Synonyms of "Irreversible" as an adjective (5 Words)

irremediable	Impossible to cure or put right. <i>Irremediable</i> marital breakdowns.
irreparable	(of an injury or loss) impossible to rectify or repair. They were doing irreparable damage to my heart and lungs.
irrevocable	Incapable of being retracted or revoked. An irrevocable step.
unrectifiable	Not rectifiable; impossible to improve upon or correct.
unrenairable	Impossible to repair.

A large consignment of defective and **unrepairable** goods.



Usage Examples of "Irreversible" as an adjective

- Irreversible momentum toward revolution.
- She suffered irreversible damage to her health.

Associations of "Irreversible" (30 Words)

<u>certain</u>	Certain to occur destined or inevitable Benjamin Franklin. It s certain that more changes are in the offing.
<u>certainly</u>	Definitely or positively (`sure' is sometimes used informally for `surely. <i>She certainly is a hard worker.</i>
<u>certainty</u>	A fact that is definitely true or an event that is definitely going to take place. She knew with absolute certainty that they were dead.
conclusive	(of a victory) achieved easily or by a large margin. <i>The findings were by no means conclusive.</i>
confirming	Serving to support or corroborate.
constant	A quantity that does not vary. A man constant in adherence to his ideals.
decided	(of a person) having clear opinions; resolute. You could never talk him round he was very decided .
<u>definite</u>	Clearly true or real; unambiguous. I want a definite answer.
demonstrable	Capable of being demonstrated or proved. <i>Demonstrable</i> truths.
determinate	Having exact and discernible limits or form. A determinate answer to the problem.
determined	Having been learned or found or determined especially by investigation. <i>Alina was determined to be heard.</i>
<u>explicit</u>	Of a person stating something in an explicit manner. <i>The arrangement had not been made</i> explicit .
fixed	Of a number having a fixed and unchanging value. Living on fixed incomes.
<u>grinding</u>	A harsh and strident sound as of the grinding of gears. Crush it and add it to the honey with a grinding of pepper and salt.
incessantly	Without interruption. She talked about him incessantly .



indubitable	Impossible to doubt; unquestionable. An indubitable truth.
irremediable	Impossible to cure or put right. <i>Irremediable</i> marital breakdowns.
irreparable	(of an injury or loss) impossible to rectify or repair. They were doing irreparable damage to my heart and lungs.
irrevocable	Incapable of being retracted or revoked. An irrevocable step.
justified	Having words so spaced that lines have straight even margins. A neatly justified list of names.
obvious	Easily perceived by the senses or grasped by the mind. Unemployment has been the most obvious cost of the recession.
palpability	The quality of being perceivable by touch.
<u>permanent</u>	Lasting or intended to last or remain unchanged indefinitely. Some temporary workers did not want a permanent job.
perspicuity	Clarity as a consequence of being perspicuous.
perspicuous	(of language) transparently clear; easily understandable. A perspicuous argument.
<u>resolute</u>	Characterized by quickness and firmness. Faced with a resolute opposition.
<u>sure</u>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>Was sure or certain she had seen it.</i>
<u>undoubtedly</u>	Without doubt; certainly. They are undoubtedly guilty.
<u>unequivocal</u>	Admitting of no doubt or misunderstanding; having only one meaning or interpretation and leading to only one conclusion. <i>An unequivocal answer.</i>
<u>unmistakable</u>	Clearly revealed to the mind or the senses or judgment. <i>His opposition to slavery was unmistakable.</i>
