Involvement as a Noun

Definitions of "Involvement" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “involvement” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A connection of inclusion or containment.*
- *Emotional or personal association with someone.*
- *A sense of concern with and curiosity about someone or something.*
- *The fact or condition of being involved with or participating in something.*
- *The condition of sharing in common with others (as fellows or partners etc.*
- *The act of sharing in the activities of a group.*
- *A usually secretive or illicit sexual relationship.*



Synonyms of "Involvement" as a noun (15 Words)

action	The events represented in a story or play. <i>She frequently questioned his actions.</i>
affair	A usually secretive or illicit sexual relationship. <i>It is none of your affair.</i>
affaire	A love affair.
amour	A usually secretive or illicit sexual relationship. <i>He is enraged at this revelation of his past amours.</i>
attachment	The act of attaching or affixing something. <i>Attachment to a formal agenda.</i>
connection	The act of bringing two things into contact (especially for communication). <i>Ferry connections are sporadic in the low season.</i>
engagement	A formal agreement to get married. <i>The teacher tried to increase his students engagement in class activities.</i>

entanglement	An extensive barrier, typically made of barbed wire and stakes, erected to impede enemy soldiers or vehicles. <i>The attackers were caught up on wire entanglements.</i>
friendship	The state of being friends (or friendly). <i>She formed close friendships with women.</i>
hand	A person's handwriting. <i>Hand signals.</i>
interest	The selfish pursuit of one's own welfare self interest. <i>How much interest do you pay on your mortgage.</i>
intimacy	A usually secretive or illicit sexual relationship. <i>He acquired an intimacy with Swahili literature.</i>
involution	The shrinkage of an organ in old age or when inactive, e.g. of the uterus after childbirth. <i>Periods of artistic involution.</i>
liaison	(in French and other languages) the sounding of a consonant that is normally silent at the end of a word, because the next word begins with a vowel. <i>The head porter works in close liaison with the reception office.</i>
participation	The action of taking part in something. <i>Participation in chapel activities.</i>



Usage Examples of "Involvement" as a noun

- *He escaped involvement in the accident.*
- *There was additional involvement of the liver and spleen.*
- *US officials produced evidence of his involvement in drug trafficking.*
- *She knew that involvement with Adam would only complicate her life.*

- affair** Matters of public interest and importance.
*The party was quite an **affair**.*
- ambient** Relating to ambient music.
***Ambient** sound.*
- amour** A love affair or lover, especially one that is secret.
*He is enraged at this revelation of his past **amours**.*
- approximate** Located close together.
*The **approximate** time was 10 o'clock.*
- around** All around or on all sides.
*Waited **around** for the next flight.*
- bigamist** Someone who marries one person while already legally married to another.

cheat	An act of cheating a fraud or deception. <i>We were cheated by their clever sounding scheme.</i>
<u>closeness</u>	A feeling of being intimate and belonging together. <i>The geographical closeness of our two countries.</i>
conjugal	Relating to marriage or the relationship between a married couple. <i>Conjugal loyalty.</i>
connected	Associated or related in some respect. <i>All the window alarms are connected.</i>
contact	Contact lenses. <i>The sliding contact of the potentiometer.</i>
diplomacy	Negotiation between nations. <i>An extensive round of diplomacy in the Middle East.</i>
elaboration	The result of improving something. <i>His work led to the elaboration of a theory of evolution.</i>
<u>familiar</u>	Often encountered or experienced; common. <i>She had not realized they were on such familiar terms.</i>
<u>familiarity</u>	An act of undue intimacy. <i>The reassuring familiarity of his parents home.</i>
intimacy	Sexual intercourse. <i>He acquired an intimacy with Swahili literature.</i>
involution	The process of raising a quantity to some assigned power. <i>Periods of artistic involution.</i>
<u>liaison</u>	The binding or thickening agent of a sauce, often based on egg yolks. <i>He s our liaison with a number of interested parties.</i>
<u>link</u>	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>The cows are linked up to milking machines.</i>
meddle	Interfere in something that is not one's concern. <i>Don t meddle in my affairs.</i>
nearness	The spatial property resulting from a relatively small distance. <i>The town s nearness to London.</i>
participation	The action of taking part in something. <i>Participation in chapel activities.</i>
philanderer	A man who likes many women and has short sexual relationships with them. <i>He was known as a philanderer.</i>
<u>proximity</u>	The region close around a person or thing. <i>Do not operate microphones in close proximity to television sets.</i>

- rendezvous** Meet at a rendezvous.
*You'd be welcome to use this place as a **rendezvous**.*
- scandal** Rumour or malicious gossip about scandalous events or actions.
*I know that you would want no **scandal** attached to her name.*
- secular** A secular priest.
***Secular** buildings.*
- sociality** The tendency to associate with others and to form social groups.
*Mammals as a class are not strong on **sociality**.*
- tamper** A machine or tool for tamping down earth or ballast.
*Someone **tampered** with the documents on my desk.*
