<b>kettle of fish</b>	A large hemispherical brass or copper percussion instrument with a drumhead that can be tuned by adjusting the tension on it.
<b>line</b>	A contour or outline considered as a feature of design or composition. <i>A powerful melodic <b>line</b>.</i>
<b>mare's nest</b>	A cosy or secluded retreat.
<b>mess</b>	A meal eaten in a mess hall by service personnel. <i>She replaced the jug and mopped up the <b>mess</b>.</i>

*He was **mobbed** by autograph hunters.*

**obstruct**

Hinder or prevent the progress or accomplishment of.

*She was **obstructing** the entrance.*

**obturate**

Block passage through.

**occlude**

Shut in.

***Occluded** within these crystals are other molecules.*

pack

Have the property of being packable or of compacting easily.

*She had **packed** and checked out of the hotel.*

**paralyse**

Make powerless and unable to function.

*The regional capital was **paralysed** by a general strike.*

**pile**

Place or lay as if in a pile.

*She **piled** all the groceries on the counter.*

**press**

Apply pressure to something to flatten shape or smooth it typically by ironing.

push

Make strenuous pushing movements during birth to expel the baby.

shove

Make one's way by pushing someone or something.

squeeze

Squeeze like a wedge into a tight space.

traffic

Vehicles moving on a public highway.

*The government will vigorously pursue individuals who **traffic** in drugs.*
