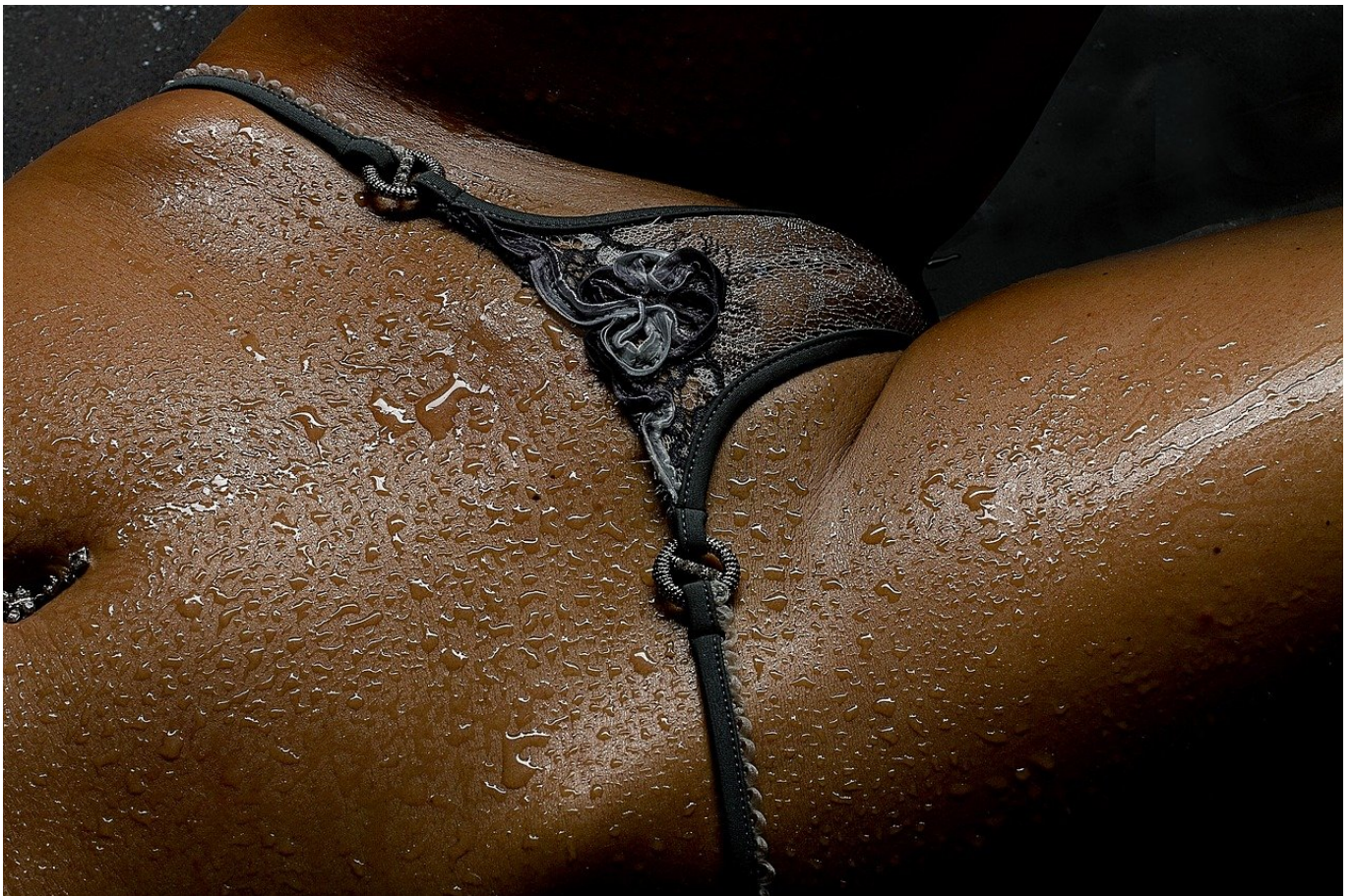
## Just as an Adjective

- *Used especially of what is legally or ethically right or proper or fitting- A.Lincoln.*
- *(of an opinion or appraisal) well founded; justifiable.*
- *(of treatment) deserved or appropriate in the circumstances.*
- *Based on or behaving according to what is morally right and fair.*

- *Of moral excellence.*
- *Used especially of what is legally or ethically right or proper or fitting.*
- *Fair to all parties as dictated by reason and conscience.*
- *Free from favoritism or self-interest or bias or deception; conforming with established standards or rules.*

