>	Cause (a piece of text) to appear in a bold typeface. <i>Centre <b>embolden</b> and underline the heading.</i>
<b>encourage</b>	Contribute to the progress or growth of. <i>His financial success <b>encouraged</b> him to look for a wife.</i>
<b><u>enliven</u></b>	Make lively. <i>The visit had clearly <b>enlivened</b> my mother.</i>
<b><u>exhort</u></b>	Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts. <i>Come on you guys <b>exhorted</b> Linda.</i>
<b>exuberance</b>	Joyful enthusiasm. <i>A sense of youthful <b>exuberance</b>.</i>
<b>gladden</b>	Make glad or happy. <i>The high childish laugh was a sound that <b>gladdened</b> her heart.</i>
<b>hearten</b>	Make more cheerful or confident. <i>She was <b>heartened</b> to observe that the effect was faintly comic.</i>
<b>impel</b>	Drive forward; propel. <i>Vital energies <b>impel</b> him in unforeseen directions.</i>
<b><u>incite</u></b>	Encourage or stir up (violent or unlawful behaviour). <i>He <b>incited</b> loyal subjects to rebellion.</i>
<b>inflame</b>	Become inflamed get sore. <i>Comments that <b>inflame</b> what is already a sensitive situation.</i>
<b>infuse</b>	(of tea, herbs, etc.) release flavour or healing properties while being soaked. <i>Her work is <b>infused</b> with an anger born of pain and oppression.</i>
<b>inspire</b>	Serve as the inciting cause of. <i>The film was successful enough to <b>inspire</b> a sequel.</i>
<b><u>instigate</u></b>	Bring about or initiate (an action or event). <i>They <b>instigated</b> a reign of terror.</i>
<b><u>instill</u></b>	Teach and impress by frequent repetitions or admonitions. <i>Her presence <b>instilled</b> faith into the children.</i>
<b><u>invoke</u></b>	Call on (a deity or spirit) in prayer, as a witness, or for inspiration. <i>The antiquated defence of insanity is rarely <b>invoked</b> in England.</i>
<b>joy</b>	Feel happiness or joy. <i>A <b>joy</b> to behold.</i>
<b><u>motivate</u></b>	Give an incentive for action. <i>It is the teacher's job to <b>motivate</b> the child at school.</i>
<b>motivation</b>	Desire or willingness to do something; enthusiasm. <i>Escape can be a strong <b>motivation</b> for travel.</i>

<b>pep</b>	Liveliness and energy. <i>He was an enthusiastic player full of <b>pep</b>.</i>
<b>rousing</b>	The act of arousing. <i>A <b>rousing</b> speech.</i>
<b>spur</b>	Strike with a spur. <i>Her sons passion for computer games <b>spurred</b> her on to set up a software business.</i>
<b>stimulate</b>	Cause to occur rapidly. <i>The courses <b>stimulate</b> a passion for learning.</i>
<b>urge</b>	Recommend (something) strongly. <i>He <b>urged</b> her to come and stay with us.</i>
