- irrevocable** Incapable of being retracted or revoked.
*An **irrevocable** step.*
- unrectifiable** Not rectifiable; impossible to improve upon or correct.
- unrepairable** Impossible to repair.
*A large consignment of defective and **unrepairable** goods.*

certainly	Definitely or positively (`sure' is sometimes used informally for `surely. <i>She certainly is a hard worker.</i>
certainty	A fact that is definitely true or an event that is definitely going to take place. <i>She knew with absolute certainty that they were dead.</i>
conclusive	(of a victory) achieved easily or by a large margin. <i>The findings were by no means conclusive.</i>
confirming	Serving to support or corroborate.
constant	A quantity that does not vary. <i>A man constant in adherence to his ideals.</i>
decided	(of a person) having clear opinions; resolute. <i>You could never talk him round he was very decided.</i>
definite	Clearly true or real; unambiguous. <i>I want a definite answer.</i>
demonstrable	Capable of being demonstrated or proved. <i>Demonstrable truths.</i>
determinate	Having exact and discernible limits or form. <i>A determinate answer to the problem.</i>
determined	Having been learned or found or determined especially by investigation. <i>Alina was determined to be heard.</i>
explicit	Of a person stating something in an explicit manner. <i>The arrangement had not been made explicit.</i>
fixed	Of a number having a fixed and unchanging value. <i>Living on fixed incomes.</i>
grinding	A harsh and strident sound as of the grinding of gears. <i>Crush it and add it to the honey with a grinding of pepper and salt.</i>
incessantly	Without interruption. <i>She talked about him incessantly.</i>

indubitable	Impossible to doubt; unquestionable. <i>An indubitable truth.</i>
irremediable	Impossible to cure or put right. <i>Irremediable marital breakdowns.</i>
irreparable	(of an injury or loss) impossible to rectify or repair. <i>They were doing irreparable damage to my heart and lungs.</i>
irrevocable	Incapable of being retracted or revoked. <i>An irrevocable step.</i>
justified	Having words so spaced that lines have straight even margins. <i>A neatly justified list of names.</i>
obvious	Easily perceived by the senses or grasped by the mind. <i>Unemployment has been the most obvious cost of the recession.</i>
palpability	The quality of being perceivable by touch.
<u>permanent</u>	Lasting or intended to last or remain unchanged indefinitely. <i>Some temporary workers did not want a permanent job.</i>
perspicuity	Clarity as a consequence of being perspicuous.
perspicuous	(of language) transparently clear; easily understandable. <i>A perspicuous argument.</i>
<u>resolute</u>	Characterized by quickness and firmness. <i>Faced with a resolute opposition.</i>
<u>sure</u>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>Was sure or certain she had seen it.</i>
<u>undoubtedly</u>	Without doubt; certainly. <i>They are undoubtedly guilty.</i>
<u>unequivocal</u>	Admitting of no doubt or misunderstanding; having only one meaning or interpretation and leading to only one conclusion. <i>An unequivocal answer.</i>
<u>unmistakable</u>	Clearly revealed to the mind or the senses or judgment. <i>His opposition to slavery was unmistakable.</i>
