Definitions of "Journal" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “journal” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The part of the axle contained by a bearing.*
- *A ledger in which transactions have been recorded as they occurred.*
- *A daily record of news and events of a personal nature; a diary.*
- *The part of a shaft or axle that rests on bearings.*
- *A record of the daily proceedings in the Houses of Parliament.*
- *A logbook.*
- *(in bookkeeping) a daily record of business transactions with a statement of the accounts to which each is to be debited and credited.*
- *A newspaper or magazine that deals with a particular subject or professional activity.*
- *A daily written record of (usually personal) experiences and observations.*
- *A periodical dedicated to a particular subject.*
- *A record book as a physical object.*

| blog | A regularly updated website or web page, typically one run by an individual or small group, that is written in an informal or conversational style. <i>Postings on a blog are usually in chronological order.</i> |
| <u>bulletin</u> | A regular newsletter or report issued by an organization. |
| daily record | A newspaper that is published every day. |
| day-by-day account | The period of time taken by a particular planet (e.g. Mars) to make a complete rotation on its axis. |
| daybook | An account book in which a day's transactions are entered for later transfer to a ledger. <i>He bought a new daybook.</i> |

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| diary | A column in a newspaper or magazine giving news or gossip on a particular topic. <i>The City Diary.</i> |
| <u>digest</u> | A substance or mixture obtained by digestion. <i>A digest of cloned DNA.</i> |
| gazette | An official publication containing lists of government appointments and promotions and other public notices. <i>An announcement in Tuesday's London Gazette will make clear that he is being stripped of the honour.</i> |
| <u>log</u> | An official record of events during the voyage of a ship or aircraft. <i>An email log.</i> |
| logbook | An official record of events during the voyage of a ship or aircraft. |
| magazine | A business firm that publishes magazines. <i>Tripped over a pile of magazines.</i> |
| moblog | A blog that consists of pictures and other content posted from a mobile phone. |
| newsletter | A bulletin issued periodically to the members of a society or other organization. |
| periodical | A publication that appears at fixed intervals. |
| professional organ | A person engaged in one of the learned professions. |
| <u>publication</u> | The preparation and issuing of a book, journal, or piece of music for public sale. <i>The publication of her first novel.</i> |
| review | An essay or article that gives a critical evaluation (as of a book or play). <i>He conducted a final review of his troops and spoke of his pride in having served in the US army.</i> |
| vlog | A personal website or social media account where a person regularly posts short videos. <i>You can add travel vlogs to the growing list of travel related material popping up on the Web.</i> |
| yearbook | An annual publication giving current information and listing events or aspects of the previous year, especially in a particular field. <i>The Rugby Union Yearbook.</i> |

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| correspondent | A journalist employed to provide news stories for newspapers or broadcast media. <i>A cricket correspondent.</i> |
| dramatist | A person who writes plays. |
| editor | Computer science a program designed to perform such editorial functions as rearrangement or modification or deletion of data. <i>A sports editor.</i> |
| <u>freelance</u> | Earning one's living as a freelance. <i>A freelance journalist.</i> |
| gazette | Publish in a gazette. <i>A gazetted holiday.</i> |
| journalist | A person who writes for newspapers, magazines, or news websites or prepares news to be broadcast. <i>He was a seasoned TV journalist.</i> |
| literary | Of language associated with literary works or other formal writing having a marked style intended to create a particular emotional effect. <i>The script was too literary.</i> |
| magazine | A business firm that publishes magazines. <i>He took the machine gun and a spare magazine.</i> |
| monthly | Once a month; every month. <i>The Council held monthly meetings.</i> |
| newspaper | Cheap paper made from wood pulp and used for printing newspapers. <i>Murdoch owns many newspapers.</i> |
| novelist | A writer of novels. |
| pamphleteer | A writer of pamphlets (usually taking a partisan stand on public issues). <i>The right to pamphleteer and post bills anonymously is as important today as it was three centuries ago.</i> |
| periodical | A publication that appears at fixed intervals. <i>She took periodical gulps of her tea.</i> |
| <u>publication</u> | A book or journal issued for public sale. <i>The publication of April trade figures.</i> |
| publisher | The proprietor of a newspaper. <i>A commercial music publisher.</i> |
| quarterly | A magazine or journal that is published four times a year. <i>Interest is paid quarterly.</i> |
| reader | A proofreader. <i>She's an avid reader.</i> |

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| readership | The readers of a newspaper, magazine, or book regarded collectively. <i>The magazine has a readership of just 65 000.</i> |
| reporter | A person who reports, especially one employed to report news or conduct interviews for the press or broadcasting media. |
| reporting | The news as presented by reporters for newspapers or radio or television. |
| <u>subscribe</u> | Arrange for access to an electronic mailing list or online service. <i>We prefer to subscribe to an alternative explanation.</i> |
| subscriber | Someone who contributes (or promises to contribute) a sum of money. <i>Subscribers to the distress fund.</i> |
| <u>writer</u> | A person who has written something or who writes in a particular way. <i>Dickens was a prolific writer.</i> |
