<b><u>immaculate</u></b>	Free from flaws or mistakes; perfect. <i>Timing and technique were <b>immaculate</b>.</i>
<b>impeccable</b>	Not liable to sin. <i>He had <b>impeccable</b> manners.</i>
<b>inculpable</b>	Free of guilt; not subject to blame.
<b>meritorious</b>	(of an action or claim) likely to succeed on the merits of the case. <i>A lifetime of <b>meritorious</b> service.</i>
<b>model</b>	Worthy of imitation. <i><b>Model</b> citizens.</i>
<b>outstanding</b>	Not yet paid, resolved, or dealt with. <i>The team's <b>outstanding</b> performance.</i>
<b>perfect</b>	Of a tense denoting a completed action or a state or habitual action which began in the past The perfect tense is formed in English with have or has and the past participle as in they have eaten and they have been eating present perfect they had eaten past perfect and they will have eaten future perfect. <i>A <b>perfect</b> stranger.</i>
<b>unimpeachable</b>	Completely acceptable; not open to exception or reproach. <i>An <b>unimpeachable</b> witness.</i>

<b>guilt</b>	Make someone feel guilty especially in order to induce them to do something. <i>Celeste had been <b>guilted</b> into going by her parents.</i>
<b>guiltless</b>	Free from evil or guilt. <i>People are forever criticizing the service and I am not myself <b>guiltless</b> in this.</i>
<b>harmless</b>	Not causing or capable of causing harm. <i><b>Harmless</b> bacteria.</i>
<b>infallible</b>	Incapable of making mistakes or being wrong. <i>The Catholic Church considers the Pope <b>infallible</b>.</i>
<b>innocence</b>	The quality of innocent naivete. <i>They must prove their <b>innocence</b>.</i>
<b>innocent</b>	Without experience or knowledge of. <i>The principle that one is <b>innocent</b> until proved guilty.</i>
<b>innocuous</b>	Not harmful or offensive. <i>It was an <b>innocuous</b> remark.</i>

<b>inoffensive</b>	Not objectionable or harmful. <i>A shy <b>inoffensive</b> and sensitive girl.</i>
<b>naivete</b>	Innocence or unsophistication. <i>His greatest fault was his political naïvet.</i>
<b>naturalness</b>	The quality of innocent naivete. <i>She demonstrates an ease and <b>naturalness</b> that many actors try hard to project.</i>
<b><u>pristine</u></b>	In its original condition; unspoilt. <i>Handed her his <b>pristine</b> white handkerchief.</i>
<b>profess</b>	Teach a subject as a professor. <i>He <b>professes</b> to be a Communist.</i>
<b><u>pure</u></b>	Of color being chromatically pure not diluted with white or grey or black. <i><b>Pure</b> air and water.</i>
<b>purist</b>	A person who insists on absolute adherence to traditional rules or structures, especially in language or style. <i><b>Purist</b> fans of the original comic strip.</i>
<b><u>purity</u></b>	A woman's virtue or chastity. <i>White roses represent <b>purity</b> and innocence.</i>
<b><u>sheer</u></b>	Cause to sheer. <i><b>Sheer</b> wine.</i>
<b>sinless</b>	Free from sin. <i>The <b>sinless</b> life of Christ.</i>
<b>unexceptionable</b>	Completely acceptable; not open to exception or reproach. <i>The <b>unexceptionable</b> belief that society should be governed by law.</i>
<b>unimpeachable</b>	Beyond doubt or reproach. <i>An <b>unimpeachable</b> reputation.</i>
