

English verbs can be either regular or irregular. The difference between them is the formation of the <u>Past Simple</u> and <u>Past Participle</u> forms. Regular verbs are consistent — their past simple and past participle always end in -*ed*. While, in contrast, irregular verbs can end in a variety of ways, with absolutely no consistent pattern. Here's a list of most common English irregular verbs:
