imperil Pose a threat to; present a danger to.

jeopardise Pose a threat to; present a danger to.

He **menace**d the bank manager with a stick.

Put in a dangerous, disadvantageous, or difficult position.

Jonathon **peril**led his life for love of David.

put at risk Attribute or give.put in danger Attribute or give.

put in jeopardy Formulate in a particular style or language.

put on the line Make an investment.

risk Take a risk in the hope of a favorable outcome.

Shelley was far too intelligent to **risk** attempting to deceive him.

stake Support a plant with a stake or stakes.

Stake your goat.

threaten To utter intentions of injury or punishment against.

How dare you threaten me.

venture Undertake a risky or daring journey or course of action.

hazardous Risky; dangerous.

imminence The state of being imminent and liable to happen soon.

The populace was largely unaware of the **imminence** of war.

jeopardy Danger arising from being on trial for a criminal offence.

The whole peace process is in **jeopardy**.

landslide A collapse of a mass of earth or rock from a mountain or cliff.

Roosevelt defeated Hoover in a landslide.

menace Express a threat either by an utterance or a gesture.

The snakes are a **menace** to farm animals.

parlous Fraught with danger.

The General s position was **parlous**.

Put in a dangerous, disadvantageous, or difficult position.

perilous

threatened Likely in the near future to become endangered.

The spotted owl is a **threatened** species not yet an endangered one.

The degree to which something is poisonous.

unsafe Lacking in security or safety.

Drinking water in some areas may be **unsafe**.

venture

Any venturesome undertaking especially one with an uncertain outcome.

We **venture**d into the world of high tech and bought a supercomputer.

volatility Liability to change rapidly and unpredictably, especially for the worse.

The succession of new rulers contributed to the **volatility** of the situation.

Notify, usually in advance.

*warn*I warned you that I would ask some difficult questions.
