## Associations of "Keep up" (30 Words)

<b>ascend</b>	Travel up. <i>The road <b>ascends</b> to the loch.</i>
<b>ascending</b>	The act of changing location in an upward direction. <i>Incomes ranked in <b>ascending</b> order of size.</i>
<b>ascent</b>	An upward slope or grade (as in a road). <i>The first <b>ascent</b> of the Matterhorn.</i>
<b>boost</b>	Give a boost to be beneficial to. <i>The specially designed circuit <b>boosts</b> signal strength.</i>
<b><u>climb</u></b>	The act of climbing something. <i>How old will these graduates be before they begin a long <b>climb</b> out of debt.</i>
<b><u>climbing</u></b>	The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs. <i>His other great interest was <b>climbing</b> especially in the Alps.</i>
<b><u>elevate</u></b>	(of a priest) hold up (a consecrated host or chalice) for adoration. <i>He was <b>elevated</b> to Secretary of State.</i>
<b>elevator</b>	The airfoil on the tailplane of an aircraft that makes it ascend or descend. <i>Something in his gait made me sure he was wearing <b>elevator</b> shoes.</i>
<b>escalator</b>	A moving staircase consisting of an endlessly circulating belt of steps driven by a motor, which conveys people between the floors of a public building.
<b>high</b>	Being at or having a relatively great or specific elevation or upward extension sometimes used in combinations like knee high. <i>The sculpture stood about five feet <b>high</b>.</i>
<b><u>hoist</u></b>	Raise (something) by means of ropes and pulleys. <i>She <b>hoisted</b> her backpack on to her shoulder.</i>
<b>ladder</b>	With reference to tights or stockings develop or cause to develop a ladder. <i>Employees on their way up the career <b>ladder</b>.</i>
<b>lift</b>	A wave that lifts the surface of the water or ground. <i>That night the army came and <b>lifted</b> Buckley.</i>

<b>mounting</b>	The action of mounting something. <i>The <b>mounting</b> of rapid fire guns.</i>
<b>precipitate</b>	A precipitated solid substance in suspension or after settling or filtering. <i>Excess moisture is <b>precipitated</b> as rain fog mist or dew.</i>
<b>promote</b>	Of an additive act as a promoter of a catalyst. <i>They are using famous personalities to <b>promote</b> the library nationally.</i>
<b>raise</b>	Raise in rank or condition. <i>It is hoped that the event will <b>raise</b> 50 000.</i>
<b>rise</b>	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>Christ is <b>risen</b>.</i>
<b>risen</b>	Above the horizon. <i>The <b>risen</b> sun.</i>
<b>rising</b>	Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another. <i>A <b>rising</b> trend.</i>
<b>soar</b>	Rise rapidly. <i>The dollar <b>soared</b> against the yen.</i>
<b>soaring</b>	(of a bird) maintaining height in the air without flapping its wings. <i><b>Soaring</b> prices.</i>
<b>stairs</b>	A flight of stairs or a flight of steps.
<b>stepladder</b>	A short folding ladder with flat steps and a small platform.
<b>underpin</b>	Support with evidence or authority or make more certain or confirm. <i>The theme of honour <b>underpinning</b> the two books.</i>
<b>uphill</b>	An upward slope. <i>Follow the track <b>uphill</b>.</i>
<b>upstairs</b>	On or of upper floors of a building. <i>No one was allowed to see the <b>upstairs</b>.</i>
<b>upward</b>	Spatially or metaphorically from a lower to a higher position. <i>The cards were face <b>upward</b>.</i>
<b>vertically</b>	(with reference to passage of diseases) from one generation to the next. <i>The bacteria are <b>vertically</b> transmitted from mother to offspring.</i>
<b>zoom</b>	Cause a lens or camera to zoom in or out. <i>The share index <b>zoomed</b> by about 136 points.</i>
