### **Definitions of "Kicking" as a noun**

- *A rhythmic thrusting movement of the legs as in swimming or calisthenics.*

**kick** Chiefly in rugby a player of specified kicking ability.  
*He does it for **kicks**.*

<b>all the rage</b>	Completely given to or absorbed by.
<b>in fashion</b>	Holding office.
<b>in vogue</b>	Holding office.
<b><u>modern</u></b>	Belonging to the modern era since the Middle Ages. <i>Matisse's contribution to <b>modern</b> art.</i>
<b>modish</b>	In the current fashion or style. <i>It seems sad that such a scholar should feel compelled to use this <b>modish</b> jargon.</i>
<b>popular</b>	Representing or appealing to or adapted for the benefit of the people at large. <i><b>Popular</b> fiction.</i>
<b>trendsetting</b>	Initiating or popularizing a trend.

**up to date** Being or moving higher in position or greater in some value; being above a former position or level.

**up to the minute** Getting higher or more vigorous.

**voguish** Elegant and stylish.

*He wore the costume of an art dealer from some **voguish** New York hangout of the late sixties.*

- amusement** The state or experience of finding something funny.  
*We looked with **amusement** at our horoscopes.*
- amusing** Arousing or provoking laughter.  
*An **amusing** fellow.*
- biting** (of wit or criticism) harsh or cruel.  
*He leant forward to protect himself against the **biting** wind.*
- boot** Kick give a boot to.  
***Boot** your computer.*
- entertaining** Providing amusement or enjoyment.  
*Films should be **entertaining**.*

<b><u>exhilaration</u></b>	A feeling of excitement, happiness, or elation. <i>They felt the <b>exhilaration</b> of victory.</i>
<b>fun</b>	A source of fun. <i>She asked for money and then the <b>fun</b> began.</i>
<b>funny</b>	Arousing or provoking laughter. <i>There was something <b>funny</b> going on.</i>
<b><u>glad</u></b>	Feeling happy appreciation. <i><b>Glad</b> to help.</i>
<b>happy</b>	Used in greetings. <i>I can't say they looked too <b>happy</b> about it but a deal is a deal.</i>
<b><u>hilarious</u></b>	Extremely amusing. <i><b>Hilarious</b> broad comedy.</i>
<b>humor</b>	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>She didn't appreciate my <b>humor</b>.</i>
<b>humorous</b>	Having or showing a sense of humour. <i>A <b>humorous</b> and entertaining talk.</i>
<b>humour</b>	The ability to express humour or amuse other people. <i>Her good <b>humour</b> vanished.</i>
<b>interesting</b>	Arousing or holding the attention. <i>It will be very <b>interesting</b> to see what they come up with.</i>
<b>jocular</b>	Characterized by jokes and good humor. <i>His voice was <b>jocular</b>.</i>
<b><u>joke</u></b>	Tell a joke speak humorously. <i>She was in a mood to tell <b>jokes</b>.</i>
<b><u>jolly</u></b>	Full of or showing high-spirited merriment. <i>He was a <b>jolly</b> man full of jokes.</i>
<b><u>jovial</u></b>	Full of or showing high-spirited merriment- Wordsworth. <i>A <b>jovial</b> old gentleman.</i>
<b>laugh</b>	A facial expression characteristic of a person laughing. <i>She decided to play along with him for a <b>laugh</b>.</i>
<b>laughing</b>	Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i><b>Laughing</b> children.</i>
<b>lively</b>	Quick and energetic. <i>This whole <b>lively</b> world.</i>
<b><u>merry</u></b>	(of an occasion or season) characterized by festivity and enjoyment. <i>Have a <b>merry</b> Christmas.</i>



- pleasure** A formal expression.  
*The touch of his fingers gave her such **pleasure**.*
- quirky** Having or characterized by peculiar or unexpected traits or aspects.  
*Her sense of humour was decidedly **quirky**.*
- repartee** Conversation or speech characterized by quick, witty comments or replies.  
*Quick fire **repartee**.*
- slapstick** Acoustic device consisting of two paddles hinged together; used by an actor to make a loud noise without inflicting injury when striking someone.  
***Slapstick** humour.*
- tickle** Touch or stroke lightly.  
*Dad gave my chin a little **tickle**.*
- vivacious** Attractively lively and animated (typically used of a woman).  
*A charming and **vivacious** hostess.*
- witticism** A witty remark.  
*Maurice roared with laughter at his own **witticisms**.*
