### Definitions of "Jokes" as a noun

- *Activity characterized by good humor.*
- *A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement.*
- *A triviality not to be taken seriously.*
- *A humorous anecdote or remark intended to provoke laughter.*



## Synonyms of "Jokes" as a noun (10 Words)

- antic** A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement.
- caper** An illicit or ridiculous activity or escapade.  
*She did a little **caper** or dance.*
- gag** A restriction on dissemination of information.  
*They tied him up and put a **gag** in his mouth.*
- jape** A practical joke.  
*Even a schoolboy's **jape** is supposed to have some ascertainable point.*
- jest** A humorous anecdote or remark intended to provoke laughter.  
*Lowly virtue is the **jest** of fools.*
- jocularity** A feeling facetious merriment.
- laugh** Something that causes laughter a source of fun amusement or derision.  
*She gave a loud silly **laugh**.*



- prank** A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement.  
*The tapestry was stolen as part of a drunken student **prank**.*
- put-on** A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement.
- trick** A period of work or duty.  
*He did conjuring **tricks** for his daughters.*



### Usage Examples of "Jokes" as a noun

- *He told a very funny joke.*
- *I regarded his campaign for mayor as a joke.*



## Jokes as a Verb

### Definitions of "Jokes" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "jokes" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Tell a joke; speak humorously.*
- *Act in a funny or teasing way.*





## Synonyms of "Jokes" as a verb (1 Word)

**jest** Tell a joke; speak humorously.  
You **jest** surely.



## Usage Examples of "Jokes" as a verb

- *He often jokes even when he appears serious.*





## Associations of "Jokes" (30 Words)

- badinage** Frivolous banter.  
*He developed a nice line in **badinage** with the Labour leader.*
- banter** The playful and friendly exchange of teasing remarks.  
*The men **bantered** with the waitresses.*
- comedy** The style or genre represented by comedy films plays and broadcast programmes.  
*A cabaret with music dancing and **comedy**.*
- deride** Treat or speak of with contempt.  
*He **derided** his student s attempt to solve the biggest problem in mathematics.*

<b>fun</b>	A source of fun. <i>The column s just a bit of <b>fun</b>.</i>
<b>funny</b>	A joke or witty remark. <i><b>Funny</b> stories that made everybody laugh.</i>
<b>gibe</b>	Laugh at with contempt and derision. <i>She proved impervious to his sarcastic <b>gibes</b>.</i>
<b>hoot</b>	With reference to a car horn siren etc make or cause to make a hoot. <i>Sam <b>hooted</b> his horn.</i>
<b>humor</b>	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>She didn t appreciate my <b>humor</b>.</i>
<b>humorous</b>	Full of or characterized by humor. <i><b>Humorous</b> cartoons.</i>
<b>humour</b>	The ability to express humour or amuse other people. <i>She was always <b>humouring</b> him to prevent trouble.</i>
<b>jeer</b>	Shout rude and mocking remarks at (someone). <i>The crowd <b>jeered</b> at the speaker.</i>
<b>jest</b>	Activity characterized by good humor. <i>He laughed unpleasantly at his own <b>jest</b>.</i>
<b>jocose</b>	Playful or humorous. <i>A <b>jocose</b> allusion.</i>
<b>jocular</b>	Fond of or characterized by joking; humorous or playful. <i>They tried to deal with this painful subject <b>jocularly</b>.</i>
<b>laugh</b>	A humorous anecdote or remark intended to provoke laughter. <i>She gave a loud silly <b>laugh</b>.</i>
<b>mockery</b>	An absurd misrepresentation or imitation of something. <i>Stung by her <b>mockery</b> Frankie hung his head.</i>
<b>parody</b>	Make a parody of. <i>His provocative use of <b>parody</b>.</i>
<b>persiflage</b>	Light teasing. <i>An air of <b>persiflage</b>.</i>
<b>playfully</b>	In a playful manner. <i>Lily laughed and <b>playfully</b> slapped him across the chest.</i>
<b>quip</b>	Make jokes or quips. <i>Tricks of controversy and <b>quips</b> of law.</i>
<b>repartee</b>	Conversation or speech characterized by quick, witty comments or replies. <i>Quick fire <b>repartee</b>.</i>



- ridicule** Subject to laughter or ridicule.  
*He is held up as an object of **ridicule**.*
- sally** Witty remark.  
*The garrison there made a **sally** against us.*
- satirize** Ridicule with satire.  
*The writer **satirized** the politician's proposal.*
- scoff** An object of ridicule.  
*His army was the **scoff** of all Europe.*
- slapstick** A boisterous comedy with chases and collisions and practical jokes.  
*A loud and exhilarating rattle of bladders and **slapsticks**.*
- spoof** A trick played on someone as a joke.  
*The students **spoofed** the teachers.*
- teasing** Playful vexation.  
*Her lazy **teasing** smile.*
- witticism** A witty remark.  
*Maurice roared with laughter at his own **witticisms**.*
