Definitions of "Jeopardize" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “jeopardize” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Pose a threat to; present a danger to.*
- *Put at risk.*
- *Put (someone or something) into a situation in which there is a danger of loss, harm, or failure.*

Synonyms of "Jeopardize" as a verb (17 Words)

adventure	Engage in daring or risky activity. <i>They had adventured into the forest.</i>
endanger	Put (someone or something) at risk or in danger. <i>The pollution is endangering the crops.</i>
expose to danger	To show, make visible or apparent.
expose to risk	Remove all or part of one’s clothes to show one’s body.
hazard	Put forward, of a guess, in spite of possible refutation. <i>He hazarded a guess.</i>

imperil	Pose a threat to; present a danger to. <i>They advised against tax increases for fear of imperilling the recovery.</i>
jeopardise	Pose a threat to; present a danger to.
<u>menace</u>	Express a threat either by an utterance or a gesture. <i>He menaced the bank manager with a stick.</i>
peril	Put in a dangerous, disadvantageous, or difficult position. <i>Jonathon perilled his life for love of David.</i>
put at risk	Attribute or give.
put in danger	Attribute or give.
put in jeopardy	Formulate in a particular style or language.
put on the line	Make an investment.
risk	Take a risk in the hope of a favorable outcome. <i>Shelley was far too intelligent to risk attempting to deceive him.</i>
<u>stake</u>	Support a plant with a stake or stakes. <i>Stake your goat.</i>
threaten	To utter intentions of injury or punishment against. <i>How dare you threaten me.</i>
venture	Undertake a risky or daring journey or course of action. <i>May I venture to add a few comments.</i>

Usage Examples of "Jeopardize" as a verb

- A devaluation of the dollar would jeopardize New York's position as a financial centre.

Associations of "Jeopardize" (30 Words)

aftershock	A tremor (or one of a series of tremors) occurring after the main shock of an earthquake.
avalanche	Engulf or carry off by an avalanche. <i>We have had an avalanche of applications for the post.</i>
carelessly	In a rakish manner. <i>He replied carelessly.</i>
<u>crisis</u>	A crucial stage or turning point in the course of something. <i>The monarchy was in crisis.</i>
danger	A dangerous place. <i>One of the trains involved passed a signal at danger.</i>

dare	To be courageous enough to try or do something. <i>I don t dare call him.</i>
<u>endanger</u>	Put (someone or something) at risk or in danger. <i>The pollution is endangering the crops.</i>
firefighter	A person whose job is to extinguish fires.
flammability	The quality of being easily ignited and burning rapidly.
<u>forewarn</u>	Inform (someone) of a possible future danger or problem. <i>I forewarned him of the trouble that would arise if he showed up at his ex wife s house.</i>
<u>gamble</u>	Money that is risked for possible monetary gain. <i>Dad likes a bit of a gamble.</i>
<u>hazard</u>	A gambling game using two dice, in which the chances are complicated by arbitrary rules. <i>He hazarded a guess.</i>
<u>hazardous</u>	Risky; dangerous. <i>We work in hazardous conditions.</i>
imminence	The state of being imminent and liable to happen soon. <i>The populace was largely unaware of the imminence of war.</i>
jeopardy	Danger arising from being on trial for a criminal offence. <i>The whole peace process is in jeopardy.</i>
landslide	A collapse of a mass of earth or rock from a mountain or cliff. <i>Roosevelt defeated Hoover in a landslide.</i>
<u>menace</u>	Express a threat either by an utterance or a gesture. <i>The snakes are a menace to farm animals.</i>
parlous	Fraught with danger. <i>The General s position was parlous.</i>
peril	Put in a dangerous, disadvantageous, or difficult position. <i>You could well place us both in peril.</i>
<u>perilous</u>	Full of danger or risk. <i>A perilous voyage across the Atlantic in a small boat.</i>
risk	Take a risk in the hope of a favorable outcome. <i>Why risk your life.</i>
<u>risky</u>	Not financially safe or secure. <i>It was much too risky to try to disarm him.</i>
threat	A person who inspires fear or dread. <i>Thousands of rail freight jobs came under threat.</i>

threaten	To utter intentions of injury or punishment against. <i>She forced a scene and Toby threatened to leave.</i>
threatened	Likely in the near future to become endangered. <i>The spotted owl is a threatened species not yet an endangered one.</i>
<u>toxicity</u>	The degree to which something is poisonous. <i>That was how I protected my partner from my family's toxicity.</i>
unsafe	Lacking in security or safety. <i>Drinking water in some areas may be unsafe.</i>
venture	Any venturesome undertaking especially one with an uncertain outcome. <i>We ventured into the world of high tech and bought a supercomputer.</i>
volatility	Liability to change rapidly and unpredictably, especially for the worse. <i>The succession of new rulers contributed to the volatility of the situation.</i>
<u>warn</u>	Notify, usually in advance. <i>I warned you that I would ask some difficult questions.</i>
