Definitions of "Involved" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “involved” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Enveloped.*
- *Entangled or hindered as if e.g. in mire.*
- *Emotionally involved.*
- *Connected by participation or association or use.*
- *Difficult to understand; complicated.*
- *Highly complex or intricate and occasionally devious.*

knotty	Highly complex or intricate and occasionally devious. <i>A knotty legal problem.</i>
mired	Entangled or hindered as if e.g. in mire. <i>Brilliant leadership mired in details and confusion.</i>
tangled	Twisted together untidily; matted. <i>The tangled ropes.</i>
tortuous	Marked by repeated turns and bends. <i>A tortuous argument.</i>



Usage Examples of "Involved" as an adjective

- *Everyone involved in the bribery case has been identified.*
- *The problems involved.*
- *I don't want to get involved.*
- *A long, involved conversation.*
- *A castle involved in mist.*

- *The plot was too involved.*
- *The difficulties in which the question is involved.*
- *The involved muscles.*
- *We accomplished nothing, simply because of the large number of people involved.*



Associations of "Involved" (30 Words)

- affect** Have an emotional or cognitive impact upon.
*Will the new rules **affect** me.*
- allegedly** Used to convey that something is claimed to be the case or have taken place, although there is no proof.
***Allegedly** obscene material.*

attached	Married or having an established romantic or sexual partner; not single. <i>A ground floor bedroom with a toilet attached.</i>
bribe	A sum of money or other inducement offered or given to bribe someone. <i>They had bribed an official to sell them a certificate.</i>
committed	Pledged or bound to a certain course or policy; dedicated. <i>Committed church members.</i>
connection	A link between two phones. <i>We had to wait for our connection to Frankfurt.</i>
conspire	Make secret plans jointly to commit an unlawful or harmful act. <i>They conspired to overthrow the government.</i>
contain	Be capable of holding or containing. <i>Since F contains the factor Q it disappears from both sides of the equation.</i>
correlate	To bear a reciprocal or mutual relation. <i>The study found that success in the educational system correlates highly with class.</i>
correlated	Mutually related.
embedded	Enclosed firmly in a surrounding mass. <i>Confused by the embedded Latin quotations.</i>
enclosed	(of a religious order or other community) secluded from the outside world. <i>A Mother Superior in an enclosed order.</i>
encompass	Include in scope; include as part of something broader; have as one's sphere or territory. <i>This group encompasses a wide range of people from different backgrounds.</i>
entail	The act of entailing property the creation of a fee tail from a fee simple. <i>I cannot get rid of the disgrace which you have entailed upon us.</i>
entangle	Involve (someone) in difficulties or complicated circumstances from which it is difficult to escape. <i>The child entangled the cord.</i>
guesswork	An estimate based on little or no information. <i>Answering this question will involve you in a certain amount of guesswork.</i>
implicate	Bear some of the responsibility for (an action or process, especially a criminal or harmful one). <i>Viruses are known to be implicated in the development of certain cancers.</i>
implicated	Culpably involved. <i>An innocent person implicated by circumstances in a crime.</i>
include	Have as a part, be made up out of. <i>Other changes included the abolition of the death penalty.</i>

included	Enclosed in the same envelope or package. <i>Service tax included.</i>
incorporate	Take in or contain (something) as part of a whole; include. <i>He has incorporated in his proposals a number of measures.</i>
indirectly	Without having had direct experience; at second hand. <i>Both writers refer if only indirectly to a wealth of other art.</i>
involve	Contain as a part. <i>Her husband had been very involved in his work.</i>
linked	Connected by a link, as railway cars or trailer trucks.
pertain	Be a part or attribute of. <i>My remark pertained to your earlier comments.</i>
positively	So as to be positive; in a positive manner. <i>This is positively the last word on the matter.</i>
referent	Something referred to; the object of a reference. <i>Judgments referent to the indictment.</i>
relate	Be causally connected. <i>High unemployment is related to high crime rates.</i>
related	Connected by kinship, common origin, or marriage. <i>School related activities.</i>
subjectivity	The quality of existing in someone's mind rather than the external world. <i>In the writing of history there is a degree of subjectivity.</i>
