<b>antic</b>	Act as or like a clown. <i>Hamlet s assumed <b>antic</b> disposition.</i>
<b>artist</b>	A person skilled at a particular task or occupation. <i>Rip off <b>artists</b>.</i>
<b>ball</b>	Baseball. <i>There was a desire for National League <b>ball</b> in the area.</i>
<b>carnival</b>	An exciting or riotous mixture of elements. <i>The culmination of the week long <b>carnival</b>.</i>

<b>circus</b>	An arena consisting of an oval or circular area enclosed by tiers of seats and usually covered by a tent. <i>They used the elephants to help put up the <b>circus</b>.</i>
<b>clown</b>	Act as or like a clown. <i>A circus <b>clown</b>.</i>
<b>dance</b>	Dance steps and movements considered as an activity or art form. <i>He gesticulated comically and did a little <b>dance</b>.</i>
<b>entertainment</b>	The action of receiving a guest or guests and providing them with food and drink. <i>A theatrical <b>entertainment</b>.</i>
<b>farce</b>	The dramatic genre represented by farces. <i>The choreographed confusion of real <b>farce</b>.</i>
<b>festival</b>	A day or period of time set aside for feasting and celebration. <i>Traditional Jewish <b>festivals</b>.</i>
<b>gymnast</b>	A person trained or skilled in gymnastics.
<b>juggle</b>	Influence by slyness. <i>She had to <b>juggle</b> her job and her children.</i>
<b>magic</b>	Move change or create by or as if by magic. <i>It was a great time <b>magic</b>.</i>
<b>masquerade</b>	Take part in a masquerade. <i>Idle gossip that <b>masquerades</b> as news.</i>
<b>mime</b>	A practitioner of mime or a performer in a mime. <i>Singers on television often <b>mime</b> to pre recorded tape tracks.</i>
<b>mimic</b>	An animal or plant that mimics another. <i>Tiger beetles are <b>mimicked</b> by grasshoppers.</i>
<b>pantomime</b>	Express or represent by exaggerated mime. <i>They <b>pantomimed</b> picking up dropped food.</i>
<b>parade</b>	A parade ground. <i>A St George s Day <b>parade</b>.</i>
<b>performance</b>	The act of presenting a play or a piece of music or other entertainment. <i>They listened to ten different <b>performances</b>.</i>
<b>props</b>	Due respect. <i>Certain sectors of the music fraternity still refuse to give him <b>props</b>.</i>
<b>roller</b>	A small wheel without spokes as on a roller skate. <i>Use a <b>roller</b> to resettle turf laid during autumn and winter.</i>

<b>sideshow</b>	A minor or diverting incident or issue, especially one which distracts attention from something more important. <i>Instruction is not an educational <b>sideshow</b>.</i>
<b>silently</b>	Without speaking. <i>He <b>silently</b> cursed himself for his actions.</i>
<b>stunt</b>	Perform a stunt or stunts. <i>You will <b>stunt</b> your growth by building all these muscles.</i>
<b>toss</b>	Throw or toss with a light motion. <i>Suzy <b>tossed</b> her bag on to the sofa.</i>
<b>trapeze</b>	A swing used by circus acrobats.
<b>tumbler</b>	A glass with a flat bottom but no handle or stem; originally had a round bottom.
<b>vaudeville</b>	A type of entertainment popular chiefly in the US in the early 20th century, featuring a mixture of speciality acts such as burlesque comedy and song and dance. <i>A stage show with <b>vaudeville</b> acts and dancing girls.</i>
