According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "justify" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Be a good reason for.
- Adjust the spaces between words.
- Adjust (a line of type or piece of text) so that the print fills a space evenly or forms a straight edge at the margin.
- (used of God) declare innocent; absolve from the penalty of sin.
- Show to be right by providing justification or proof.
- Show to be reasonable or provide adequate ground for.
- Show or prove to be right or reasonable.
- Let off the hook.
- Declare or make righteous in the sight of God.
- Defend, explain, clear away, or make excuses for by reasoning.