<b>impartial</b>	Showing lack of favoritism. <i>The <b>impartial</b> eye of a scientist.</i>
<b>justifiable</b>	Capable of being justified. <i>Their <b>justifiable</b> fears.</i>
<b>justified</b>	Declared or made righteous in the sight of God. <i>A neatly <b>justified</b> list of names.</i>
<b>legitimate</b>	Authorized, sanctioned by, or in accordance with law. <i>A <b>legitimate</b> government.</i>
<b><u>logical</u></b>	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>A <b>logical</b> impossibility.</i>
<b>merited</b>	Properly deserved. <i>A <b>merited</b> success.</i>
<b><u>neutral</u></b>	Having no personal preference. <i>Walls are painted in <b>neutral</b> tones.</i>
<b>objective</b>	(of a person or their judgement) not influenced by personal feelings or opinions in considering and representing facts. <i>A matter of <b>objective</b> fact.</i>
<b>open-minded</b>	Ready to entertain new ideas.
<b>reasonable</b>	Fairly good; average. <i><b>Reasonable</b> prices.</i>
<b>sound</b>	(of sleep) deep and complete. <i>A <b>sound</b> title to the property.</i>
<b>unbiased</b>	Characterized by a lack of partiality. <i>His assessment of the benefits and drawbacks was <b>unbiased</b>.</i>
<b>unprejudiced</b>	Free from undue bias or preconceived opinions. <i>An <b>unprejudiced</b> appraisal of the pros and cons.</i>

<b>upright</b>	Upright in position or posture. An <b>upright</b> vacuum cleaner.
<b><u>valid</u></b>	Well grounded in logic or truth or having legal force. A <b>valid</b> inference.
<b>warrantable</b>	(of an action or statement) able to be authorized or sanctioned; justifiable. A <b>warrantable</b> assertion.
<b>well deserved</b>	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.
<b>well earned</b>	Resulting favorably.
<b>well founded</b>	Wise or advantageous and hence advisable.
<b>well grounded</b>	Wise or advantageous and hence advisable.

- *Possibly (used to indicate a slight chance of something happening or being true).*
- *Simply; only; no more than.*
- *Absolutely.*
- *(used for emphasis) absolutely.*
- *Barely; by a little.*
- *Indicating exactness or preciseness.*
- *Very recently; in the immediate past.*
- *Expressing agreement.*

<b><u>exactly</u></b>	Just as it should be. <i>They met in 1989 and got married <b>exactly</b> two years later.</i>
<b><u>hardly</u></b>	No or not (suggesting surprise at or disagreement with a statement). <i>He <b>hardly</b> ever goes fishing.</i>
<b>in all respects</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in every respect</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in every way</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>just now</b>	Only a moment ago.
<b>lately</b>	In the recent past. <i><b>Lately</b> the rules have been enforced.</i>
<b><u>merely</u></b>	And nothing more. <i>Gary a silent boy <b>merely</b> nodded.</i>
<b>narrowly</b>	In a limited or restricted way. <i><b>Narrowly</b> defined tasks.</i>
<b>no more than</b>	Used to express refusal or denial or disagreement etc or especially to emphasize a negative statement.
<b>not long ago</b>	For an extended time or at a distant time.
<b>nothing but</b>	In no respect; to no degree.
<b><u>only</u></b>	Not until. <i>She was still <b>only</b> in her mid thirties.</i>
<b>only just</b>	With nevertheless the final result.
<b>only now</b>	In the final outcome.
<b>perfectly</b>	Used for emphasis, especially in order to assert something that has been challenged or doubted. <i>The ring fitted <b>perfectly</b>.</i>

<b>positively</b>	In a way that indicates the presence of a certain substance or condition. <i>It s time I got down to thinking <b>positively</b> about this show.</i>
<b>precisely</b>	Used as a reply to confirm or agree with a previous statement. <i>He was doing <b>precisely</b> or exactly what she had told him to do.</i>
<u><b>properly</b></u>	With reason or justice. <i>I m trying to get my mother to behave <b>properly</b>.</i>
<u><b>quite</b></u>	Actually or truly or to an extreme. <i>It s <b>quite</b> out of the question.</i>
<b>really</b>	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>Do you <b>really</b> expect me to believe that.</i>
<u><b>scarce</b></u>	Scarcely. <i>Would have <b>scarce</b> arrived before she would have found some excuse to leave.</i>
<b>scarcely</b>	Only a very short time before. <i>Had <b>scarcely</b> rung the bell when the door flew open.</i>
<u><b>simply</b></u>	Merely; just. <i>It is <b>simply</b> a matter of time.</i>
<u><b>thoroughly</b></u>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>We searched the files <b>thoroughly</b>.</i>
<u><b>totally</b></u>	Used to express agreement. <i>Some of the lyrics are <b>totally</b> brilliant.</i>
<u><b>utterly</b></u>	Completely and without qualification; absolutely. <i><b>Utterly</b> miserable.</i>
<b>very recently</b>	Precisely so.
<u><b>wholly</b></u>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>The distinction is not <b>wholly</b> clear.</i>

