blameless	Free of guilt; not subject to blame. <i>He led a blameless life.</i>
consummate	Having or revealing supreme mastery or skill. <i>Consummate skill.</i>
copybook	Exactly in accordance with established criteria; perfect. <i>It wasn't exactly a copybook landing.</i>
exceptional	Unusual; not typical. <i>An exceptional memory.</i>

<u>exemplary</u>	Serving to warn. <i>An exemplary jail sentence.</i>
honourable	Worthy of being honored; entitled to honor and respect. <i>This is the only honourable course.</i>
ideal	Conforming to an ultimate standard of perfection or excellence embodying an ideal. <i>A poem or essay may be typical of its period in idea or ideal content.</i>
<u>immaculate</u>	Free from flaws or mistakes; perfect. <i>Timing and technique were immaculate.</i>
impeccable	Not liable to sin. <i>He had impeccable manners.</i>
inculpable	Free of guilt; not subject to blame.
meritorious	(of an action or claim) likely to succeed on the merits of the case. <i>A lifetime of meritorious service.</i>
model	Worthy of imitation. <i>Model citizens.</i>
outstanding	Not yet paid, resolved, or dealt with. <i>The team's outstanding performance.</i>
perfect	Of a tense denoting a completed action or a state or habitual action which began in the past The perfect tense is formed in English with have or has and the past participle as in they have eaten and they have been eating present perfect they had eaten past perfect and they will have eaten future perfect. <i>A perfect stranger.</i>
unimpeachable	Completely acceptable; not open to exception or reproach. <i>An unimpeachable witness.</i>

acquit	Discharge (a duty or responsibility). <i>They acquitted themselves of their charge with vigilance.</i>

angel	A former English coin minted between the reigns of Edward IV and Charles I and bearing the figure of the archangel Michael killing a dragon. <i>There was an angel watching over me.</i>
blameless	Free of guilt; not subject to blame. <i>Has lived a blameless life.</i>
chastity	The state or practice of refraining from extramarital, or especially from all, sexual intercourse. <i>Vows of chastity.</i>
cherub	A representation of a cherub in Western art depicted as a chubby healthy looking child with wings. <i>A wistful cherub of eighteen months photographed at her playgroup.</i>
clean	Be cleanable. <i>A clean throw.</i>
downright	Complete and without restriction or qualification; sometimes used informally as intensifiers. <i>A downright kind of person.</i>
exoneration	The release of someone from a duty or obligation. <i>The defendants eventual exoneration.</i>
flawless	Without any imperfections or defects; perfect. <i>Her smooth flawless skin.</i>
guilt	Make someone feel guilty especially in order to induce them to do something. <i>Celeste had been guilted into going by her parents.</i>
guiltless	Free from evil or guilt. <i>People are forever criticizing the service and I am not myself guiltless in this.</i>
harmless	Not causing or capable of causing harm. <i>Harmless bacteria.</i>
infallible	Incapable of making mistakes or being wrong. <i>The Catholic Church considers the Pope infallible.</i>
innocence	The quality of innocent naivete. <i>They must prove their innocence.</i>
innocent	Without experience or knowledge of. <i>The principle that one is innocent until proved guilty.</i>
innocuous	Not harmful or offensive. <i>It was an innocuous remark.</i>

inoffensive	Not objectionable or harmful. <i>A shy inoffensive and sensitive girl.</i>
naivete	Innocence or unsophistication. <i>His greatest fault was his political naïvet.</i>
naturalness	The quality of innocent naivete. <i>She demonstrates an ease and naturalness that many actors try hard to project.</i>
<u>pristine</u>	In its original condition; unspoilt. <i>Handed her his pristine white handkerchief.</i>
profess	Teach a subject as a professor. <i>He professes to be a Communist.</i>
<u>pure</u>	Of color being chromatically pure not diluted with white or grey or black. <i>Pure air and water.</i>
purist	A person who insists on absolute adherence to traditional rules or structures, especially in language or style. <i>Purist fans of the original comic strip.</i>
<u>purity</u>	A woman's virtue or chastity. <i>White roses represent purity and innocence.</i>
<u>sheer</u>	Cause to sheer. <i>Sheer wine.</i>
sinless	Free from sin. <i>The sinless life of Christ.</i>
unexceptionable	Completely acceptable; not open to exception or reproach. <i>The unexceptionable belief that society should be governed by law.</i>
unimpeachable	Beyond doubt or reproach. <i>An unimpeachable reputation.</i>
<u>virtuous</u>	Morally excellent. <i>She considered herself very virtuous because she neither drank nor smoked.</i>
