### Definitions of "Jettison" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “jettison” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Throw away, of something encumbering.*
- *Throw as from an airplane.*
- *Throw or drop (something) from an aircraft or ship.*
- *Abandon or discard (someone or something that is no longer wanted).*

### Synonyms of "Jettison" as a verb (24 Words)

<b>deliver</b>	Deliver a speech oration or idea. <i>Her Royal Highness The Duchess of Cambridge was safely <b>delivered</b> of a son at 4 24 p m.</i>
<a href="#">deposit</a>	Put or set down (something or someone) in a specific place. <i>He <b>deposited</b> a pile of school books on the kitchen table.</i>
<a href="#">discard</a>	Throw or cast away. <i>West led a heart and East was able to <b>discard</b> his club loser.</i>

<b>discharge</b>	Go off or discharge. <i>The executor must <b>discharge</b> the funeral expenses.</i>
<b>dispose of</b>	Place or put in a particular order.
<b>ditch</b>	Make or repair ditches. <i>He was picked up by a gunboat after <b>ditching</b> his plane in the Mediterranean.</i>
<b>drop</b>	Score a goal by a drop kick. <i>He reckoned I'd <b>dropped</b> forty thousand pounds.</i>
<b>dump</b>	Sell off (assets) rapidly. <i>You'll get tired of me and <b>dump</b> me.</i>
<b>eject</b>	Leave an aircraft rapidly using an ejection seat or capsule. <i>He put the plane in a nosedive and <b>ejected</b>.</i>
<b>empty out</b>	Leave behind empty; move out of.
<b>get rid of</b>	Evoke an emotional response.
<b>leave</b>	Leave behind unintentionally. <i><b>Leave</b> lots of time for the trip.</i>
<b>offload</b>	Unload (a cargo). <i>A system designed to <b>offload</b> the text on to a host computer.</i>
<b>pour out</b>	Pour out.
<b>put off</b>	Estimate.
<b>remove</b>	Remove from a position or an office. <i>He <b>removed</b> to Wales and began afresh.</i>
<b>set down</b>	Estimate.
<b>throw away</b>	Utter with force; utter vehemently.
<b>throw out</b>	To put into a state or activity hastily, suddenly, or carelessly.
<b>throw over the side</b>	Be confusing or perplexing to; cause to be unable to think clearly.
<b>throw overboard</b>	Place or put with great energy.
<b>tip out</b>	Cause to topple or tumble by pushing.
<b>toss out</b>	Throw or toss with a light motion.
<b>unload</b>	Leave or unload. <i><b>Unload</b> the cargo.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Jettison" as a verb

- *Six aircraft jettisoned their loads in the sea.*
- *The scheme was jettisoned.*

## Associations of "Jettison" (30 Words)

<b>abandon</b>	The trait of lacking restraint or control; reckless freedom from inhibition or worry. <i>He <b>abandoned</b> the thought of asking for her hand in marriage.</i>
<b>bin</b>	Store in bins. <i>The whole idea had to be <b>binned</b>.</i>
<b>deniable</b>	Able to be denied. <i>The government did agree to play a limited and <b>deniable</b> role in the rebellion.</i>
<b>detritus</b>	Waste or debris of any kind. <i>The streets were foul with <b>detritus</b>.</i>
<b><u>discard</u></b>	Anything that is cast aside or discarded. <i>Hilary bundled up the clothes she had <b>discarded</b>.</i>
<b><u>discarded</u></b>	Thrown away.
<b><u>disposable</u></b>	An item that can be disposed of after it has been used. <i>Don t buy <b>disposables</b> such as cups and plates.</i>
<b>disposal</b>	The sale of shares, property, or other assets. <i>England s 4 0 <b>disposal</b> of Turkey.</i>
<b>dispose</b>	Consume (food or drink) quickly or enthusiastically. <i>She watched him <b>dispose</b> of a large slice of cheese.</i>
<b>dump</b>	A piece of land where waste materials are dumped. <i>These countries have been <b>dumping</b> cheap fertilizers on the UK market.</i>
<b>dumping</b>	Selling goods abroad at a price below that charged in the domestic market.
<b>eliminate</b>	Eliminate from the body. <i>This diet claims to <b>eliminate</b> toxins from the body.</i>
<b>filth</b>	Used as a term of abuse for a person or people one greatly despises. <i>You and all the others like you are <b>filth</b>.</i>
<b><u>garbage</u></b>	Food that is discarded (as from a kitchen). <i>A <b>garbage</b> dump.</i>
<b>incinerator</b>	A furnace for incinerating (especially to dispose of refuse).
<b>junk</b>	Junk bonds. <i>I can t write this kind of <b>junk</b>.</i>
<b>landfill</b>	Bury in a landfill. <i><b>Landfill</b> sites.</i>
<b>litter</b>	Provide a horse or other animal with litter as bedding. <i>A <b>litter</b> of sleeping bags on the floor.</i>

<b>prodigality</b>	Excessive spending.
<b>recycle</b>	Use again. <i>The amino acids are <b>recycled</b> in the synthesis of other proteins.</i>
<b>recycling</b>	The act of processing used or abandoned materials for use in creating new products. <i><b>Recycling</b> is collected on a weekly basis.</i>
<b>refuse</b>	Refuse to accept. <i>The old lady was <b>refused</b> admission to four hospitals.</i>
<b>reuse</b>	The action of using something again. <i>The ballast was cleaned ready for <b>reuse</b>.</i>
<b>rubble</b>	Pieces of rough or undressed stone used in building walls, especially as filling for cavities. <i>Two buildings collapsed trapping scores of people in the <b>rubble</b>.</i>
<b>scavenge</b>	(of an animal) search for (carrion) as food. <i>Chlorine molecules can <b>scavenge</b> ozone at a very fast rate.</i>
<b>squander</b>	Allow (an opportunity) to pass or be lost. <i>You <b>squandered</b> the opportunity to get an advanced degree.</i>
<b>trash</b>	Express a totally negative opinion of. <i>The subway entrance was blocked with <b>trash</b>.</i>
<b>waste</b>	Run off as waste. <i><b>Waste</b> heat.</i>
<b>wastebasket</b>	A container with an open top; for discarded paper and other rubbish.
