hiss	Electrical interference at audio frequencies. <i>The audience greeted this comment with boos and hisses.</i>
insult	A thing so worthless or contemptible as to be offensive. <i>He saw the book as a deliberate insult to the Church.</i>
jeering	Showing your contempt by derision.
jibe	An aggressive remark directed at a person like a missile and intended to have a telling effect. <i>A jibe at his old rivals.</i>
mockery	Ludicrously futile action. <i>In her bitterness she felt that all rejoicing was mockery.</i>
scoff	Showing your contempt by derision. <i>His army was the scoff of all Europe.</i>
scoffing	Showing your contempt by derision. <i>He had to overcome the scoffing of theoretical physicists.</i>
shout	A loud cry expressing a strong emotion or calling attention. <i>His words were interrupted by warning shouts.</i>
sneer	A contemptuous or mocking smile, remark, or tone. <i>He acknowledged their presence with a condescending sneer.</i>
taunt	A remark made in order to anger, wound, or provoke someone. <i>Pupils will play truant rather than face the taunts of classmates about their ragged clothes.</i>

<u>mock</u>	Imitate with mockery and derision. <i>He ought to find out who used his name mocked his voice and aped a few of his guitar lines.</i>
<u>ridicule</u>	Subject to laughter or ridicule. <i>The satirists ridiculed the plans for a new opera house.</i>
<u>scoff</u>	Laugh at with contempt and derision. <i>You a scientist he scoffed.</i>
scoff at	Treat with contemptuous disregard.
scorn	Refuse to do something because one is too proud. <i>A letter scorning his offer of intimacy.</i>
shout disapproval	Use foul or abusive language towards.
shout disapproval at	Utter aloud; often with surprise, horror, or joy.
sneer at	Smile contemptuously.
taunt	Harass with persistent criticism or carping. <i>Pupils began taunting her about her weight.</i>
tease	To arouse hope, desire, or curiosity without satisfying them. <i>The flirting man teased the young woman.</i>

disrespect	A manner that is generally disrespectful and contemptuous. <i>A young brave who disrespects his elders.</i>
flout	Laugh at with contempt and derision. <i>The advertising code is being flouted.</i>
gibe	An aggressive remark directed at a person like a missile and intended to have a telling effect. <i>She proved impervious to his sarcastic gibes.</i>
heckle	Comb with a heckle. <i>Heckle hemp or flax.</i>
heckler	Someone who tries to embarrass you with gibes and questions and objections. <i>He was adept at dealing with hecklers.</i>

hoot	With reference to a car horn siren etc make or cause to make a hoot. <i>The toughs and blades of the city hoot and bang their drums drink arak play dice and dance.</i>
irreverence	An irreverent mental attitude. <i>An attitude of irreverence towards politicians.</i>
joke	Tell a joke speak humorously. <i>Public transport is a joke.</i>
lampoon	A speech or text lampooning someone or something. <i>The actor was lampooned by the press.</i>
mock	Mock examinations. <i>They made a mock of him.</i>
mockery	A composition that imitates or misrepresents somebody's style, usually in a humorous way. <i>After a mockery of a trial in London he was executed.</i>
parody	Make a parody of. <i>His speciality was parodying schoolgirl fiction.</i>
persiflage	Light teasing. <i>An air of persiflage.</i>
ridicule	Subject to laughter or ridicule. <i>His theory was ridiculed and dismissed.</i>
sarcasm	Witty language used to convey insults or scorn-Jonathan Swif. <i>He used sarcasm to upset his opponent.</i>
satire	A play novel film or other work which uses satire. <i>A stinging satire on American politics.</i>
satirize	Deride and criticize by means of satire. <i>The writer satirized the politician's proposal.</i>
scoff	Showing your contempt by derision. <i>His army was the scoff of all Europe.</i>
sneer	A contemptuous or scornful remark. <i>She had sneered at their bad taste.</i>
spoof	Hoax or trick (someone). <i>It is a movie that spoofs other movies.</i>
teasing	Arousing sexual desire without intending to satisfy it. <i>The parody was just a form of teasing.</i>
travesty	Make a travesty of. <i>The absurdly lenient sentence is a travesty of justice.</i>