<b>applicable</b>	Capable of being applied; having relevance. <i>Gave <b>applicable</b> examples to support her argument.</i>
<b><u>apposite</u></b>	Apt in the circumstances or in relation to something. <i>The observations are <b>apposite</b> to the discussion.</i>
<b>appropriate</b>	Suitable or proper in the circumstances. <i>A funeral conducted the <b>appropriate</b> solemnity.</i>



<b><u>apropos</u></b>	Very appropriate to a particular situation. <i>The song feels <b>apropos</b> to a midnight jaunt.</i>
<b><u>apt</u></b>	Having a tendency to do something. <i>He is <b>apt</b> to ignore matters he considers unimportant.</i>
<b><u>barely</u></b>	By a little. <i>A <b>barely</b> perceptible pause.</i>
<b>coincidentally</b>	In a way that results from chance despite being very unlikely. <i>The three are <b>coincidentally</b> reunited when captured by the enemy.</i>
<b>correct</b>	Correct in opinion or judgment. <i>The steel industry's current overcapacity will be <b>corrected</b> this year.</i>
<b>felicitous</b>	Well chosen or suited to the circumstances. <i>The view was the room's only <b>felicitous</b> feature.</i>
<b>fitting</b>	The action of fitting something. <i>Loose <b>fitting</b> trousers.</i>
<b>germane</b>	Relevant to a subject under consideration. <i>That is not <b>germane</b> to our theme.</i>
<b>happenstance</b>	Coincidence. <i>It was just <b>happenstance</b> that I happened to be there.</i>
<b>incidentally</b>	Of a minor or subordinate nature. <i><b>Incidentally</b> it was many months before the whole truth was discovered.</i>
<b>legitimate</b>	Show or affirm to be just and legitimate. <i>The <b>legitimate</b> theatre.</i>
<b>licit</b>	Not forbidden; lawful. <i>Usage patterns differ between <b>licit</b> and <b>illicit</b> drugs.</i>
<b><u>mere</u></b>	Apart from anything else; without additions or modifications. <i>Questions that cannot be answered by <b>mere</b> mortals.</i>
<b><u>merely</u></b>	Just; only. <i>I was <b>merely</b> asking.</i>
<b><u>opportune</u></b>	Done or occurring at a favourable time; well timed. <i>An <b>opportune</b> time to receive guests.</i>
<b>pertinence</b>	Relevance by virtue of being applicable to the matter at hand.
<b>pertinent</b>	Being of striking appropriateness and pertinence. <i>Practitioners must consider all factors <b>pertinent</b> to a situation.</i>
<b>proper</b>	Used as an intensifier, especially in derogatory contexts. <i>An artist needs the <b>proper</b> tools.</i>

<b><u>relevant</u></b>	Closely connected or appropriate to what is being done or considered. <i>The scientist corresponds with colleagues in order to learn about matters <b>relevant</b> to her own research.</i>
<b>right</b>	A road or entrance on the right. <i>Are you politically <b>right</b> left or centre.</i>
<b>rightness</b>	Conformity with some esthetic standard of correctness or propriety. <i>The <b>rightness</b> of that move for me.</i>
<b>scarcely</b>	Only a very short time before. <i>Had <b>scarcely</b> rung the bell when the door flew open.</i>
<b>seemly</b>	According with custom or propriety. <i><b>Seemly</b> behavior.</i>
<b><u>seldom</u></b>	Not common; infrequent. <i>He was <b>seldom</b> absent.</i>
<b><u>simply</u></b>	(used for emphasis) absolutely. <i><b>Simply</b> complete the application form.</i>
<b><u>timely</u></b>	Done or occurring sufficiently early; prompt. <i>With <b>timely</b> treatment the patient has a good chance of recovery.</i>
<b>unconsciously</b>	Without realizing or being aware of one's actions. <i>Ben smiled <b>unconsciously</b> when he heard her voice.</i>
