| acquit | Pronounce not guilty of criminal charges. <i>The jury acquitted Bream of murder.</i> |
| adjudge | (in legal use) award something judicially to. <i>The court adjudged legal damages to her.</i> |
| appellate | Of or relating to or taking account of appeals (usually legal appeals). <i>Courts of appellate jurisdiction.</i> |
| arbiter | A person whose views or actions have influence in a particular sphere. <i>An arbiter of taste.</i> |
| assessor | An official who evaluates property for the purpose of taxing it. <i>The assessor interviews the candidates and observes them actually using the language.</i> |
| chancery | The court of a bishop’s chancellor. |
| court | The place where a court meets. <i>He lived for four years at the court of King Philip.</i> |
| courtroom | The place or room in which a court of law meets. <i>A bitter courtroom battle.</i> |
| critically | In a way that expresses disapproval. <i>Two critically wounded people died in hospital.</i> |
| estimation | A rough calculation of the value, number, quantity, or extent of something. <i>Estimations of protein concentrations.</i> |
| evaluate | Evaluate or estimate the nature quality ability extent or significance of. <i>Substitute numbers in a simple formula and evaluate the answer.</i> |
| evaluator | A person who assesses the amount, extent, or value of something. <i>The government appointed an independent evaluator to determine the value of the mine.</i> |

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| eyewitness | A person who has seen something happen and can give a first-hand description of it. <i>Eyewitness accounts of the London blitz.</i> |
| judgement | A decision of a law court or judge. <i>The events of last week are a judgement on us for our sinful ways.</i> |
| judicial | Belonging or appropriate to the office of a judge. <i>A judicial inquiry into the allegations.</i> |
| jury | A body of people selected to judge a competition. <i>The jury returned unanimous guilty verdicts.</i> |
| justice | A public official authorized to decide questions brought before a court of justice. <i>The justice of his case.</i> |
| lawful | Of a child born within a lawful marriage. <i>Lawful methods of dissent.</i> |
| lawgiver | A person who draws up and enacts laws. <i>The monarch was supreme executive lawgiver judge and warrior.</i> |
| legality | The quality or state of being in accordance with the law. <i>Documentation testifying to the legality of the arms sale.</i> |
| magistracy | The position of magistrate. <i>The problem is to persuade both their supporters and the judiciary and magistracy.</i> |
| magistrate | A lay judge or civil authority who administers the law (especially one who conducts a court dealing with minor offenses). |
| mistrial | An inconclusive trial, such as one in which the jury cannot agree on a verdict. <i>The judge dismissed the charge and declared a mistrial.</i> |
| referee | Be a referee or umpire in a sports competition. <i>Most journals send the referees reports to the author.</i> |
| sheriff | An officer of the Supreme Court who enforces judgements and the execution of writs. |
| supervisor | One who supervises or has charge and direction of. |
| suspicion | An impression that something might be the case. <i>He tried to shield me from suspicion.</i> |
| tribunal | A court of justice. <i>An international war crimes tribunal.</i> |
| umpire | Be a referee or umpire in a sports competition. <i>He umpired the World Cup final.</i> |
