airy	Not practical or realizable; speculative. <i>Airy rooms.</i>
beaming	Smiling broadly; grinning. <i>Beaming parents.</i>
breezy	Abounding in or exposed to the wind or breezes. <i>It was a bright breezy day.</i>
bright	Not made dim or less bright. <i>Her bright dark eyes.</i>
bubbly	Containing bubbles. <i>A bright and bubbly personality.</i>
celebratory	Feeling or expressing happiness and pride. <i>The impending anniversary has the restaurant in a celebratory mood.</i>
cheerful	Pleasantly (even unrealistically) optimistic. <i>Her cheerful nature.</i>

cheering	Shouting for joy or in praise or encouragement. <i>Cheering news.</i>
cheery	Happy and optimistic. A <i>cheery</i> hello.
<u>delightful</u>	Causing delight; charming. A <i>delightful</i> surprise.
<u>ebullient</u>	(of liquid or matter) boiling or agitated as if boiling. She sounded <i>ebullient</i> and happy.
<u>effervescent</u>	(of a liquid) giving off bubbles; fizzy. <i>Effervescent</i> young people.
elated	Full of high-spirited delight. After the concert I felt <i>elated</i> .
exuberant	Characterized by a vigorously imaginative artistic style. <i>Exuberant</i> compliments.
<u>festive</u>	Offering fun and gaiety. The <i>festive</i> season is fast approaching.
<u>glad</u>	Showing or causing joy and pleasure; especially made happy. He was <i>glad</i> that Phyllis was gone.
<u>gleeful</u>	Exuberantly or triumphantly joyful. She gave a <i>gleeful</i> chuckle.
good	Used to emphasize that a number is at least as great as one claims. We all had a <i>good</i> time.
gratifying	Giving pleasure or satisfaction. The results were <i>gratifying</i> .
grinning	Grimacing grotesquely so as to reveal the teeth. She looked at Mick's <i>grinning</i> face.
happy	Eagerly disposed to act or to be of service. He had the <i>happy</i> knack of making people like him.
in good spirits	Directed or bound inward.
in high spirits	Currently fashionable.
jaunty	Having a cheerful, lively, and self-confident air- Frances G. Patton- H.M.Reynolds. A <i>jaunty</i> optimist.
<u>jolly</u>	Happy and cheerful. <i>Jolly</i> old Saint Nick.
<u>joyous</u>	Full of happiness and joy. Scenes of <i>joyous</i> celebration.

jubilant	Feeling or expressing great happiness and triumph. <i>A large number of jubilant fans ran on to the pitch.</i>
laughing	Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i>Laughing children.</i>
light-hearted	Carefree and happy and lighthearted.
<u>merry</u>	Cheerful and lively. <i>The streets were dense with merry throngs of students.</i>
mirthful	Full of or showing high-spirited merriment. <i>Mirthful laughter.</i>
pleasing	Giving pleasure and satisfaction. <i>A pleasing aroma.</i>
radiant	Of an appliance designed to emit radiant energy especially for cooking or heating. <i>Plants convert the radiant energy of the sun into chemical energy.</i>
smiling	Smiling with happiness or optimism Lewis Carroll. <i>It s nice to see everyone s smiling faces.</i>
<u>sparkling</u>	(of a drink) effervescent; fizzy. <i>Sparkling water.</i>
sprightly	Full of spirit and vitality. <i>A sprightly young girl.</i>
<u>sunny</u>	(of a person or their temperament) cheery and bright. <i>A sunny smile.</i>
welcome	(of a guest or new arrival) gladly received. <i>The news will be most welcome to those whose jobs will now be safeguarded.</i>

- beatific** Marked by utter benignity; resembling or befitting an angel or saint.
*A **beatific** smile.*
- blessedness** The state of being blessed with divine favour.
- blissful** Completely happy and contented.
***Blissful** young lovers.*
- cheerful** Causing happiness by its nature or appearance.
*A **cheerful** voice.*
- delighted** Filled with wonder and delight.
*A **delighted** smile.*
- delightful** Greatly pleasing or entertaining.
*The comedy was **delightful**.*
- ecstatic** Feeling or expressing overwhelming happiness or joyful excitement.
***Ecstatic** fans filled the stadium.*

elated	Ecstatically happy. <i>Felt elated and excited.</i>
enjoyable	Affording satisfaction or pleasure. <i>The company was enjoyable.</i>
enraptured	Feeling great rapture or delight.
euphoria	A feeling or state of intense excitement and happiness. <i>In his euphoria he had become convinced he could defeat them.</i>
euphoric	Exaggerated feeling of well-being or elation. <i>A euphoric sense of freedom.</i>
exaltation	A state of being carried away by overwhelming emotion- Charles Dickens. <i>The exaltation of the army as a place for brotherhood.</i>
exult	Feel or show triumphant elation or jubilation. <i>Exulting in her escape Lisa closed the door behind her.</i>
exultant	Triumphantly happy. <i>He waved to the exultant crowds.</i>
exultation	A feeling of triumphant elation or jubilation; rejoicing. <i>She laughs in exultation.</i>
glad	Willing and eager (to do something). <i>I m really glad to hear that.</i>
happy	Inclined to use a specified thing excessively or at random. <i>Spent many happy days on the beach.</i>
joy	Feel happiness or joy. <i>The joy of being alive.</i>
joyous	Full of or characterized by joy. <i>Scenes of joyous celebration.</i>
jubilant	Feeling or expressing great happiness and triumph. <i>A large number of jubilant fans ran on to the pitch.</i>
laughing	Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i>Laughing children.</i>
merry	(of an occasion or season) characterized by festivity and enjoyment. <i>Have a merry Christmas.</i>
pleased	Willing or glad to do something. <i>A pleased smile.</i>
pleasurable	Pleasing; enjoyable. <i>Full of happiness and pleasurable excitement.</i>

- rapture** (according to some millenarian teaching) the transporting of believers to heaven at the Second Coming of Christ.
*The tabloids went into **raptures** about her.*
- rejoice** Used ironically to draw attention to a strange characteristic, especially a name.
*I love to **rejoice** their poor Hearts at this season.*
- rejoicing** Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success.
***Rejoicing** crowds filled the streets on VJ Day.*
- smile** Express with a smile.
*He flashed his most winning **smile**.*
- smiling** Smiling with happiness or optimism Lewis Carroll.
*It s nice to see everyone s **smiling** faces.*
