## Associations of "Keep at bay" (30 Words)

<a href="#">archipelago</a>	A group of many islands in a large body of water. <i>The Indonesian <b>archipelago</b>.</i>
<b>area</b>	A part of an animal that has a special function or is supplied by a given artery or nerve. <i>The dining <b>area</b>.</i>
<b>atlantic</b>	Relating to or bordering the Atlantic Ocean.
<a href="#">beach</a>	Land on a beach. <i>At the water s edge a rowing boat was <b>beached</b>.</i>
<a href="#">coast</a>	Sail along the coast especially in order to carry cargo. <i>They sailed further up the <b>coast</b>.</i>
<b>coastal</b>	Located on or near or bordering on a coast. <i><b>Coastal</b> waters.</i>
<b>dune</b>	A ridge of sand created by the wind; found in deserts or near lakes and oceans. <i>A sand <b>dune</b>.</i>
<b>estuary</b>	The wide part of a river where it nears the sea; fresh and salt water mix.
<b>eutrophication</b>	Excessive richness of nutrients in a lake or other body of water, frequently due to run-off from the land, which causes a dense growth of plant life. <i>He argued that the controlling factor in <b>eutrophication</b> is not nitrate but phosphate.</i>
<b>foreshore</b>	The part of a shore between high- and low-water marks, or between the water and cultivated or developed land.
<b>gulf</b>	A large difference or division between two people or groups, or between viewpoints, concepts, or situations. <i>The widening <b>gulf</b> between the rich and the poor.</i>
<b>insular</b>	Lacking contact with other people. <i>A stubbornly <b>insular</b> farming people.</i>

<b><u>island</u></b>	A thing regarded as resembling an island especially in being isolated detached or surrounded in some way. <i>The <b>island</b> of Crete.</i>
<b>islet</b>	A small island.
<b>isthmus</b>	A narrow strip of land with sea on either side, forming a link between two larger areas of land.
<b>lagoon</b>	A body of water cut off from a larger body by a reef of sand or coral.
<b>littoral</b>	The littoral zone. <i>The <b>littoral</b> states of the Indian Ocean.</i>
<b>maritime</b>	Living or found in or near the sea. <i>A <b>maritime</b> province.</i>
<b>nautical</b>	Relating to or involving ships or shipping or navigation or seamen. <i><b>Nautical</b> charts.</i>
<b><u>ocean</u></b>	A very large expanse or quantity. <i>She had <b>oceans</b> of energy.</i>
<b>peninsula</b>	A large mass of land projecting into a body of water.
<b>peninsular</b>	Denoting or relating to an area of land almost surrounded by water or projecting out into a body of water. <i>The counties of <b>peninsular</b> Florida.</i>
<b><u>region</u></b>	The approximate amount of something usually used prepositionally as in in the region of. <i>It was going to take in the <b>region</b> of two or three months to finish the job.</i>
<b>seacoast</b>	The shore of a sea or ocean.
<b>seashore</b>	The shore of a sea or ocean.
<b><u>shore</u></b>	Serve as a shore to. <i>I made for the <b>shore</b>.</i>
<b>southeast</b>	The southeastern region of the United States. <i><b>Southeasterly</b> breezes.</i>
<b>strait</b>	(of a place) of limited spatial capacity; narrow or cramped. <i>The road was so <b>strait</b> that a handful of men might have defended it.</i>
<b>tidal</b>	Relating to or affected by tides. <i>Strong <b>tidal</b> currents.</i>
<b>windswept</b>	(of a place) exposed to strong winds. <i>His <b>windswept</b> hair.</i>
