Associations of "Kicked out" (30 Words)

away	An away match or win. <i>Gave away the tickets.</i>
bereavement	State of sorrow over the death or departure of a loved one. <i>The family suffered a sad bereavement.</i>
boxing	The enclosure of something in a package or box.
canoe	Travel by canoe. <i>Canoe along the canal.</i>
cast	Form by pouring e.g. wax or hot metal into a cast or mold. <i>The witch cast a spell on her to turn her into a beast.</i>
cutout	A switch that interrupts an electric circuit in the event of an overload.
depart	Move away from a place into another direction. <i>The train departs at noon.</i>
deprivation	A state of extreme poverty. <i>Rural households could escape the worst deprivations of the towns.</i>
discharge	Go off or discharge. <i>The bank had failed to discharge its supervisory duties.</i>
egress	A way out. <i>A narrow egress.</i>
eject	Leave an aircraft rapidly using an ejection seat or capsule. <i>He was ejected from office in July.</i>
emit	Make (a sound). <i>She emitted a sound like laughter.</i>
evict	Expel (someone) from a property, especially with the support of the law. <i>A single mother and her children have been evicted from their home.</i>
exclude	Keep (something) out of a place. <i>The public were excluded from the board meeting.</i>

<u>exclusion</u>	An item or eventuality specifically not covered by an insurance policy or other contract. <i>He had a hand in my exclusion from the committee.</i>
<u>exhale</u>	Breathe out. <i>The chimney exhales a thick smoke.</i>
<u>expel</u>	Eliminate (a substance). <i>He was expelled from his native country.</i>
<u>far</u>	Beyond a norm in opinion or actions. <i>Far from the truth.</i>
<u>going</u>	Conditions for, or progress in, an endeavour. <i>People willing to work for the going rate.</i>
lash	Lash or flick about sharply. <i>He brought the lash down upon the prisoner s back.</i>
leave	Leave behind unintentionally. <i>The parts he disliked he would alter and the parts he didn t dislike he d leave.</i>
<u>omit</u>	Leave undone or leave out. <i>He modestly omits to mention that he was a pole vault champion.</i>
outrigger	A projecting support similar to an outrigger in another structure or vehicle.
<u>outside</u>	Functioning outside the boundaries or precincts of an organized unit. <i>An outside margin.</i>
passing	In sport the action of passing a ball to another team member. <i>A passing grade.</i>
<u>puff</u>	A light inflated pastry or puff shell. <i>He was never puffed up about his writing.</i>
release	Release gas or energy as a result of a chemical reaction or physical decomposition. <i>They released a flurry of great singles.</i>
respire	Breathe easily again, as after exertion or anxiety. <i>A country where fresh air seems impossible to respire.</i>
<u>squatter</u>	Someone who settles lawfully on government land with the intent to acquire title to it. <i>One of the wealthiest and most prominent squatter families of northern Victoria.</i>
<u>stray</u>	A stray person or thing especially a domestic animal. <i>Her eyes strayed to the telephone.</i>
