careless

(of an action or its result) showing or caused by a lack of attention.
*Hurt by a **careless** remark.*

careless of one's duty

Without due thought or consideration.

casual

Employed or established on a temporary or irregular basis.
*He pretended it was a **casual** meeting.*

daredevil

Reckless and daring.
*A **daredevil** skydiver.*

delinquent

(typically of a young person) tending to commit crime, particularly minor crime.
***Delinquent** minors.*

foolhardy

Marked by defiant disregard for danger or consequences-
Macaulay.
*It would be **foolhardy** to go into the scheme without support.*

foolish	Devoid of good sense or judgment. <i>He was foolish enough to confide in her.</i>
hasty	Quick-tempered. <i>Hasty marriage seldom proveth well.</i>
heedless	Characterized by careless unconcern. <i>Heedless of danger.</i>
ill-advised	Without careful prior deliberation or counsel.
ill-considered	Not given careful consideration.
<u>immature</u>	Not fully developed. <i>His immature sense of humour.</i>
<u>impetuous</u>	Characterized by undue haste and lack of thought or deliberation. <i>An impetuous but controlled flow of water.</i>
imprudent	Not showing care for the consequences of an action; rash. <i>Would be imprudent for a noneconomist to talk about the details of economic policy.</i>
impulsive	Acting or done without forethought. <i>An impulsive gesture of affection.</i>
inattentive	Not paying attention to something. <i>Inattentive students.</i>
incautious	(of a person or an action) heedless of potential problems or risks. <i>Incautious talk.</i>
injudicious	Showing very poor judgement; unwise. <i>An injudicious measure.</i>
insouciant	Marked by blithe unconcern. <i>An utterly insouciant financial policy.</i>
<u>lax</u>	Of a speech sound especially a vowel pronounced with the vocal muscles relaxed. <i>Muscles have more potential energy when they are stretched than when they are lax.</i>
misguided	Poorly conceived or thought out. <i>Their misguided belief that they were defending the honour of their country.</i>
<u>naive</u>	Of or created by one without formal training simple or naive in style. <i>This naive simple creature with wide friendly eyes so eager to believe appearances.</i>

neglectful	Not showing due care or attention. <i>Neglectful of his duties.</i>
negligent	Characterized by neglect and undue lack of concern. <i>Negligent parents.</i>
overhasty	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation- Shakespeare- Arthur Geddes. <i>Hard times are showing up overhasty mergers.</i>
<u>precipitate</u>	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation. <i>Wondered whether they had been rather precipitate in deposing the king.</i>
precipitous	Dangerously high or steep. <i>The precipitous hills of Chinese paintings.</i>
rash	Marked by defiant disregard for danger or consequences. <i>Do something rash that he will forever repent.</i>
<u>reckless</u>	Characterized by careless unconcern- Edith Wharton. <i>You mustn't be so reckless.</i>
<u>remiss</u>	Lacking care or attention to duty; negligent. <i>Remiss of you not to pay your bills.</i>
slack	Having many sexual encounters or relationships (typically used of a woman). <i>Her mouth went slack.</i>
<u>thoughtless</u>	Without care or thought for others. <i>It was thoughtless of her to have rushed out and not said where she would be going.</i>
<u>uncaring</u>	Without care or thought for others. <i>She had always been uncaring of her appearance.</i>
unheeding	Marked by or paying little heed or attention-Franklin D. Roosevelt. <i>Mary unheeding watched the television.</i>
<u>unwise</u>	Not appropriate to the purpose. <i>Unwise policy decisions.</i>
wild	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <i>He threw a wild pitch.</i>



Usage Examples of "Irresponsible" as an adjective

- *Behaved like an irresponsible idiot.*
- *Hasty and irresponsible action.*

- ambiguous** Not clear or decided.
***Ambiguous** inkblots.*
- bungling** Lacking physical movement skills, especially with the hands- Mary H.
*A **bungling** performance.*
- cryptic** Of an obscure nature.
***Cryptic** plumage is thought to minimize predation.*
- dependent** Unable to stand alone syntactically as a complete sentence.
*Households with **dependent** children.*
- enigmatic** Resembling an oracle in obscurity of thought.
*He took the money with an **enigmatic** smile.*

<u>feckless</u>	Lacking initiative or strength of character; irresponsible. <i>Her feckless younger brother.</i>
<u>incapable</u>	(followed by `of`) lacking capacity or ability. <i>Incapable</i> of solution.
incompetent	An incompetent person. <i>The filming was hopeless incompetent.</i>
incomprehensible	Difficult to understand- A. Einstein. <i>The most incomprehensible thing about the universe is that it is comprehensible.</i>
ineffable	Defying expression or description. <i>The ineffable mysteries of the soul.</i>
<u>ineffective</u>	Lacking in power or forcefulness. <i>A weak and ineffective president.</i>
inept	Revealing lack of perceptiveness or judgment or finesse. <i>The referee s inept handling of the match.</i>
<u>inexplicable</u>	Unable to be explained or accounted for. <i>Inexplicable</i> errors.
inscrutable	Impossible to understand or interpret. <i>Guy looked blankly inscrutable.</i>
insoluble	Incapable of being dissolved. <i>The problem is not insoluble.</i>
mysterious	Having an import not apparent to the senses nor obvious to the intelligence; beyond ordinary understanding. <i>The new insurance policy is written without cryptic or mysterious terms.</i>
<u>paradoxical</u>	Seemingly absurd or self-contradictory. <i>By glorifying the acts of violence they achieve the paradoxical effect of making them trivial.</i>
<u>paradoxically</u>	In a paradoxical manner. <i>The strength of capitalism is paradoxically also its weakness.</i>
<u>puzzling</u>	Lacking clarity of meaning; causing confusion or perplexity. <i>A puzzling statement.</i>
<u>questionable</u>	Able to be refuted. <i>Questionable</i> motives.
<u>senile</u>	Mentally or physically infirm with age. <i>She couldn t cope with her senile husband.</i>

sibylline	Having a secret or hidden meaning- John Gunther. <i>His fascinating if sometimes sibylline meditations on the nation.</i>
unaccountable	Unable to be explained. <i>A powerful and unaccountable institution.</i>
uncertain	Not able to be relied on; not known or definite. <i>A gun with a rather uncertain trigger.</i>
unclear	Poorly stated or described. <i>The law itself was unclear on that point.</i>
unfathomable	Incapable of being fully understood. <i>Her grey eyes were dark with some unfathomable emotion.</i>
unintelligible	Impossible to understand. <i>Dolphin sounds are unintelligible to humans.</i>
unqualified	(of a person) not officially recognized as a practitioner of a particular profession or activity through having satisfied the relevant conditions or requirements. <i>The experiment was not an unqualified success.</i>
unreliable	Lacking a sense of responsibility. <i>He s lazy and unreliable.</i>
