- *A thing that someone says to cause amusement or laughter, especially a story with a funny punchline.*
- *A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement.*
- *A person or thing that is ridiculously inadequate.*
- *A triviality not to be taken seriously.*
- *A humorous anecdote or remark intended to provoke laughter.*
- *A trick played on someone for fun.*

Synonyms of "Joke" as a noun (22 Words)

antic	A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement.
caper	A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement. <i>A cop caper about intergalactic drug dealers.</i>
<u>farce</u>	The dramatic genre represented by farces. <i>The choreographed confusion of real farce.</i>
figure of fun	Language used in a figurative or nonliteral sense.
funny story	An account of an amusing incident (usually with a punch line).
gag	A restriction on dissemination of information. <i>He knows a million gags.</i>
<u>hoax</u>	Something intended to deceive; deliberate trickery intended to gain an advantage. <i>A hoax 999 call.</i>
jape	A practical joke. <i>The childish jape of depositing a stink bomb in her locker.</i>
jest	A thing said or done for amusement; a joke. <i>It was said in jest.</i>
jocularity	Activity characterized by good humor.
laugh	A facial expression characteristic of a person laughing. <i>That s a laugh the idea of you cooking a meal.</i>

object of ridicule	A tangible and visible entity; an entity that can cast a shadow.
pleasantry	An inconsequential remark made as part of a polite conversation. <i>He laughed at his own pleasantry.</i>
prank	A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement. <i>The tapestry was stolen as part of a drunken student prank.</i>
put-on	Something intended to deceive; deliberate trickery intended to gain an advantage.
quip	A witty remark. <i>Tricks of controversy and quips of law.</i>
source of amusement	A facility where something is available.
stunt	A creature (especially a whale) that has been prevented from attaining full growth.
travesty	A composition that imitates or misrepresents somebody's style, usually in a humorous way. <i>The absurdly lenient sentence is a travesty of justice.</i>
trick	A cunning act or scheme intended to deceive or outwit someone. <i>She thought Elaine was playing some trick on her.</i>
waste of time	An uninhabited wilderness that is worthless for cultivation.
witticism	A message whose ingenuity or verbal skill or incongruity has the power to evoke laughter. <i>Maurice roared with laughter at his own witticisms.</i>

- *She was in a mood to tell jokes.*
- *The others were playing a joke on her.*



Joke as a Verb

Definitions of "Joke" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "joke" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Poke fun at.*

- *Make jokes; talk humorously or flippantly.*
- *Tell a joke; speak humorously.*
- *Act in a funny or teasing way.*



Synonyms of "Joke" as a verb (15 Words)

crack jokes	Hit forcefully; deal a hard blow, making a cracking noise.
fool	Fool or hoax. <i>He fooled nightclub managers into believing he was a successful businessman.</i>
fool about	Make a fool or dupe of.
fool around	Fool or hoax.
<u>hoax</u>	Subject to a playful hoax or joke.
jest	Act in a funny or teasing way. <i>You jest surely.</i>
mess someone about	Make a mess of or create disorder in.

mess someone around	Eat in a mess hall.
play a joke	Emit recorded sound.
play a practical joke	Be received or accepted or interpreted in a specific way.
play a prank	Perform music on (a musical instrument).
play a trick	Participate in games or sport.
pull someone's leg	Take sides with; align oneself with; show strong sympathy for.
tease	Mock or make fun of playfully. <i>Her hair is teased into spikes.</i>
tell jokes	Give evidence.



Usage Examples of "Joke" as a verb

- *She could laugh and joke with her colleagues.*
- *He often jokes even when he appears serious.*
- *He was pretending to joke his daughter.*



Associations of "Joke" (30 Words)

- badinage** Humorous or witty conversation.
*He developed a nice line in **badinage** with the Labour leader.*
- banter** Light teasing repartee.
*The men **bantered** with the waitresses.*
- comedy** The style or genre represented by comedy films plays and broadcast programmes.
*The conventions of romantic **comedy** have grown more appealing with the passage of time.*
- deride** Express contempt for; ridicule.
*He **derided** his student s attempt to solve the biggest problem in mathematics.*

fun	A source of fun. <i>He was fun to be with.</i>
funny	Slightly but undefinably unwell. <i>I do get some funny looks.</i>
gibe	An aggressive remark directed at a person like a missile and intended to have a telling effect. <i>She proved impervious to his sarcastic gibes.</i>
hoot	Of an owl utter a hoot. <i>Sam hooted his horn.</i>
humor	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>You can't survive in the army without a sense of humor.</i>
humorous	Full of or characterized by humor. <i>A humorous and entertaining talk.</i>
humour	The ability to express humour or amuse other people. <i>Their inimitable brand of humour.</i>
jeer	Shout rude and mocking remarks at (someone). <i>The taunts and jeers of my classmates.</i>
jest	Act in a funny or teasing way. <i>He laughed unpleasantly at his own jest.</i>
jocose	Characterized by jokes and good humor. <i>A jocose allusion.</i>
jocular	With humor. <i>His voice was jocular.</i>
laugh	The sound of laughing. <i>Many people only laughed at these stories.</i>
mockery	Showing your contempt by derision. <i>In her bitterness she felt that all rejoicing was mockery.</i>
parody	Make a parody of. <i>The film is a parody of the horror genre.</i>
persiflage	Light teasing. <i>An air of persiflage.</i>
playfully	In a light-hearted manner. <i>Lily laughed and playfully slapped him across the chest.</i>
quip	Make jokes or quips. <i>Peter ate heartily with a quip about being a condemned man.</i>
repartee	Conversation or speech characterized by quick, witty comments or replies. <i>Quick fire repartee.</i>

- ridicule** Subject to laughter or ridicule.
*The satirists **ridiculed** the plans for a new opera house.*
- sally** Make a military sortie.
*A **sally** into the wide world beyond his home.*
- satirize** Deride and criticize by means of satire.
*The writer **satirized** the politician's proposal.*
- scoff** Showing your contempt by derision.
*You a scientist he **scoffed**.*
- slapstick** Comedy based on deliberately clumsy actions and humorously embarrassing events.
*A loud and exhilarating rattle of bladders and **slapsticks**.*
- spoof** Hoax or trick (someone).
*That meant that the Americans might not be able to jam or **spoof** his systems.*
- teasing** Causing irritation or annoyance.
*A **teasing** and persistent thought annoyed him.*
- witticism** A message whose ingenuity or verbal skill or incongruity has the power to evoke laughter.
*Maurice roared with laughter at his own **witticisms**.*
