## Juggle as a Verb

### Definitions of "Juggle" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "juggle" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Deal with simultaneously.*
- *Manipulate by or as if by moving around components.*
- *Continuously toss into the air and catch (a number of objects) so as to keep at least one in the air while handling the others.*
- *Influence by slyness.*
- *Throw, catch, and keep in the air several things simultaneously.*
- *Cope with by adroitly balancing (several activities).*
- *Hold with difficulty and balance insecurely.*
- *Organize (information or figures) in order to give a particular impression.*

<b><u>manipulate</u></b>	Manipulate in a fraudulent manner. <i>He <b>manipulated</b> the dials of the set.</i>
<b><u>massage</u></b>	Give a massage to. <i>She <b>massaged</b> his sore back.</i>
<b>misrepresent</b>	Give a false or misleading account of the nature of. <i>This statement <b>misrepresents</b> my intentions.</i>
<b>misstate</b>	State something incorrectly. <i>To say that he was alone <b>misstates</b> the case.</i>
<b>rig</b>	Provide a sailing boat with sails and rigging. <i><b>Rig</b> an election.</i>
<b>tamper with</b>	Play around with or alter or falsify, usually secretly or dishonestly.

<b>acrobat</b>	An entertainer who performs spectacular gymnastic feats.
<b>amusement</b>	A feeling of delight at being entertained. <i>On the promenade the <b>amusements</b> were still open.</i>
<b>artist</b>	A person skilled at a particular task or occupation. <i>A surgeon who is an <b>artist</b> with the scalpel.</i>
<b>ball</b>	In baseball a pitch delivered outside the strike zone which the batter does not attempt to hit. <i>A cricket <b>ball</b>.</i>
<b>buffoon</b>	A person who amuses others by ridiculous behavior.
<b>carnival</b>	A frenetic disorganized (and often comic) disturbance suggestive of a large public entertainment. <i>A <b>carnival</b> parade.</i>
<b>cast</b>	A mould used to make an object by casting. <i>I had to spend a month in a <b>cast</b>.</i>
<b>circus</b>	A rounded open space in a town or city where several streets converge. <i>The children always love to go to the <b>circus</b>.</i>
<b>clown</b>	Act as or like a clown. <i>A circus <b>clown</b>.</i>
<b>comedian</b>	An entertainer on stage or television whose act is designed to make an audience laugh. <i>They sat watching an Irish <b>comedian</b> telling jokes.</i>
<b>dance</b>	Dance steps and movements considered as an activity or art form. <i>Midges <b>danced</b> over the stream.</i>
<b>entertainment</b>	The action of providing or being provided with amusement or enjoyment. <i>A theatrical <b>entertainment</b>.</i>
<b>festival</b>	An organized series of concerts, plays, or films, typically one held annually in the same place. <i>A drama <b>festival</b>.</i>
<b>firework</b>	A device with an explosive that burns at a low rate and with colored flames; can be used to illuminate areas or send signals etc. <i>A <b>firework</b> display.</i>
<b>gymnast</b>	A person trained or skilled in gymnastics.
<b>juggling</b>	The act of rearranging things to give a misleading impression.
<b>masquerade</b>	Take part in a masquerade. <i>I doubt he could have kept up the <b>masquerade</b> for long.</i>

<b>mime</b>	A practitioner of mime or a performer in a mime. <i>They've even <b>mimed</b> in a restaurant hall.</i>
<b>pantomime</b>	An absurd or confused situation. <i>They <b>pantomimed</b> picking up dropped food.</i>
<b>parade</b>	A parade ground. <i>She <b>parades</b> her new husband around town.</i>
<b>perform</b>	Perform a function. <i>We <b>performed</b> a popular Gilbert and Sullivan opera.</i>
<b>prankster</b>	Someone who plays practical jokes on others.
<b>props</b>	Proper respect. <i>Certain sectors of the music fraternity still refuse to give him <b>props</b>.</i>
<b>roller</b>	A small wheel without spokes as on a roller skate. <i>Further coats can be applied by brush or <b>roller</b>.</i>
<b>sideshow</b>	A minor show that is part of a larger one (as at the circus). <i>Asylum seeking in the west is a damaging and distracting <b>sideshow</b>.</i>
<b>stunt</b>	Perform a stunt or stunts. <i>Some weeds produce chemicals that <b>stunt</b> the plant's growth.</i>
<b>toss</b>	An act or instance of tossing something. <i>A defiant <b>toss</b> of her head.</i>
<b>trapeze</b>	A horizontal bar hanging by two ropes and free to swing, used by acrobats in a circus.
<b>tumbler</b>	Pigeon that executes backward somersaults in flight or on the ground.
<b>vaudeville</b>	A variety show with songs and comic acts etc. <i>His comedic roots are in <b>vaudeville</b>.</i>
