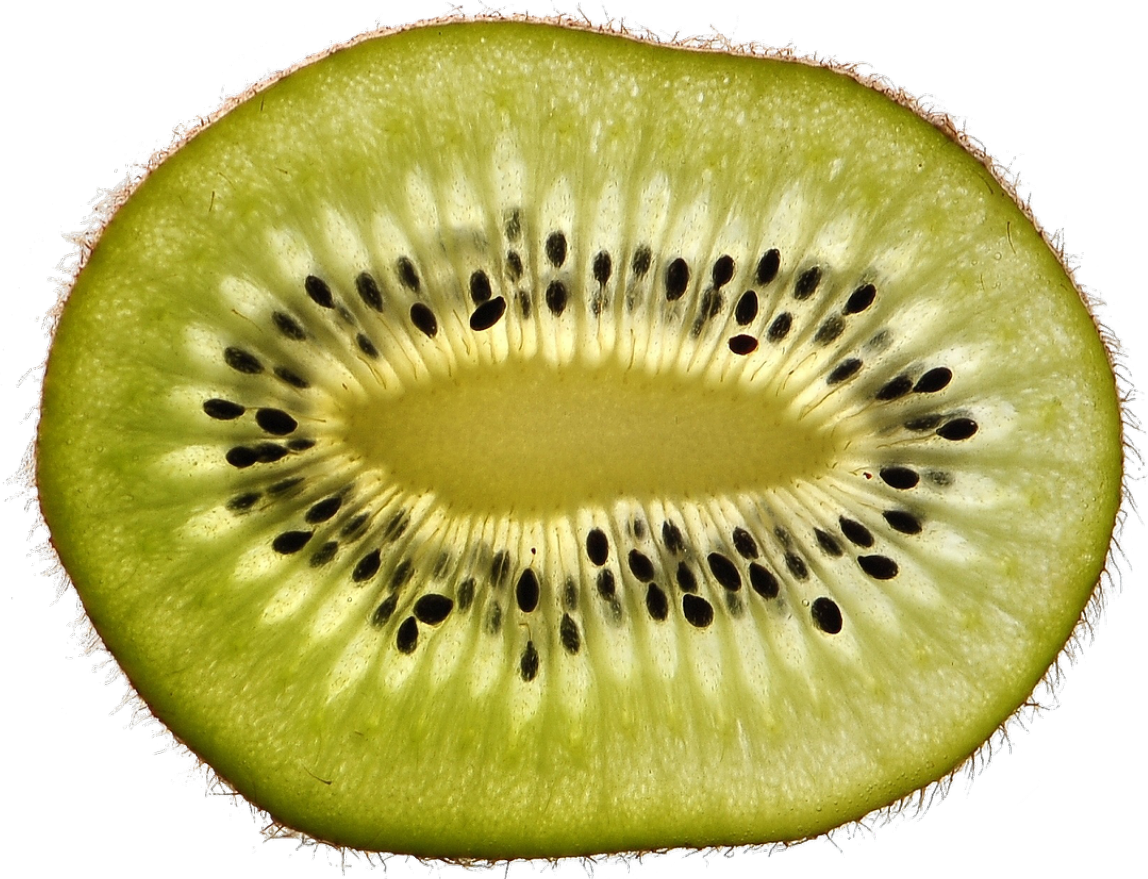
- *(psychiatry) a defense mechanism in which memory of an unacceptable act or impulse is separated from the emotion originally associated with it.*

<b>segregation</b>	The action or state of setting someone or something apart from others. <i>The <b>segregation</b> of pupils with learning difficulties.</i>
<b>sense of exile</b>	A natural appreciation or ability.
<b><u>separation</u></b>	The space where a division or parting occurs. <i>She and her husband have agreed to a trial <b>separation</b>.</i>
<b>setting apart</b>	Arrangement of scenery and properties to represent the place where a play or movie is enacted.
<b>solitariness</b>	Confinement of a prisoner in isolation from other prisoners.

<b>hermit</b>	A hummingbird found in the shady lower layers of tropical forests, foraging along a regular route.
<b>isolate</b>	A person or thing that has been or become isolated. <i>The medical world would never come to grips with polio until it could <b>isolate</b> the virus which caused it.</i>
<b>isolated</b>	Single; exceptional. <i><b>Isolated</b> farms and villages.</i>
<b>lone</b>	Lacking companions or companionship. <i>A <b>lonely</b> soul.</i>
<b>loneliness</b>	A disposition toward being alone. <i>The <b>loneliness</b> of the farm.</i>
<b>lonely</b>	Devoid of creatures. <i>Felt sad and <b>lonely</b>.</i>
<b>partition</b>	The act of dividing or partitioning separation by the creation of a boundary that divides or keeps apart. <i>The hall was <b>partitioned</b> to contain the noise of the computers.</i>
<b>privacy</b>	The quality of being secluded from the presence or view of others. <i>A law to restrict newspapers freedom to invade people s <b>privacy</b>.</i>
<b>recluse</b>	Withdrawn from society; seeking solitude. <i>He s a bit of a <b>recluse</b>.</i>
<b>remote</b>	A remote control device. <i>The valley is <b>remote</b> from the usual tourist routes.</i>
<b>seclude</b>	Keep away from others. <i>I <b>secluded</b> myself up here for a life of study and meditation.</i>
<b>secluded</b>	Providing privacy or seclusion. <i>A <b>secluded</b> romantic spot.</i>
<b>seclusion</b>	A sheltered or private place. <i>They enjoyed ten days of peace and <b>seclusion</b>.</i>
<b>segregate</b>	Someone who is or has been segregated. <i>Black people were <b>segregated</b> in churches schools and colleges.</i>

<b>separated</b>	Separated at the joint. <i>The <b>separated</b> spacecraft will return to their home bases.</i>
<b><u>separation</u></b>	The cessation of cohabitation of man and wife (either by mutual agreement or under a court order). <i>Religion involved the <b>separation</b> of the sacred and the profane.</i>
<b><u>sequester</u></b>	Take temporary possession of as a security, by legal authority. <i>Their property was <b>sequestered</b> by Parliament.</i>
<b><u>sole</u></b>	Put a new sole on to a shoe. <i>A big blister on each heel and <b>sole</b>.</i>
<b><u>solitary</u></b>	(of a flower or other part) borne singly. <i><b>Solitary</b> bees.</i>
<b><u>solitude</u></b>	A state of social isolation. <i>The battle to preserve beloved <b>solitudes</b> flared up all over the country.</i>
<b>troglodyte</b>	A person who is regarded as being deliberately ignorant or old-fashioned.
<b>underpopulated</b>	Having an insufficient or very small population. <i>The rocky and <b>underpopulated</b> west coast.</i>
