### Definitions of "Justice" as a noun

- *A public official authorized to decide questions brought before a court of justice.*
- *A judge or magistrate, in particular a judge of the Supreme Court of a country or state.*
- *The quality of being just or fair.*
- *The United States federal department responsible for enforcing federal laws (including the enforcement of all civil rights legislation); created in 1870.*
- *Just behaviour or treatment.*
- *The quality of being fair and reasonable.*



## Synonyms of "Justice" as a noun (28 Words)

<b>administration of the law</b>	The persons (or committees or departments etc.) who make up a body for the purpose of administering something.
<b>department of justice</b>	A specialized division of a large organization.
<b>disinterestedness</b>	Freedom from bias or from selfish motives.
<b>doj</b>	The United States federal department responsible for enforcing federal laws (including the enforcement of all civil rights legislation); created in 1870.
<b>egalitarianism</b>	A person who believes in the equality of all people.
<b><u>equity</u></b>	The value of the shares issued by a company. <i>He owns 62 of the group's <b>equity</b>.</i>
<b>fair play</b>	A sale of miscellany; often for charity.
<b>fair-mindedness</b>	Ability to make judgments free from discrimination or dishonesty.

fairness

The property of having a naturally light complexion.  
*I was impressed with her **fairness** and firm hand as manager.*

**her honour**

The state of being honored.

**his honour**

A woman's virtue or chastity.

**impartiality**

Equal treatment of all rivals or disputants; fairness.  
*Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure **impartiality** in the judging process.*

judge

An authority who is able to estimate worth or quality.  
*A distinguished panel of **judges** select the winning design.*

**jurist**

A lawyer or a judge.

**justice department**

The quality of being just or fair.

justification

Good reason for something that exists or has been done.  
*The **justification** of revolutionary action.*

**justness**

The quality of being just or fair.  
*It was performed with **justness** and beauty.*

**lack of bias**

The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.

**lack of prejudice**

The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.

**legitimacy**

Ability to be defended with logic or justification; validity.  
*Refusal to recognize the **legitimacy** of both governments.*

**legitimateness**

The quality or condition of being legitimate; legitimacy.

magistrate

A civil officer who administers the law, especially one who conducts a court that deals with minor offences and holds preliminary hearings for more serious ones.

**neutrality**

Tolerance attributable to a lack of involvement.  
*During the war Switzerland maintained its **neutrality**.*

objectivity

The quality of being objective.  
*The piece lacked any **objectivity**.*

**reasonableness**

The quality of being plausible or acceptable to a reasonable person.  
*Disputes about the **reasonableness** of certain costs.*

**soundness**


The quality of being based on valid reason or good judgement.  
*We will win because of the **soundness** of our arguments.*

validity

The quality of being valid and rigorous.  
*Return travel must be within the **validity** of the ticket.*

**your honour**

The state of being honored.



## Usage Examples of "Justice" as a noun

- *A concern for justice, peace, and genuine respect for people.*
- *A tragic miscarriage of justice.*



## Associations of "Justice" (30 Words)

<b>allegation</b>	A formal accusation against somebody (often in a court of law). <i>He made <b>allegations</b> of corruption against the administration.</i>
<b>as</b>	A United States territory on the eastern part of the island of Samoa. <i><b>As</b> many <b>as</b> twenty two rare species may be at risk.</i>
<u><b>conformity</b></u>	Hardened conventionality. <i>Their financial statements are in <b>conformity</b> with generally accepted accounting practices.</i>
<u><b>counterbalance</b></u>	Contrast with equal weight or force. <i>The trolley used a <b>counterbalance</b> and leverage action to reduce the effort of lifting loads.</i>

<b>disinterested</b>	Unaffected by self-interest. <i>A banker is under an obligation to give <b>disinterested</b> advice.</i>
<b>dispassion</b>	Objectivity and detachment. <i>Try to look upon the war with <b>dispassion</b> and detachment.</i>
<b>dispassionate</b>	Unaffected by strong emotion or prejudice. <i>A journalist should be a <b>dispassionate</b> reporter of fact.</i>
<b>equal</b>	A person who is of equal standing with another in a group. <i>A dedicated campaigner for <b>equal</b> rights.</i>
<b>equality</b>	The state of being equal, especially in status, rights, or opportunities. <i>An organization aiming to promote racial <b>equality</b>.</i>
<u><b>equalize</b></u>	Make the same in quantity, size, or degree throughout a place or group. <i>Morgan <b>equalized</b> ten minutes into the second half.</i>
<u><b>equally</b></u>	To the same degree (often followed by `as). <i>The money can be divided <b>equally</b> between you.</i>
<b>equipoise</b>	Balance or counterbalance (something). <i>This temporary <b>equipoise</b> of power.</i>
<b>equitable</b>	Fair to all parties as dictated by reason and conscience. <i>An <b>equitable</b> distribution of gifts among the children.</i>
<u><b>equity</b></u>	The difference between the market value of a property and the claims held against it. <i>People who have built up a significant amount of <b>equity</b> in their homes.</i>
<b>evenhanded</b>	Without partiality. <i><b>Evenhanded</b> justice.</i>
<b>fair</b>	Without favoring one party in a fair evenhanded manner. <i>They set sail with a <b>fair</b> wind.</i>
<b>impartial</b>	Free from undue bias or preconceived opinions. <i>The minister cannot be <b>impartial</b> in the way that a judge would be.</i>
<b>impartiality</b>	An inclination to weigh both views or opinions equally. <i>Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure <b>impartiality</b> in the judging process.</i>
<b>impartially</b>	In a way that treats all rivals or disputants equally. <i>The adjudicator should act <b>impartially</b> in carrying out his duties.</i>
<u><b>magistrate</b></u>	A lay judge or civil authority who administers the law (especially one who conducts a court dealing with minor offenses).
<u><b>neutral</b></u>	An electrically neutral point terminal conductor or wire. <i>Her tone was <b>neutral</b> devoid of sentiment.</i>

<b>neutrality</b>	Nonparticipation in a dispute or war. <i>The clinical <b>neutrality</b> of the description.</i>
<b>objectivity</b>	Judgment based on observable phenomena and uninfluenced by emotions or personal prejudices. <i>The piece lacked any <b>objectivity</b>.</i>
<b>retributive</b>	Of or relating to or having the nature of retribution. <i><b>Retributive</b> justice.</i>
<b>righteous</b>	Characterized by or proceeding from accepted standards of morality or justice- James 5:16. <i>Victory in battle was conferred on the <b>righteous</b>.</i>
<b>rightness</b>	The quality or state of being best or most appropriate for a particular situation. <i>The <b>rightness</b> of that move for me.</i>
<b>same</b>	Similarly in the same way. <i>She was saying the <b>same</b> thing over and over.</i>
<b>symmetrical</b>	Made up of exactly similar parts facing each other or around an axis; showing symmetry. <i>The shape of a hill smooth and <b>symmetrical</b>.</i>
<b>unbiased</b>	Without bias. <i>An <b>unbiased</b> account of her family problems.</i>
<b>unprejudiced</b>	Free from undue bias or preconceived opinions. <i>An <b>unprejudiced</b> appraisal of the pros and cons.</i>
