- A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement.
- A triviality not to be taken seriously.
- A humorous anecdote or remark intended to provoke laughter.





Synonyms of "Jokes" as a noun (10 Words)

antic	A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement.
caper	An illicit or ridiculous activity or escapade. <i>She did a little caper or dance.</i>
gag	A restriction on dissemination of information. They tied him up and put a gag in his mouth.
jape	A practical joke. Even a schoolboy s jape is supposed to have some ascertainable point.
jest	A humorous anecdote or remark intended to provoke laughter. Lowly virtue is the jest of fools.
jocularity	A feeling facetious merriment.
laugh	Something that causes laughter a source of fun amusement or derision. <i>She gave a loud silly laugh.</i>



<u>prank</u>	A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement. <i>The tapestry was stolen as part of a drunken student</i> prank .
put-on	A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement.
trick	A period of work or duty. <i>He did conjuring tricks for his daughters.</i>



Usage Examples of "Jokes" as a noun

- He told a very funny joke.
- I regarded his campaign for mayor as a joke.





Jokes as a Verb

Definitions of "Jokes" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "jokes" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Tell a joke; speak humorously.
- Act in a funny or teasing way.





Synonyms of "Jokes" as a verb (1 Word)

jest Tell a joke; speak humorously. *You jest surely.*






Usage Examples of "Jokes" as a verb

• He often jokes even when he appears serious.





Associations of "Jokes" (30 Words)

<u>badinage</u>	Frivolous banter. <i>He developed a nice line in badinage with the Labour leader.</i>
<u>banter</u>	The playful and friendly exchange of teasing remarks. <i>The men bantered with the waitresses.</i>
<u>comedy</u>	The style or genre represented by comedy films plays and broadcast programmes. A cabaret with music dancing and comedy .
deride	Treat or speak of with contempt. <i>He</i> deride <i>d</i> his student s attempt to solve the biggest problem in mathematics.



fun	A source of fun. The column s just a bit of fun .
funny	A joke or witty remark. <i>Funny</i> stories that made everybody laugh.
gibe	Laugh at with contempt and derision. She proved impervious to his sarcastic gibe s.
hoot	With reference to a car horn siren etc make or cause to make a hoot. Sam hoot ed his horn.
humor	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>She didn t appreciate my humor</i> .
humorous	Full of or characterized by humor. <i>Humorous</i> cartoons.
humour	The ability to express humour or amuse other people. She was always humour ing him to prevent trouble.
<u>jeer</u>	Shout rude and mocking remarks at (someone. <i>The crowd jeered at the speaker.</i>
jest	Activity characterized by good humor. <i>He laughed unpleasantly at his own jest.</i>
jocose	Playful or humorous. A jocose allusion.
jocular	Fond of or characterized by joking; humorous or playful. They tried to deal with this painful subject jocular ly.
laugh	A humorous anecdote or remark intended to provoke laughter. She gave a loud silly laugh .
<u>mockery</u>	An absurd misrepresentation or imitation of something. <i>Stung by her mockery Frankie hung his head.</i>
<u>parody</u>	Make a parody of. <i>His provocative use of parody.</i>
persiflage	Light teasing. An air of persiflage .
playfully	In a playful manner. Lily laughed and playfully slapped him across the chest.
quip	Make jokes or quips. Tricks of controversy and quip s of law.
repartee	Conversation or speech characterized by quick, witty comments or replies. <i>Quick fire repartee</i> .



<u>ridicule</u>	Subject to laughter or ridicule. <i>He is held up as an object of ridicule.</i>
sally	Witty remark. The garrison there made a sally against us.
satirize	Ridicule with satire. The writer satirize d the politician s proposal.
<u>scoff</u>	An object of ridicule. His army was the scoff of all Europe.
slapstick	A boisterous comedy with chases and collisions and practical jokes. A loud and exhilarating rattle of bladders and slapstick s.
spoof	A trick played on someone as a joke. <i>The students spoofed the teachers.</i>
<u>teasing</u>	Playful vexation. Her lazy teasing smile.
witticism	A witty remark. Maurice roared with laughter at his own witticism s.
