### Definitions of "Journal" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “journal” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The part of the axle contained by a bearing.*
- *A ledger in which transactions have been recorded as they occurred.*
- *A daily record of news and events of a personal nature; a diary.*
- *The part of a shaft or axle that rests on bearings.*
- *A record of the daily proceedings in the Houses of Parliament.*
- *A logbook.*
- *(in bookkeeping) a daily record of business transactions with a statement of the accounts to which each is to be debited and credited.*
- *A newspaper or magazine that deals with a particular subject or professional activity.*
- *A daily written record of (usually personal) experiences and observations.*
- *A periodical dedicated to a particular subject.*
- *A record book as a physical object.*

<b>blog</b>	A regularly updated website or web page, typically one run by an individual or small group, that is written in an informal or conversational style. <i>Postings on a <b>blog</b> are usually in chronological order.</i>
<b><a href="#">bulletin</a></b>	A regular newsletter or report issued by an organization.
<b>daily record</b>	A newspaper that is published every day.
<b>day-by-day account</b>	The period of time taken by a particular planet (e.g. Mars) to make a complete rotation on its axis.
<b>daybook</b>	An account book in which a day's transactions are entered for later transfer to a ledger. <i>He bought a new <b>daybook</b>.</i>

<b>diary</b>	A column in a newspaper or magazine giving news or gossip on a particular topic. <i>The City <b>Diary</b>.</i>
<b>digest</b>	A substance or mixture obtained by digestion. <i>A <b>digest</b> of cloned DNA.</i>
<b>gazette</b>	An official publication containing lists of government appointments and promotions and other public notices. <i>An announcement in Tuesday's London <b>Gazette</b> will make clear that he is being stripped of the honour.</i>
<b>log</b>	An official record of events during the voyage of a ship or aircraft. <i>An email <b>log</b>.</i>
<b>logbook</b>	An official record of events during the voyage of a ship or aircraft.
<b>magazine</b>	A business firm that publishes magazines. <i>Tripped over a pile of <b>magazines</b>.</i>
<b>moblog</b>	A blog that consists of pictures and other content posted from a mobile phone.
<b>newsletter</b>	A bulletin issued periodically to the members of a society or other organization.
<b>periodical</b>	A publication that appears at fixed intervals.
<b>professional organ</b>	A person engaged in one of the learned professions.
<b>publication</b>	The preparation and issuing of a book, journal, or piece of music for public sale. <i>The <b>publication</b> of her first novel.</i>
<b>review</b>	An essay or article that gives a critical evaluation (as of a book or play). <i>He conducted a final <b>review</b> of his troops and spoke of his pride in having served in the US army.</i>
<b>vlog</b>	A personal website or social media account where a person regularly posts short videos. <i>You can add travel <b>vlogs</b> to the growing list of travel related material popping up on the Web.</i>
<b>yearbook</b>	An annual publication giving current information and listing events or aspects of the previous year, especially in a particular field. <i>The Rugby Union <b>Yearbook</b>.</i>

<b>article</b>	The definite or indefinite article. <i>Small household <b>articles</b>.</i>
<b>author</b>	Be the author of. <i>The <b>authors</b> of the peace plan.</i>
<b>bimonthly</b>	Twice a month. <i>A <b>bimonthly</b> newsletter.</i>
<b>book</b>	A bookmaker's record of bets accepted and money paid out. <i>The cop <b>booked</b> me and took me down to the station.</i>
<b>coauthor</b>	A writer who collaborates with others in writing something.
<b>columnist</b>	A journalist who writes editorials.
<b>contributor</b>	A person who donates to a cause. <i>Stress is a major <b>contributor</b> to most diseases.</i>

<b>correspondent</b>	A journalist employed to provide news stories for newspapers or broadcast media. <i>A cricket <b>correspondent</b>.</i>
<b>dramatist</b>	A person who writes plays.
<b>editor</b>	Computer science a program designed to perform such editorial functions as rearrangement or modification or deletion of data. <i>A sports <b>editor</b>.</i>
<b><u>freelance</u></b>	Earning one's living as a freelance. <i>A <b>freelance</b> journalist.</i>
<b>gazette</b>	Publish in a gazette. <i>A <b>gazetted</b> holiday.</i>
<b>journalist</b>	A person who writes for newspapers, magazines, or news websites or prepares news to be broadcast. <i>He was a seasoned TV <b>journalist</b>.</i>
<b>literary</b>	Of language associated with literary works or other formal writing having a marked style intended to create a particular emotional effect. <i>The script was too <b>literary</b>.</i>
<b>magazine</b>	A business firm that publishes magazines. <i>He took the machine gun and a spare <b>magazine</b>.</i>
<b>monthly</b>	Once a month; every month. <i>The Council held <b>monthly</b> meetings.</i>
<b>newspaper</b>	Cheap paper made from wood pulp and used for printing newspapers. <i>Murdoch owns many <b>newspapers</b>.</i>
<b>novelist</b>	A writer of novels.
<b>pamphleteer</b>	A writer of pamphlets (usually taking a partisan stand on public issues). <i>The right to <b>pamphleteer</b> and post bills anonymously is as important today as it was three centuries ago.</i>
<b>periodical</b>	A publication that appears at fixed intervals. <i>She took <b>periodical</b> gulps of her tea.</i>
<b><u>publication</u></b>	A book or journal issued for public sale. <i>The <b>publication</b> of April trade figures.</i>
<b>publisher</b>	The proprietor of a newspaper. <i>A commercial music <b>publisher</b>.</i>
<b>quarterly</b>	A magazine or journal that is published four times a year. <i>Interest is paid <b>quarterly</b>.</i>
<b>reader</b>	A proofreader. <i>She's an avid <b>reader</b>.</i>

- readership** The readers of a newspaper, magazine, or book regarded collectively.  
*The magazine has a **readership** of just 65 000.*
- reporter** A person who reports, especially one employed to report news or conduct interviews for the press or broadcasting media.
- reporting** The news as presented by reporters for newspapers or radio or television.
- subscribe** Arrange for access to an electronic mailing list or online service.  
*We prefer to **subscribe** to an alternative explanation.*
- subscriber** Someone who contributes (or promises to contribute) a sum of money.  
***Subscribers** to the distress fund.*
- writer** A person who has written something or who writes in a particular way.  
*Dickens was a prolific **writer**.*
