Definitions of "Jettison" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “jettison” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Throw away, of something encumbering.*
- *Throw as from an airplane.*
- *Throw or drop (something) from an aircraft or ship.*
- *Abandon or discard (someone or something that is no longer wanted).*

Synonyms of "Jettison" as a verb (24 Words)

deliver	Deliver a speech oration or idea. <i>Her Royal Highness The Duchess of Cambridge was safely delivered of a son at 4 24 p m.</i>
deposit	Put or set down (something or someone) in a specific place. <i>He deposited a pile of school books on the kitchen table.</i>
discard	Throw or cast away. <i>West led a heart and East was able to discard his club loser.</i>

discharge	Go off or discharge. <i>The executor must discharge the funeral expenses.</i>
dispose of	Place or put in a particular order.
<u>ditch</u>	Make or repair ditches. <i>He was picked up by a gunboat after ditching his plane in the Mediterranean.</i>
drop	Score a goal by a drop kick. <i>He reckoned I'd dropped forty thousand pounds.</i>
dump	Sell off (assets) rapidly. <i>You'll get tired of me and dump me.</i>
eject	Leave an aircraft rapidly using an ejection seat or capsule. <i>He put the plane in a nosedive and ejected.</i>
empty out	Leave behind empty; move out of.
get rid of	Evoke an emotional response.
leave	Leave behind unintentionally. <i>Leave lots of time for the trip.</i>
offload	Unload (a cargo). <i>A system designed to offload the text on to a host computer.</i>
pour out	Pour out.
put off	Estimate.
remove	Remove from a position or an office. <i>He removed to Wales and began afresh.</i>
set down	Estimate.
throw away	Utter with force; utter vehemently.
throw out	To put into a state or activity hastily, suddenly, or carelessly.
throw over the side	Be confusing or perplexing to; cause to be unable to think clearly.
throw overboard	Place or put with great energy.
tip out	Cause to topple or tumble by pushing.
toss out	Throw or toss with a light motion.
<u>unload</u>	Leave or unload. <i>Unload the cargo.</i>

Usage Examples of "Jettison" as a verb

- *Six aircraft jettisoned their loads in the sea.*
- *The scheme was jettisoned.*

abandon	The trait of lacking restraint or control; reckless freedom from inhibition or worry. <i>He abandoned the thought of asking for her hand in marriage.</i>
bin	Store in bins. <i>The whole idea had to be binned.</i>
deniable	Able to be denied. <i>The government did agree to play a limited and deniable role in the rebellion.</i>
detritus	Waste or debris of any kind. <i>The streets were foul with detritus.</i>
<u>discard</u>	Anything that is cast aside or discarded. <i>Hilary bundled up the clothes she had discarded.</i>
<u>discarded</u>	Thrown away.
<u>disposable</u>	An item that can be disposed of after it has been used. <i>Don t buy disposables such as cups and plates.</i>
disposal	The sale of shares, property, or other assets. <i>England s 4 0 disposal of Turkey.</i>
dispose	Consume (food or drink) quickly or enthusiastically. <i>She watched him dispose of a large slice of cheese.</i>
dump	A piece of land where waste materials are dumped. <i>These countries have been dumping cheap fertilizers on the UK market.</i>
dumping	Selling goods abroad at a price below that charged in the domestic market.
eliminate	Eliminate from the body. <i>This diet claims to eliminate toxins from the body.</i>
filth	Used as a term of abuse for a person or people one greatly despises. <i>You and all the others like you are filth.</i>
<u>garbage</u>	Food that is discarded (as from a kitchen). <i>A garbage dump.</i>
incinerator	A furnace for incinerating (especially to dispose of refuse).
junk	Junk bonds. <i>I can t write this kind of junk.</i>
landfill	Bury in a landfill. <i>Landfill sites.</i>
litter	Provide a horse or other animal with litter as bedding. <i>A litter of sleeping bags on the floor.</i>

prodigality	Excessive spending.
recycle	Use again. <i>The amino acids are recycled in the synthesis of other proteins.</i>
recycling	The act of processing used or abandoned materials for use in creating new products. <i>Recycling is collected on a weekly basis.</i>
refuse	Refuse to accept. <i>The old lady was refused admission to four hospitals.</i>
reuse	The action of using something again. <i>The ballast was cleaned ready for reuse.</i>
rubble	Pieces of rough or undressed stone used in building walls, especially as filling for cavities. <i>Two buildings collapsed trapping scores of people in the rubble.</i>
scavenge	(of an animal) search for (carrion) as food. <i>Chlorine molecules can scavenge ozone at a very fast rate.</i>
squander	Allow (an opportunity) to pass or be lost. <i>You squandered the opportunity to get an advanced degree.</i>
trash	Express a totally negative opinion of. <i>The subway entrance was blocked with trash.</i>
waste	Run off as waste. <i>Waste heat.</i>
wastebasket	A container with an open top; for discarded paper and other rubbish.
