- *Difficult to understand; complicated.*

## Synonyms of "Involved" as an adjective (10 Words)

<b>byzantine</b>	Highly complex or intricate and occasionally devious.
<b>complex</b>	Consisting of many different and connected parts. <i>A <b>complex</b> set of variations based on a simple folk melody.</i>
<b>complicated</b>	Involving many different and confusing aspects. <i>A <b>complicated</b> stereo system.</i>
<b>convoluted</b>	Intricately folded, twisted, or coiled. <i>The film is let down by a <b>convoluted</b> plot in which nothing really happens.</i>
<b>elaborate</b>	(of an action) lengthy and exaggerated. <i>The carefully <b>elaborated</b> theme.</i>
<b>intricate</b>	Very complicated or detailed. <i><b>Intricate</b> lacework.</i>



<b>knotty</b>	Highly complex or intricate and occasionally devious. <i>A <b>knotty</b> legal problem.</i>
<b>mired</b>	Entangled or hindered as if e.g. in mire. <i>Brilliant leadership <b>mired</b> in details and confusion.</i>
<u>tangled</u>	Twisted together untidily; matted. <i>The <b>tangled</b> ropes.</i>
<u>tortuous</u>	Marked by repeated turns and bends. <i>A <b>tortuous</b> argument.</i>



### Usage Examples of "Involved" as an adjective

- *Everyone involved in the bribery case has been identified.*
- *The problems involved.*
- *I don't want to get involved.*
- *A long, involved conversation.*
- *A castle involved in mist.*



- *The plot was too involved.*
- *The difficulties in which the question is involved.*
- *The involved muscles.*
- *We accomplished nothing, simply because of the large number of people involved.*



## Associations of "Involved" (30 Words)

- affect** Have an emotional or cognitive impact upon.  
*Will the new rules **affect** me.*
- allegedly** Used to convey that something is claimed to be the case or have taken place, although there is no proof.  
***Allegedly** obscene material.*

<b>attached</b>	Married or having an established romantic or sexual partner; not single. <i>A ground floor bedroom with a toilet <b>attached</b>.</i>
<b>bribe</b>	A sum of money or other inducement offered or given to bribe someone. <i>They had <b>bribed</b> an official to sell them a certificate.</i>
<b>committed</b>	Pledged or bound to a certain course or policy; dedicated. <i><b>Committed</b> church members.</i>
<b>connection</b>	A link between two phones. <i>We had to wait for our <b>connection</b> to Frankfurt.</i>
<b>conspire</b>	Make secret plans jointly to commit an unlawful or harmful act. <i>They <b>conspired</b> to overthrow the government.</i>
<b>contain</b>	Be capable of holding or containing. <i>Since <b>F contains</b> the factor Q it disappears from both sides of the equation.</i>
<b>correlate</b>	To bear a reciprocal or mutual relation. <i>The study found that success in the educational system <b>correlates</b> highly with class.</i>
<b>correlated</b>	Mutually related.
<b>embedded</b>	Enclosed firmly in a surrounding mass. <i>Confused by the <b>embedded</b> Latin quotations.</i>
<b>enclosed</b>	(of a religious order or other community) secluded from the outside world. <i>A Mother Superior in an <b>enclosed</b> order.</i>
<b>encompass</b>	Include in scope; include as part of something broader; have as one's sphere or territory. <i>This group <b>encompasses</b> a wide range of people from different backgrounds.</i>
<b>entail</b>	The act of entailing property the creation of a fee tail from a fee simple. <i>I cannot get rid of the disgrace which you have <b>entailed</b> upon us.</i>
<b>entangle</b>	Involve (someone) in difficulties or complicated circumstances from which it is difficult to escape. <i>The child <b>entangled</b> the cord.</i>
<b>guesswork</b>	An estimate based on little or no information. <i>Answering this question will involve you in a certain amount of <b>guesswork</b>.</i>
<b>implicate</b>	Bear some of the responsibility for (an action or process, especially a criminal or harmful one). <i>Viruses are known to be <b>implicated</b> in the development of certain cancers.</i>
<b>implicated</b>	Culpably involved. <i>An innocent person <b>implicated</b> by circumstances in a crime.</i>
<b>include</b>	Have as a part, be made up out of. <i>Other changes <b>included</b> the abolition of the death penalty.</i>

<b>included</b>	Enclosed in the same envelope or package. <i>Service tax <b>included</b>.</i>
<b>incorporate</b>	Take in or contain (something) as part of a whole; include. <i>He has <b>incorporated</b> in his proposals a number of measures.</i>
<b><u>indirectly</u></b>	Without having had direct experience; at second hand. <i>Both writers refer if only <b>indirectly</b> to a wealth of other art.</i>
<b><u>involve</u></b>	Contain as a part. <i>Her husband had been very <b>involved</b> in his work.</i>
<b>linked</b>	Connected by a link, as railway cars or trailer trucks.
<b><u>pertain</u></b>	Be a part or attribute of. <i>My remark <b>pertained</b> to your earlier comments.</i>
<b>positively</b>	So as to be positive; in a positive manner. <i>This is <b>positively</b> the last word on the matter.</i>
<b>referent</b>	Something referred to; the object of a reference. <i>Judgments <b>referent</b> to the indictment.</i>
<b><u>relate</u></b>	Be causally connected. <i>High unemployment is <b>related</b> to high crime rates.</i>
<b>related</b>	Connected by kinship, common origin, or marriage. <i>School <b>related</b> activities.</i>
<b>subjectivity</b>	The quality of existing in someone's mind rather than the external world. <i>In the writing of history there is a degree of <b>subjectivity</b>.</i>
