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## Associations of "Judged" (30 Words)

<b>acquit</b>	Pronounce not guilty of criminal charges. <i>The jury <b>acquitted</b> Bream of murder.</i>
<b>adjudge</b>	(in legal use) award something judicially to. <i>The court <b>adjudged</b> legal damages to her.</i>
<b>appellate</b>	Of or relating to or taking account of appeals (usually legal appeals). <i>Courts of <b>appellate</b> jurisdiction.</i>
<b>arbiter</b>	A person whose views or actions have influence in a particular sphere. <i>An <b>arbiter</b> of taste.</i>
<b>assessor</b>	An official who evaluates property for the purpose of taxing it. <i>The <b>assessor</b> interviews the candidates and observes them actually using the language.</i>
<b>chancery</b>	The court of a bishop’s chancellor.
<b>court</b>	The place where a court meets. <i>He lived for four years at the <b>court</b> of King Philip.</i>
<b>courtroom</b>	The place or room in which a court of law meets. <i>A bitter <b>courtroom</b> battle.</i>
<b>critically</b>	In a way that expresses disapproval. <i>Two <b>critically</b> wounded people died in hospital.</i>
<b>estimation</b>	A rough calculation of the value, number, quantity, or extent of something. <i><b>Estimations</b> of protein concentrations.</i>
<b>evaluate</b>	Evaluate or estimate the nature quality ability extent or significance of. <i>Substitute numbers in a simple formula and <b>evaluate</b> the answer.</i>
<b>evaluator</b>	A person who assesses the amount, extent, or value of something. <i>The government appointed an independent <b>evaluator</b> to determine the value of the mine.</i>

<b>eyewitness</b>	A person who has seen something happen and can give a first-hand description of it. <i><b>Eyewitness</b> accounts of the London blitz.</i>
<b>judgement</b>	A decision of a law court or judge. <i>The events of last week are a <b>judgement</b> on us for our sinful ways.</i>
<b>judicial</b>	Belonging or appropriate to the office of a judge. <i>A <b>judicial</b> inquiry into the allegations.</i>
<b>jury</b>	A body of people selected to judge a competition. <i>The <b>jury</b> returned unanimous guilty verdicts.</i>
<b>justice</b>	A public official authorized to decide questions brought before a court of justice. <i>The <b>justice</b> of his case.</i>
<b>lawful</b>	Of a child born within a lawful marriage. <i><b>Lawful</b> methods of dissent.</i>
<b>lawgiver</b>	A person who draws up and enacts laws. <i>The monarch was supreme executive <b>lawgiver</b> judge and warrior.</i>
<b>legality</b>	The quality or state of being in accordance with the law. <i>Documentation testifying to the <b>legality</b> of the arms sale.</i>
<b>magistracy</b>	The position of magistrate. <i>The problem is to persuade both their supporters and the judiciary and <b>magistracy</b>.</i>
<b>magistrate</b>	A lay judge or civil authority who administers the law (especially one who conducts a court dealing with minor offenses).
<b>mistrial</b>	An inconclusive trial, such as one in which the jury cannot agree on a verdict. <i>The judge dismissed the charge and declared a <b>mistrial</b>.</i>
<b>referee</b>	Be a referee or umpire in a sports competition. <i>Most journals send the <b>referees</b> reports to the author.</i>
<b>sheriff</b>	An officer of the Supreme Court who enforces judgements and the execution of writs.
<b>supervisor</b>	One who supervises or has charge and direction of.
<b>suspicion</b>	An impression that something might be the case. <i>He tried to shield me from <b>suspicion</b>.</i>
<b>tribunal</b>	A court of justice. <i>An international war crimes <b>tribunal</b>.</i>
<b>umpire</b>	Be a referee or umpire in a sports competition. <i>He <b>umpired</b> the World Cup final.</i>
