amusing	Arousing or provoking laughter. An <b>amusing</b> fellow.
biting	(of wit or criticism) harsh or cruel. <i>He leant forward to protect himself against the <b>biting</b> wind.</i>
<u>boot</u>	Kick give a boot to. <b>Boot</b> your computer.
<u>entertaining</u>	Providing amusement or enjoyment. Films should be <b>entertaining</b> .



<u>exhilaration</u>	A feeling of excitement, happiness, or elation. They felt the <b>exhilaration</b> of victory.
fun	A source of fun. She asked for money and then the <b>fun</b> began.
funny	Arousing or provoking laughter. There was something <b>funny</b> going on.
<u>glad</u>	Feeling happy appreciation. <i>Glad</i> to help.
happy	Used in greetings. I can t say they looked too <b>happy</b> about it but a deal s a deal.
<u>hilarious</u>	Extremely amusing. <i>Hilarious</i> broad comedy.
humor	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. She didn t appreciate my <b>humor</b> .
humorous	Having or showing a sense of humour. A <b>humorous</b> and entertaining talk.
humour	The ability to express humour or amuse other people. <i>Her good <b>humour</b> vanished.</i>
interesting	Arousing or holding the attention. It will be very <b>interesting</b> to see what they come up with.
jocular	Characterized by jokes and good humor. <i>His voice was <b>jocular</b>.</i>
joke	Tell a joke speak humorously. She was in a mood to tell <b>joke</b> s.
<u>jolly</u>	Full of or showing high-spirited merriment. <i>He was a <b>jolly</b> man full of jokes.</i>
<u>jovial</u>	Full of or showing high-spirited merriment- Wordsworth. A <b>jovial</b> old gentleman.
laugh	A facial expression characteristic of a person laughing. She decided to play along with him for a <b>laugh</b> .
laughing	Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i>Laughing</i> children.
lively	Quick and energetic. This whole <b>lively</b> world.
merry	(of an occasion or season) characterized by festivity and enjoyment. <i>Have a merry Christmas.</i>



pleasure	A formal expression. The touch of his fingers gave her such <b>pleasure</b> .
<u>quirky</u>	Having or characterized by peculiar or unexpected traits or aspects. <i>Her sense of humour was decidedly <b>quirky</b>.</i>
repartee	Conversation or speech characterized by quick, witty comments or replies. <i>Quick fire <b>repartee</b></i> .
slapstick	Acoustic device consisting of two paddles hinged together; used by an actor to make a loud noise without inflicting injury when striking someone. <i>Slapstick</i> humour.
<u>tickle</u>	Touch or stroke lightly. Dad gave my chin a little <b>tickle</b> .
<u>vivacious</u>	Attractively lively and animated (typically used of a woman. A charming and <b>vivacious</b> hostess.
witticism	A witty remark. Maurice roared with lauahter at his own <b>witticism</b> s.
