irrational number A real number that cannot be expressed as a rational number.

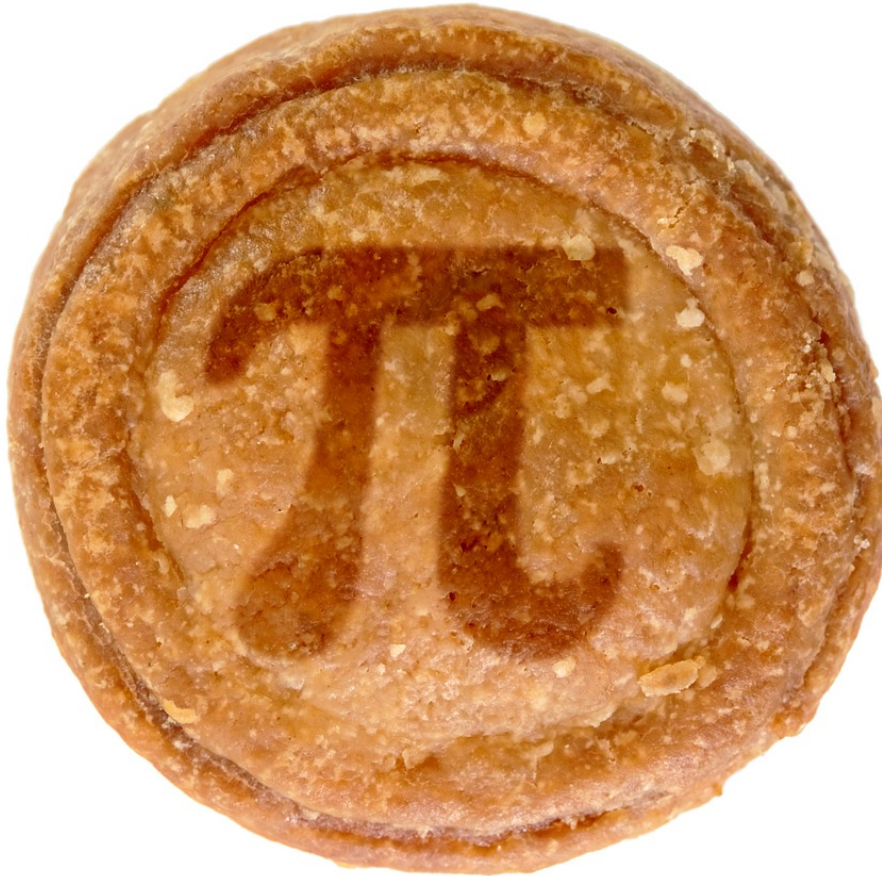


Irrational as an Adjective

Definitions of "Irrational" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "irrational" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Not logical or reasonable.*
- *Not consistent with or using reason.*
- *Not endowed with the power of reason.*
- *(of a number, quantity, or expression) not expressible as a ratio of two integers, and having an infinite and non-recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal. Examples of irrational numbers are the number π and the square root of 2.*
- *Real but not expressible as the quotient of two integers.*



Synonyms of "Irrational" as an adjective (7 Words)

baseless	Without foundation in fact. <i>Baseless allegations.</i>
groundless	Not based on any good reason. <i>The allegations proved groundless.</i>
illogical	Lacking in correct logical relation. <i>An illogical fear of the supernatural.</i>
<u>unfounded</u>	Having no foundation or basis in fact. <i>Her fear that she had cancer was unfounded.</i>
<u>unjustifiable</u>	Not able to be shown to be right or reasonable. <i>An unjustifiable restriction on their freedom.</i>

- unreasonable** Beyond the limits of acceptability or fairness.
*She knew she was being **unreasonable** but she resented his domesticity.*
- unsound** Physically unsound or diseased.
*This line of argument is **unsound**.*

- absurd** An absurd state of affairs.
*The incidents that followed bordered on the **absurd**.*
- absurdity** The quality or state of being ridiculous or wildly unreasonable.
*The crowd laughed at the **absurdity** of the clown's behavior.*
- disordered** Not arranged in order.
*She went to comb her **disordered** hair.*
- foolish** Devoid of good sense or judgment.
*He was **foolish** enough to confide in her.*
- funny** Experiencing odd bodily sensations.
*Up to some **funny** business.*
- garbled** Lacking orderly continuity.
*I got a **garbled** set of directions.*
- illogical** Lacking orderly continuity.
*An **illogical** fear of the supernatural.*
- inadvisable** Not prudent or wise; not recommended.
*Running on the ice is **inadvisable**.*
- incoherent** Not logical or internally consistent.
***Incoherent** with grief.*
- incongruent** (of melting, dissolution, or other process) affecting the components of an alloy or other substance differently.
- incongruity** The quality of disagreeing; being unsuitable and inappropriate.
*The **incongruity** of his fleshy face and skinny body disturbed her.*

<u>incongruous</u>	Not in harmony or keeping with the surroundings or other aspects of something. <i>The duffel coat looked incongruous with the black dress she wore underneath.</i>
indefensible	Not justifiable by argument. <i>The towns were tactically indefensible.</i>
inexcusable	Too bad to be justified or tolerated. <i>Matt s behaviour was inexcusable.</i>
injudicious	Showing very poor judgement; unwise. <i>An injudicious measure.</i>
<u>inordinate</u>	Unusually or disproportionately large; excessive. <i>A book of inordinate length.</i>
<u>ludicrous</u>	Broadly or extravagantly humorous; resembling farce. <i>Every night he wore a ludicrous outfit.</i>
<u>nonsense</u>	Spoken or written words that have no meaning or make no sense. <i>He was talking absolute nonsense.</i>
prattle	Talk at length in a foolish or inconsequential way. <i>She began to prattle on about her visit to the dentist.</i>
preposterous	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>A preposterous suggestion.</i>
ridiculous	Deserving or inviting derision or mockery; absurd. <i>That ridiculous tartan cap.</i>
silly	Dazed from or as if from repeated blows. <i>Don t be silly she said.</i>
<u>superstitious</u>	Having or showing a belief in superstitions. <i>Many superstitious beliefs and practices are connected with sneezing.</i>
<u>unfounded</u>	Having no foundation or basis in fact. <i>Her fear that she had cancer was unfounded.</i>
<u>unjustifiable</u>	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>An unjustifiable restriction on their freedom.</i>
<u>unjustified</u>	Lacking justification or authorization. <i>Unjustified price increases.</i>
<u>unreasonable</u>	Beyond normal limits. <i>An unreasonable request.</i>
<u>untenable</u>	(of theories etc) incapable of being defended or justified. <i>This argument is clearly untenable.</i>

unwarranted Lacking justification or authorization.
***Unwarranted** jealousy.*

unwise Showing or resulting from lack of judgment or wisdom.
*An **unwise** investor is soon impoverished.*
