- The action of showing something to be right or reasonable.
- The action of declaring or making righteous in the sight of God.

#### Synonyms of "Justification" as a noun (11 Words)

basisThe underlying support or foundation for an idea, argument, or process.<br/>He worked on an interim basis.



<u>excuse</u>	A defense of some offensive behavior or some failure to keep a promise etc. As an <b>excuse</b> to get out of the house she went to post a letter.
explanation	A reason or justification given for an action or belief. Freud tried to make sex the <b>explanation</b> for everything.
foundation	Lowest support of a structure. <i>He lacks the <b>foundation</b> necessary for advanced study.</i>
grounds	A tract of land cleared for some special purposes (recreation or burial etc. <i>It is a Middle Eastern custom to read your future in your coffee grounds.</i>
premise	An assertion or proposition which forms the basis for a work or theory. If the <b>premise</b> is true then the conclusion must be true.
rationale	An explanation of the fundamental reasons (especially an explanation of the working of some device in terms of laws of nature. <i>The rationale</i> for capital punishment.
rationalization	The cognitive process of making something seem consistent with or based on reason. <i>Most people are prone to self deceptive <b>rationalization</b>.</i>
reason	The power of the mind to think, understand, and form judgements logically. There is <b>reason</b> to believe he is lying.
vindication	The action of clearing someone of blame or suspicion. The results were interpreted as <b>vindication</b> of the company s policy.
warrant	A type of security issued by a corporation (usually together with a bond or preferred stock) that gives the holder the right to purchase a certain amount of common stock at a stated price. <i>We ll issue you with a travel warrant</i> .

### Usage Examples of "Justification" as a noun

- The justification of barbarous means by holy ends.
- *He considered misrule a justification for revolution.*
- All these incidents were used again as a justification for my sacking.
- The justification of revolutionary action.
- He made a speech in justification of his career.
- There is no justification for an increase in charges.

justness	The quality of being just or fair. It was performed with <b>justness</b> and beauty.
<u>lawful</u>	Of a child born within a lawful marriage. <i>Lawful</i> methods of dissent.
legal	Having legal efficacy or force. The European <b>legal</b> system.
legality	The quality or state of being in accordance with the law. <i>Documentation testifying to the legality of the arms sale.</i>
legitimate	Make an illegitimate child legitimate declare the legitimacy of someone. A <b>legitimate</b> government.
legitimize	Make legitimate. <i>Voters <b>legitimize</b> the government through the election of public officials.</i>
licit	Not forbidden; lawful. Usage patterns differ between <b>licit</b> and il <b>licit</b> drugs.
moral	Psychological rather than physical or tangible in effect. <i>He is a caring <b>moral</b> man.</i>
principle	A basic generalization that is accepted as true and that can be used as a basis for reasoning or conduct. She resigned over a matter of <b>principle</b> .



proper	According to or respecting social standards or conventions; respectable, especially excessively so. <i>A proper meal</i> .
rational	Capable of being expressed as a quotient of integers. A <b>rational</b> analysis.
rationalization	The action of reorganizing a process or system so as to make it more logical and consistent. <i>Most people are prone to self deceptive <b>rationalization</b>.</i>
<u>rationalize</u>	Remove irrational quantities from. <i>Rationalize</i> the child s seemingly crazy behavior.
reason	Present reasons and arguments. I resigned for personal <b>reason</b> s.
rectitude	Righteousness as a consequence of being honorable and honest. <i>Mattie is a model of <b>rectitude</b></i> .
right	Socially right or correct. Harriet was standing <b>right</b> behind her.
<u>righteous</u>	Very good; excellent. He is <b>righteous</b> trash.
rightful	Legitimately claimed; fitting. A <b>rightful</b> inheritance.
scruple	Raise scruples. Without <b>scruple</b> politicians use fear as a persuasion weapon.
turpitude	A corrupt or depraved or degenerate act or practice. <i>Acts of moral <b>turpitude</b></i> .
uprightness	Righteousness as a consequence of being honorable and honest. There is a general lack of <b>uprightness</b> in these postmodern times.
<u>virtuous</u>	Chaste (typically used of a woman). She considered herself very <b>virtuous</b> because she neither drank nor smoked.
